TIMES WERE LIVELY AT FORT

Scenes of The Battle in Which The Fort Fell Were Related in Court Yesterday.

The famous "Fort Arthur" case had its day in court yesterday afternoon, Judge Holland being in charge of the ceremonies.

From what could be gained from the testimony things were strictly alive around Stillson on the night of March 6th. It seems that preparations had been made for an oyster roast and beer drinking inside the walls of the "Fort" Mr. Barnhill having secured the refreshments in Savannah and had them shipped out by express, which consisted of a lot of oysters in the shell and four dozen bottles of beer which according to the testimony of Mr. Brown was not simply "near" but the real stuff. It seems that Daniel Brown and E. Barnhill had become rather boisterous during the early stages of festivities, calling each other some pretty tough names, language so repulsive until one witness felt that he was not justified in repeating it even to an audience in which there were only men.

It happens that young Brown married a daughter of Mr. H. C. Barnhill and the boy he was quarreling with was his brother-in-law. The elder Barnhill came over to his son-in-law, and remonstrated with him to be at home and turning to Mr. J. E. Brown told the latter he ought to have whipped them both. Then it was, according to some of the witnesses, that young Brown addressed his father-in-law, telling him that "That is more than you can do." The father-in-law took hold of the son-in-law as if to carry out his threat, when Mr. J. E. Brown interposed. One word brought on another, when Mr. Barnhill was ordered out of the house in rather rough style. A few minutes later he and his son, W. D. Barnhill appeared at the door and knocked. Mr. Brown

demanded to know who was there and no answer coming he went to the door. Some of the witnesses say he carried an iron fire poker, while others say he did not. Barnhill pushed the door after it was cracked by Brown and told him he had come for a fight and went at it, knocking Brown down and gonging him pretty badly. Some of the witnesses say W. D. Barnhill had a pistol and put it on them while others deny this.

After hearing the evidence Judge Holland committed both the Barnhills to the City court under bond for riot.

In rendering his decision Judge Holland stated that he had little confidence in the case sticking in the higher court. He thought the showing made to be rather a weak one.

THE NATIONAL CORN SHOW.

One of the most interesting and instructive agricultural exhibits which were ever made in the United States as well as far and away the most extensive, was held at Omaha, Neb., when the National Corn exposition was in session from Dec. 6 to 10. The managers have interpreted the word corn to include any kind of grain or grass, while the courtesies extended on such occasions permitted the display of almost all products of the soil. An inspection of the various exhibits made it plain that no violence had been done in the above plan, for corn was clearly in the big show, the space covered by ears of corn being estimated at approximately 50,000 square feet, or better than an acre and a quarter. This exhibit was magnificent, comprising the best types and quality of corn produced in the whole country and expressing a large degree of intelligence and care on the part of the men who grew it. Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas seemed to lead in the corn exhibit, but the sweetcorn prizes for single ear, best ten ears and best bushel of corn were awarded to Indiana farmers on a finely developed type known as the Johnson White. In the auction held during the exposition the sweetcorns sold for \$75, much below the price paid for last year's, while the best ten ears brought \$180. An interesting fact connected with these sales was that better than 80 per cent of the prize corn was sold in Iowa, most including all the sweetcorn prizes. This is likely the result of the preaching of Professor Holden's "seed corn gospel."

Next to the most striking exhibit in the fair was the corn exhibit, though in an obscure corner of the exposition quarters, was highly instructive, especially with the interesting exhibits and great economic value of this great legume. In this exhibit, which was furnished largely by Nebraska and Indiana, the corn was displayed in a most effective manner. The exhibit was divided into two main sections, one for the matured and one for the seed corn. The matured corn was displayed in a most effective manner, showing the various types and quality of corn produced in the whole country. The seed corn exhibit was also highly instructive, showing the various types and quality of seed corn produced in the whole country.

The International Congress on Tuberculosis, which recently met in Washington, as a whole, dealt especially with human tuberculosis, but considerable attention was directed to tuberculosis in domestic animals and notably to questions dealing with the milk and meat supply and with the inspection of these products. One of the seven sessions into which the congress was divided devoted itself especially to these topics, and the general addresses before the congress, as a whole, included a lecture by Professor or Dr. H. H. Bang of Copenhagen, "Studies in Tuberculosis in Domestic Animals and What We May Learn Regarding Human Tuberculosis." An extended discussion followed the address by Professor Dr. Robert Koch of Berlin of his theory as to the non-infectiousness of tuberculosis of human and bovine tuberculosis, after which a resolution was unanimously adopted recommending "that preventive measures be continued against tuberculosis and that the possibility of the propagation of this to man be recognized."

The very extensive exhibits from the various countries in America and Europe attracted much attention and presented a vast amount of illustrative material of rare educational value. Phases dealing especially with the prevention and treatment of the disease in its early stages predominated, there being a great variety of models of sanatoria and special appliances.

James J. Hill's idea of a Farm.

