Paper-Shell Pecans

In Great Demand.

Albany, Ga., Feb. 13.—The culture of the budded paper-shell pecan is rapidly assuming prodigious proportions in this immediate section. Thousands of acres have been planted in various varieties of this splendid nut-bearing tree. Northern companies have been organized with ample capital to bring the immense groves to bearing.

In this county alone about two thousand acres were planted this winter, and the demand for the better varieties or the large paper-shell pecan has been so great that not enough trees could be supplied to meet it.

Most of the big groves in this section are planted in 5-acre tracts, which are sold to investors, the selling company contracting to care for the trees until they become of bearing age, which requires about six years after transplanting the trees from the nursery to the grove. In years to come the big pecan groves will present a handsome appearance.

The trees are planted with geometrical symmetry, and the groves are intersected at regular intervals by broad avenues, lined with magnolia and other ornamental trees.

There is no tree that grows that gives promise of large monetary returns than the improved paper-shell pecan, the demand for which is so great that it is never seen on sale in the stores, where the small wild varieties alone is sold.

The big paper-shell pecans go to the large manufacturers of fine confectioneries and bring often as high as \$1 a pound for the finer specimens.

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PETITION FOR AMENDMENT OF CHARTER

State of Georgia, Bulloch County.

To the Superior Court of said county: The petition of the Shearwood Lumber Company respectfully shows:

First, That it was incorporated under the laws of said State and its charter was granted by the Hon. E. D. Evans, Judge of the Superior Court of said county on the 13th day of January, 1903, and that its principal place of business was at Shearwood, in said county.

Second, That in and by its said charter its capital stock was fixed at \$20,000 divided into shares of \$100 each.

Third, That your petitioner desires the amount of its capital stock changed so it may have the privilege of increasing the same to \$50,000 or 500 shares of the par value of \$100 each to be issued and disposed of as may be determined from time to time by a majority in amount of the stock already issued at a meeting of the stockholders of said corporation called for that purpose.

Fourth, Your petitioner shows that these proceedings were duly authorized by a meeting of the stockholders of said corporation held on the 9th day of December, 1908, at which meeting all of the stock of said corporation was represented.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that its charter be amended in the manner and to the extent set forth in this petition.

Will Have Lots of Ice.
A cool proposition awaits the citizens of not only Statesboro but of all the country surrounding hereabouts.
Mr. A. B. Green manager of Green Ice Co., informs us that it is his intention to carry the ice delivery business into the rural districts proper. His mammoth plant when complete will produce such an enormous amount of ice that there will be no reason for any citizen to become over heat even in the warm period of June, July and August, wagons will be sent out in every direction covering the territory ten or twelve miles in each direction. The farmers be encouraged to put in ice boxes which can be constructed by any ordinary carpenter and the delivery will be made at certain stated intervals during the week.
Mr. Green states that ice will be left at every house for a while whether folks want to buy or not he will present with the compliments of his company a nice block of freezing ice at every mans door steps on the various routes to be used without cost of course. This will not last always but will be practiced awhile. He hopes this will induce folks to put in ice boxes and prepare to combat the summers heat.
There is no reason why a man living on a farm should not avail himself of the luxuries of life as well as the folks in town. Mr. Green states that owing to the fact that Bulloch has such a high class of rural population he will be enabled to put this plan in force, our farmers nearly all own their homes and those who do not are well to do, and he believes the experiment worth the trial.

Cotton Oil Mills
Atlanta, Ga.—President W. H. McKenzie, of Montezuma, Ga., Vice-president R. S. Patillo, of Macon, and Secretary Fielding Wallace, of Augusta, of the Cotton Seed Crushers' Association of Georgia, held an informal meeting with the other members of this association in Atlanta this week to discuss matters of interest to be brought by the Georgia association before the interstate meeting which is to be held in a short while.
According to Secretary Wallace, the association now has a membership of over 200, and all but six of the cotton oil mills in the state have joined and are co-operating in the work of having the by-products of cotton seed used more extensively at home than to ship them abroad in such great quantities.
This association is organizing for the purpose of promoting interest in the use of cotton seed products, and is waging a splendid fight to have the Georgia planters use the oil that come from cotton seed as a shortening, as a table oil and for cooking; have them feed the cotton seed meal to their cattle and to fertilize their fields with the commercial fertilizers, of which cotton seed meal is a principal ingredient.
"What Georgia needs now more than anything else," said President McKenzie, "is more cattle. The scarcity of this important article of food in this state is giving the producers of western meat a great advantage over us. With the cheapest and best cattle feed in the world, cotton seed meal, properly handled, Georgia and other cotton producing states have a great opportunity to become cattle raising centers of wonderful wealth. The cotton oil mills are planning to be pioneers in the new movement to again raise cattle in large quantities in this state by having herds, raising on this feed, at each mill in Georgia. We know what it will do for cattle and want to give an ocular demonstration to all."
The executive committee will meet soon to name the date and place for the annual meeting of the association.

