Dickinson of Tennessee

Goies into the Cabinet.

Columbus, O., Feb. 20.—J. M. Dickinson, of Tennessee, will be secretary of war in the Taft cabinet.

Charles, Nagel, of St. Louis, will be Taft's secretary of commerce and labor; R. A. Ballinger will be secretary of the interior.

The statement is not made upon the announcement of Mr. Taft, but its correctness may be accepted without question.

Mr. Nagel was a caller upon the president-elect Friday, and Mr. Dickinson had a conference with him today.

Mr. Taft will permit of no announcement from him upon those conclusions.

It has been known for some time that he had practically decided upon Mr. Nagel's appointment, however, and the interview yesterday bears all the earmarks of having been arranged for the express purpose of an offer and acceptance.

Mr. Dickinson came to Cincinnati from Chicago today. He has not been under consideration as a cabinet possibility for so long a time, but has been personally and favorably known to Mr. Taft for many years. His eminent legal record and his acknowledged ability are such as to commend him peculiarly to Mr. Taft.

Mr. Dickinson is a Tennessean, although temporarily residing in Chicago, where his duties as general solicitor for the Illinois Central railway require his presence. He is a democrat, although always having opposed Mr. Bryan.

At Xenia, Ohio, Mr. Taft's car was surrounded by an eager crowd and he came out on the back platform and asked for the people that the duties of the responsible position he is about to assume may be discharged for the best good of all.

Mr. Taft will reach Philadelphia in the morning and will be the guest of Dr. S. Weir Mitchell. Mrs. Taft will join her husband there, coming from New York, where she has been spending a few days.

On Monday Mr. Taft will make an address before the Pennsylvania University and will leave for New York Tuesday.

PETITION FOR AMENDMENT OF CHARTER

State of Georgia
Bulloch County.
To the Superior Court of said county:
The petition of the Shearwood Lumber Company respectfully shows:

First, That it was incorporated under the laws of said State and its charter was granted, by the Hon. B. D. Evans, Judge of the Superior Court of said county on the 13th day of January, 1903, and that its principal place of business was at Shearwood in said county.

Second, That in and by its said charter its capital stock was fixed at \$20,000 divided into shares of \$100 each.

Third, That your petitioner desires the amount of its capital stock changed so as to have the privilege of increasing the same to \$50,000 or 500 shares of the par value of \$100 each to be issued and disposed of as may be determined from time to time by a majority in amount of the stock already issued at a meeting of the stockholders of said corporation called for that purpose.

Fourth, Your petitioner shows that these proceedings were duly authorized by a meeting of the stockholders of said corporation held on the 9th day of December, 1908, at which meeting all of the stock of said corporation was represented.

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To be Greatest Inauguration in History of Country.

Washington, Feb. 22.—"I want the finest inauguration in history," said William Howard Taft, just after the inaugural committee under Chairman Stellwagen began to get down to business.

It looks now as if this utterance would be transformed into a prophecy and Judge Taft's wish fulfilled. Certainly the ceremonies attending his induction into the highest office in the land will be carried out this year on a grander scale than ever before, according to the reports of the chairman of the several sub-committees made yesterday to their chief, the head of the general committee.

In the great afternoon parade there will be 22,000 soldiers, sailors and marines and 9,000 citizens, members of the clubs and associations—a total of 31,000 paraders.

The attendance at the ceremonies also promises to be a record-breaker. Better yet, the arrangements made by the proper committee with the proprietors of hotels, boarding houses and the like, will not permit visitors to be charged exorbitant rates.

"A man or woman of moderate means may plan to spend three or four days in Washington during the inaugural period at a cost for lodgings and food of \$2.00 per day."

The above statement was made today by Chairman Weller of the inaugural committee on public comfort. Mr. Weller explained that good lodgings in a private family or boarding house at \$1.00 a day during the inaugural period, while the meals will not cost more than an additional dollar. There are many moderate priced lunch rooms and dining rooms in Washington where meals will be served from twenty-five cents up.

In private houses, lodgings and board can be obtained at \$1.00, \$1.50, \$2.00 and \$2.50 per day. These will be the ruling rates.

"And," Chairman Weller said, "the owners have agreed in writing to abide by the rates quoted to the committee. The rate is usually based on a visit to Washington of four days, which will enable the ordinary visitor to see Washington properly after he or she has witnessed the greatest inaugural ceremonies ever held."

Folks who stop at the hotels will find the ruling rate to be \$2.00 per day for room and board American plan, and \$1.00 a day European plan. Those

FERTILIZERS TESTED

BY COL. Wm. L. PEEK.

Mr. Editor:—At the request of friends and neighbors, I enclose you the results of my experiment with commercial fertilizers, last year. This plant has been a truck patch of a brother in black for three years—was always planted but never cultivated—and is just on the line where the gray and the red land meet. It was well broken ten inches deep with disc plow and thoroughly pulverized—planted May 1st. The natural land fertilized, averaged 500 seed cotton per acre, and the table below shows the increased yield by the use of 200 lbs. per acre of each number of ingredients. The preparation, cultivation and picking was all supervised by me in person. The rows were three feet apart, with every other row without fertilizer. In this test, the rows unfertilized had 75 per cent rust, and those that were mixed with kaint alone had comparatively no rust, and was a bit later than the average and continued to grow and fruit until frost.

For many years I have been making soil test of the various brands of fertilizers to find out the most profitable and best for general use, and up to this date a mixture of acid phosphate, kaint and cotton seed meal is preferable. Kaint is largely a rust preventive and insecticide and its source of potash is not drastic. Cotton seed meal is nearer a complete fertilizer within itself than any one article known to science.