There will be much discussion of farming for the next few months from many angles, one among them being the most useful size of farms. We do not wish to be one-sided and shall advise state fairly the large farm or combination arguments, but it seems to us that farming in this respect is the exception among businesses. Economy in the cost of supervision is the only reason for the expansion of the unit in any business, and land is more productive under the small farm system. Even if larger farm units are possible they are not desirable. We do not want the European regime of an overlord with tenant farmers. We want the greatest number of independent little farmers, who hardly ever sell their farm hand. James J. Hill has more sense than nearly all of the professors, and he delivered an opinion two years ago to the effect that the individual farmer must have fewer acres and more horses.

OAT STRAW WASTE.
A farm byproduct that should be handled much more economically than it is, and which will have to be so handled if the present upward trend of land prices continue is oat straw. Feed tests show that 300 pounds of bright oat straw are equal to 100 pounds of timothy hay, yet the way it is handled by many a farmer would lead to the belief that it had no feeding value. In fact, it was a sort of waste, and a great deal of it is being burned for fuel. It is a pity that so much of this valuable material is being wasted. 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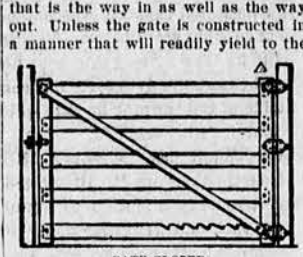

GATE FOR THE SNOWDRIFT.

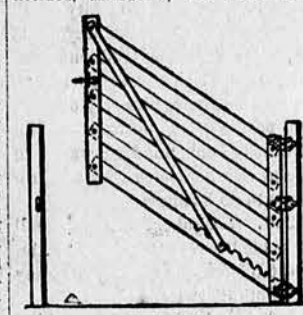
Simple Plan For Open Way in and Out.

Tuberculosis in Animals.

One of the interesting and valuable short courses which are offered by the Wisconsin Agricultural College is ten days of instruction for the Swiss cheese makers of the state. Instruction is given in the use of the Babcock and lactometer tests, the curd test and making starters for cheese.

A short time since there was reported the case of a clever angler who fooled a goodly number of suckers by advertising to send "twenty-five very useful articles on receipt of 10 cents in stamps." Those who bit received twenty-five pins by return mail. The same useful articles could have been bought in the home stores at a penny a paper.

The recently enacted federal pure food law has hit the bogus paint and adulterated food products. As a consequence a stop has been put to the making of "pure linseed oil" from anything but dressed, with the very natural result that pure linseed oil has gone up to 75 cents per gallon, while dressed has advanced in price from 50 cents a bushel in 1907 to \$1.18 in 1908, with the chance good that it will be higher the coming season.

The Kansas experiment station has been conducting some interesting breeding experiments. Among these was one in which all of the kernels of ears of two types were planted in separate rows. It was found at husking time that seed from the poorer ear, which was selected at random, yielded at the rate of 22.7 bushels per acre, while that from the better ear produced at the rate of 30.3 bushels per acre. There should be a suggestion here for every corn grower who may have been careless in the selection of his seed ears. The test referred to is very simple and easy, and any farmer can make a similar test in separate rows in his own field.

A reader of these notes living in Erie county, N. Y., writes asking for a repetition of the directions given some weeks ago for removing stumps by the use of acids. Since there may be some other readers who have forgotten these details we will repeat them in brief. Here a hole two inches in diameter and to a depth of about two feet in the center of the stump, and into this a pint of a mixture of concentrated nitric and sulphuric acids. Plug up the hole with a plug previously coated with paraffin, which will prevent the acid attacking it. The farmer who tried this method said it will eat the stump, roots and all, within thirty days. If this time was required for pine stumps a somewhat longer period would be needed for the hardwood stumps.

Seed Corn.
A gradual change has been taking place in the production and sale of seed corn in this country during the last decade. Previous to this time nearly all the corn used for seed was shelled and sold to the grower in that condition. At present the tendency is for more and more of the seed corn to be bought on the cob. The reason for this change is due to the fact that many ears of corn are worthless for seed and by purchasing the corn on the cob the grower has an opportunity to select the ears that are likely to yield well. Many of the undesirable qualities in an ear of seed corn can be detected by the eye, but very often a good looking ear will show a very weak germination and produce a weak plant yielding only a nubbin instead of a good-sized ear. The college has made many germination tests of samples of corn from different sections of the State. The work has been carried on as follows: Bushel lots of corn have been secured for nearly all the tests, the ears being divided into groups according to size of ear and the results of the tests from the different sized ears kept separate. Many tests have been made and in every case the total per cent. germination and the per cent. strong germination was in favor of the large ears or ears that came near the standard of size for the variety tested.

