Gen. Garner Speaks

for the Prosecution.

Nashville, Tenn., March 10.—General Garner had not completed his argument for the prosecution in the trial of Duncan B. Cooper, Robin J. Cooper and John D. Sharp, charged with murdering former Senator Carmack, when court adjourned at 1:30 o'clock.

The greatest crush of people since the Cooper-Sharp trial began was on hand early this morning to hear General Job B. Garner speak for the state. The brilliant and rapid fire young attorney from Lawrenceburg was to have begun his speech yesterday afternoon, but General Meeks, for the defense, consumed the entire day, and many who had crowded into the court room during the afternoon left before adjourning time.

The unusual manifest of interest this morning was regarded as quite a tribute to Job Garner. The crowd at the court room was so great it was exceedingly difficult for the officers to handle the crowd. When General Garner entered the court room to begin his speech it required several minutes strenuous work for him to make his way to the bar.

General Garner began his speech promptly when court convened. The speaker held the attention of the court room at all times. He began by assuring the jury that he had no feeling in the matter; that he had a sympathy for the loved ones of those who had brought on this tragedy as well as for the dear ones of him who had been sent to the grave. He here scored the defense for the aspersions cast upon the head of the dead man and deplored the fact that the dead man could not arise to resent the charges of paid attorneys. General Garner declared Senator Carmack's character had been assaulted unjustly and without foundation. He said the test of the mental condition of the defendants ought to be based on what was their mental condition at the time of the killing, not what they swore at the trial. General Garner declared there was absolutely no excuse for the killing.

"Don't you go too far when you attempt to apply the unwritten law to editors of newspapers?" he asked.

General Garner proceeded in logical order with his speech and from the conference at Bradford's office on the afternoon he took up the scene of the killing. He declared, however, that he believed Colonel Cooper did promise Governor Patterson he would not send the note, but expressed the belief that the statement of Colonel Cooper was false to the governor.

General Garner ridiculed the evidence of John D. Sharp. He asked how it was that on that dark and gloomy afternoon that John D. Sharp could have seen every movement with such minute detail. He declared that John D. Sharp saw the movements through a cloud of heavy smoke that would have come from the black powder in Senator Carmack's pistol if Senator Carmack had fired first. Producing two books representing posts, General Garner placed them before the jury on the map and declared that Senator Carmack could not have fired between these two books, which were just six inches apart in a northerly direction, at Colonel Cooper. He asked the jury if they believed that Colonel Cooper would or did stand there and see Carmack facing him with a drawn weapon and then wait to see if Senator Carmack killed Robin before he (Colonel Cooper) would draw his pistol. He asked if Robin Cooper would have seen Carmack with a weapon drawn on Colonel Cooper and not draw his own until after Carmack had fired. General Garner said according to John Sharp, Robin Cooper was west of the posts and Colonel Cooper north of them and that Robin sprang on the pavement to get behind the posts and not to get between Carmack and his father to receive bullets.

General Garner paid a beautiful tribute to Mrs. Eastman, one that brought tears to the eyes of many in the court room. He scored the defense for ridiculing the evidence of women. He cited historical facts to show things that women had done in history. General Garner swayed the jury and his audience at all times. His effort was a masterpiece in every respect and produced a profound impression.

After discussing the incidents of the tragedy, General Garner took up the witness Benning, who had been arrested for perjury, and the crowd in the court room began to laugh. Judge Hart tapped for order. General Garner argued at length to the effect that Benning had been a willful and deliberate perjurer.

Before General Meeks resumed his argument to the jury when court convened in the afternoon session yesterday, Judge Hart again warned the spectators in the court room against applauding or any expression of feeling in the case.

General Meeks resumed his argument at 2 o'clock and closed at 4:10 o'clock, having spoken five hours. At the close of his address court adjourned till this morning.

"The state declares," began the general, "that these defendants must have known that Senator Carmack would pass the point at which they met him at the time they met him. Well, why didn't they prove it? They had the chance, yet they never offered a witness on this subject. Senator Carmack stopped at the drug store, stopped to talk to Jordan Stokes. Are these all conspirators? For, if he had not stopped he would never have met the Coopers. The conspiracy case, gentlemen, is foolish. It is unreasonable and impossible."

The attorney took up Mrs. Eastman's testimony and attacked it, claiming the witness was frightened and hysterical and could not remember all that actually occurred. "We say," General Meeks, "that Colonel Cooper went over to Senator Carmack with his hands open, as he had a right to do; that he committed no overt act; that Carmack met him with a drawn revolver, belching flame and bullets. We claim that when Robin saw the deadly weapon he jumped in front of his father and took the two bullets aimed at the latter. We claim that then, and not till then, did Robin open fire and kill Carmack as the latter was trying to shoot him again."

In closing, General Meeks said: "We regret the death of anyone. But in our regret for the dead we should not do the living an injustice."

"I ask you, gentlemen, to bring in a verdict of not guilty against the defendants. Turn the old man loose and let him once more meet upon the streets the remnants of that old band that went with him in the early sixties. Turn him loose and let him meet and shake the hand of that gallant gray-coated crew."
