Jaekel Arrives as Manager of the Screven.

Mr. Gustave Jaekel, who is to take charge of the Screven house as manager for the lessees, Watkins & Hooks, arrived yesterday from Statesboro.

Mr. Jaekel was accompanied by his wife and three children and has taken up quarters at the Screven. He stated that he is here to stay; that he has already moved his effects to Savannah, and that he will dispose of his holdings at Statesboro as soon as possible. Until he effects a sale his brother-in-law, Mr. C. W. Baggot, will be in charge of the Jaekel hotel at Statesboro.

Mr. Jaekel is president of the Statesboro Hotel Company; he holds a lease on the building for a term of years and owns the furnishings individually. Under his management the Statesboro house has become favorable known throughout the state. He has lived there for nine years. Mr. Jaekel was born in Berlin and was reared up in the hotel business, as his father was a hotel proprietor. His German ancestry could hardly be disguised when the family names are known. His eldest child, a young lady of 16, is Emilie, and his two sons, 14 and 10, are Bruno and Herman. The Jaekels were given a cordial reception at the hotel, and Mr. Jaekel is to assume charge at once.

He said that he was not at liberty to discuss the plans of the lessees, but he thought the outlook very encouraging. Manager Jaekel suggested indirectly that sweeping improvements were in contemplation, but he refused to go further into the subject.—Savannah News.

Testimony of Governor Patterson Impeached.

Nashville, Tenn., March 5.—This was the states' day in the trial of Col. D. B. and Robin Cooper and John D. Sharp for the murder of former United States Senator E. W. Carmack. Not only did it tear to pieces what was left of the testimony of S. J. Benning, the defense's mysterious red-headed man who claimed to have seen the shooting but it challenged the right of the Coopers to be on Seventh avenue at all the day of the killing. It did this by impeaching the testimony of the governor and others who claimed the Coopers were invited to the mansion and that while on their way there they were met by Carmack and a street duel followed.

The bombardment of the case of the defense began early today, when two witnesses swore that Benning the night of the tragedy said to them: "If I had been five or ten minutes earlier I would see the killing."

Later in the day the state introduced witnesses attacking the reason the defense gave for being on the street which Senator Carmack must traverse to get to his apartments.

Adjutant General Brown, Judge Bradford, Col. Cooper and Robin Cooper had testified that after Col. Cooper left Bradford's office just before the shooting, Gen. Brown recalled him to talk to the governor over the telephone and that it was in obedience to the governor's command that the men were on Seventh avenue, upon which is the executive mansion, when they met Senator Carmack.

Two witnesses swore that after Col. Cooper left Bradford's office he neither returned voluntarily nor was recalled to the telephone by anyone. And one, Miss Daisy Lee, declared that instead of the governor calling the colonel, the colonel, at Judge Bradford's suggestion, called up the governor at the capitol. The latter testimony, however, was not permitted to reach the jury.

In rebuttal, too, the state attacked Judge Bradford. Miss Lee swore that he told her he could have shot Carmack himself with as little remorse as he would have shot a rattlesnake. She also swore that Paul Davis, another of the defense's witnesses, declared to her he would perjure himself to get on the jury.

When the sun had set and the battle was over the state announced that it would have but two or three more witnesses to complete its case in rebuttal and that they would be put on tomorrow.

The defense has not announced its purpose yet, but it is safe to say arguments will begin next week. No time limit will be put on either side. There are a score of lawyers in the case and the speeches doubtless will last several days.

Soon after court adjourned the state's attorneys were in conference. At 8 p. m. they adjourned and Attorney General McCall held a warrant for the arrest of Benning on a charge of perjury. The specific allegation is that when he testified that he saw Senator Carmack twirling the cylinder of his revolver, he swore to a lie.

The warrant was served at once. George Wooten, one of the day's first witnesses, was called by the state to testify as to the location of the two telephone poles at the scene of the tragedy. The object was to pave the way for the introduction of the photograph taken yesterday by the state of the pole still standing together with the dummy pole. Attorney General Garner said:

"The defense, your honor, has tried to prove that Senator Carmack was south of the poles and fired between them. We want to rebut this testimony by proving that he could not have done so."

Criticizes Vets Who Sell Beer. Waycross, Ga., March 8.—The near beer question in Waycross continues to bring this city into publicity. A new phase came up yesterday when a news item under Thomasville date line appeared in a Savannah morning paper, in which a statement from the John B. Gordon chapter, of that city, criticised severely the action of Francis S. Bartow chapter, of this city in demanding that those old veterans who engage in the sale of beer be required to give up their crosses of honor.

The attention of the president of the local chapter, Mrs. E. A. Pound, was called to the article, and she states that the action of the Waycross chapter has been misunderstood and misrepresented. Resolutions adopted at the last meeting condemned in vigorous language those veterans who are engaged in this alleged "nefarious business," but there was no action looking toward the taking away or requesting the return of the crosses.

The resolution stated that "if there be those who so far forget what the cross of honor stands for, and who so lack appreciation of the chapter which bestows it as to endeavor to operate of any nefarious business of such a nature as to delude our youths and manhood, they should be deprived of the crosses they wear, and if they will not voluntarily surrender them this chapter instructs its delegate to the state convention to introduce a resolution providing such changes in the rules in reference to the distribution of crosses as will prevent such contingencies in the future."

Farm Selection to be Disapproved.

On Wednesday the prison commission of Georgia will make its recommendation to Governor Smith in the matter of a purchase of a prison farm for the white male convicts. So the commission has itself announced.

Where the farm recommended is located, has not leaked out. It is known, however, that it will be somewhere in middle south Georgia, below Macon, and somewhere within a radius of sixty miles or so of Hawkinsville. It is known, too, that the commission has narrowed all bids down to four farms, which it is now considering.

The disapproval of their selection by Governor Smith is entirely possible, notwithstanding that the day is late and that very little time remains between now and April 1st, when the new law becomes effective. This is indicated by the governor's knowledge that he will not be hurried in his action, and that he will look singly to the best interests of the state, and the generally accepted fact that he himself is not responsible for the late date of the recommendation, the commission having had