Price Of Flour On

The Advance.
The price of flour has advanced from \$5.75 to \$6.50, during the past few days.
It is said that this is due to the fact that the Western farmers, from whom comes the largest amount of wheat used in this country, are holding their wheat for higher prices. In this way, due to the scarcity of the grain, the price is advanced.

It was thought that the pure food law would affect the price, as the law calls for a discontinuance of the bleaching process; but the flour dealers of the city stated that this does not and they do not think it will in future effect the price. The bleaching system consists of a sifter made of copper wires. When the flour is sifted through the wires they are charged with a certain voltage of electricity. This does away with having to store the flour for a certain number of days in order to let it bleach out. Only the best flour will bleach, and the bleaching system, while it is of benefit in one way, had also its drawbacks. Good patented flour could hardly be distinguished from poor flour. Often even was put into the flour to help bleach it. This was no serious drawback; but when starch was put into the flour to keep it white, and this was generally known, the pure food law was brought in to correct it.

One flour dealer in Augusta stated yesterday that the advance in price had not taken place suddenly. The price has been going up for several weeks. But when a certain figure was reached it was found that he could no longer sell the flour at the old price and clear expenses.—Augusta Chronicle.

How the Governor

Saved the Railroads

In a public statement printed elsewhere today, Governor Hoke Smith congratulates his administration and the state on the financial showing of railroads in Georgia for the fiscal year ending July 1, 1908.

Many of the carriers, the governor shows, recorded positive increases of revenue during that period of stringency. Others, he says, lost much less proportionately than other railroads throughout the country.

Hence, the railroads have no ground for kicking, etc.

We share the gubernatorial jubilation over the toughness and financial resisting power of the carriers in Georgia, but what would have happened if the governor's campaign threats had materialized? That every one of them were not bankrupted, instead of a few, is due to the fact that as soon as the governor got in he put on the back pedal, and forgot his devastating—though vote-getting—pledges.

Would the less fortunate railroad brethren have been able to limp into port with less water in the bilge keels if this sudden about-face had not occurred? Like Hashimura Togo, we "ask to know."

So to a little analysis which the governor, in the glowing of the moment, has inadvertently overlooked.

Two king-pin pledges stood out in the governor's campaign like Mars at perihelion. The "robber railroads" had been bleeding the "common-people" to the tune of \$4,000,000 a year in freight overcharges. That sum was to be turned back into the pocket of merchants, manufacturers, consumers. Pledge 1.

There was to be a horizontal decrease in freight rates. A good deal of talk about "port rates" foreshadowed impressive things in this direction. The fungus that causes favus is a vegetable parasite, and if the crust is magnified it is found to be a combination of minute branching roots held together by a sticky substance.

These parasitic plant roots are generally full of seeds or rounded spores. These are on the surface and often fill the feathers so that they get brittle and break off.

REMEDIES.
Either of the following remedies should prove effective if applied in the early stages.

Molasses crusts with liquid vasoline. Remove them gently and apply vasoline.

Apply ointment composed of one part red oxide of mercury to six parts vasoline.

Apply solution one part carbolic acid to a hundred parts water.

If disease covers fowl, do not use the latter, as its application to a large area will poison the fowl. Quarantine affected fowls and disinfect polluted premises.

DON'TS.
Don't put off buying that incubator till tomorrow. You'll get left by lousy chicks, to your sorrow.

Don't let eggs lie in the nests to chill or the results of your hatching will be nil.

Don't forget to turn eggs over every day or the germ will catch on to the shell and stay.

Don't neglect to see that the water is all right; it might "burn" and blow your prospects out of sight.

Don't forget that much depends upon the oil. If impure, it may ruin your success spell.

Don't neglect to test thermometer and regulator. They may make you falsely believe the incubator.

Don't have those eggs in right away. Let the machine run at least one day.

Don't forget to turn and cool the eggs every day. Turn trays end for end, that's the way.

Don't forget to test the eggs at proper dates c/h and t/h. If you don't find all the eggs reproducible.