The following example will illustrate the point: Ninety ears of the Henry Grady corn were used for the test. The standard size ear for this variety is about 16 ounces. The first group were divided into two groups, the first group contained ears weighing 14 to 17 ounces. The average total per cent. germination for this group was 94, and the per cent. strong germination was 55. The second group contained 50 ears weighing between 11 and 13 ounces. The average total per cent. germination for this group was 85, and the per cent. strong germination was only 33, as compared with 55 for the large ears.

Second, 80 ears of Hembree corn, a local variety, was tested. The standard size ear for this variety is about 14 ounces. The eighty ears were divided into two groups. The first group consisted of 40 ears weighing from 13 to 15 ounces. The average total per cent. germination for these ears was 79.75, while the per cent. strong germination was 39.2. The second group consisted of 40 ears weighing from 9 to 12 ounces. The average total per cent. germination for these ears was 66.4, while the per cent. strong germination was only 10.5, as compared with 39.2 for the standard sized ears.

These results show that seed corn is not in good condition in many cases and should be tested for germination before planting. The difference in germination between the different sized ears of corn in this test corresponds to previous experiments made by the writer, and should be a guide in selecting corn in the ear for seed, as weak germination is at least partly responsible for low yields of corn observed throughout the country.

He reports that \$5,000 or \$6,000 is needed to replace clothing and household goods lost by about 300 persons who were left without either.


"The damage was not as great as first reported," said Gen. Scott this morning.

"The homes of about 300 persons, all of whom but a dozen or more are negroes, were totally destroyed, and the victims were left without household goods or wearing apparel. Most of them escaped in nude condition. They have been cared for by the townspeople, temporary homes having been provided and immediate needs supplied. Many of the townspeople are opposed to accepting aid from the outside, and were it not for the fact that the entire community suffered heavily in property loss, I do not believe they would ask for or accept any aid. I think, however, that the public should contribute five or six thousand dollars to repair the personal losses of those whose homes were made homeless and who are in the storm."

Governor Smith issued a statement based on Gen. Scott's report, today. He suggests that the funds needed be contributed and heads the list with a personal check for \$100.

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Wimberly's Farm in Twiggs For Prison Farm.

Atlanta, Ga., March 12—While no statement will be made by members of the prison commission or the governor, it may be stated as a practical certainty that the farm offered the state in Twiggs county by Minter Wimberly, of Macon, has received a favorable recommendation.

If it meets with executive approval, the farm will be taken over by the state immediately, and will be put in shape for the reception of white convicts on April 1.

The selected farm is located near Adams Park, within less than a score of miles of the city of Macon. It consists of 5,339 acres, and was offered at \$15 an acre. It will cost approximately \$80,000. It will take equally as much to organize and equip the place, making the total cost of the new farm in the neighborhood of \$135,000.

Governor Smith has not indicated what he intends to do with regard to the proposed purchase. It is rumored that the selection does not meet with his unqualified approval. He has advocated the purchase of cheaper land, on the theory that the state could save money by up building and developing property that could be bought for \$5 or \$10 an acre.

The prison commission has taken the position that it would be cheaper in the end to purchase well developed and well located property, and is said to have pursued that policy in making the final recommendation.

It is not believed, however, that the governor will register a disapproval, unless he finds that there are reasons other than those of general policy why the farm should not be utilized for the purpose intended. If he were to approve the purchase, it would mean virtually that the matter of buying a farm would probably go over until next fall, as it now too late to make any extensive investigations looking to the purchase of some other property.

Important Ruling by Court on Near-Beer in Dublin.

Dublin, Ga., March 16.—Judge Jno. H. Martin has decided that the city of Dublin cannot prevent the sale of near-beer and that the mayor and council of the city as a municipality cannot bring action to have any place abated as a nuisance, but that citizens can do so.

He holds that the state of Georgia has placed a tax on the sale of near beer and that a municipality cannot set aside this law. He says that the sale of near or imitation beer, whiskey, wine, ale which will not produce intoxication is permissible under the law.

While the city is enjoined from closing up the place of business of Radford & Kennedy, it is not enjoined from prosecuting them if they sell beer that is intoxicating. The court gives it as his opinion that the city proved that the beer sold by Radford & Kennedy is intoxicating.

Judge Martin holds that the city can regulate the sale of near-beer and that Radford & Kennedy must conduct an orderly place. He gives to the city the right to proceed against this firm and declare the place a nuisance if it is found to be such.

That part of the petition of Radford & Kennedy in which they ask for immunity from arrest is denied by Judge Martin.

When the city license tax was fixed no license was placed on near-beer, but such beverages were placed under the ban on the alleged grounds that near-beer saloons are nuisances. Radford & Kennedy secured a temporary restraining order preventing the city from closing up their place of business. The chief of police then made a case against the members of the firm and their clerk, on the charge of the illegal storage of intoxicating liquors. Each was fined \$100. J. C. Kennedy, a member of the firm, agreed to quit the business and engage in no more if the mayor would suspend the sentence. This was done.

Radford and the clerk appealed the cases to the superior court. In the meantime the city was preparing to make another case when a temporary restraining order was secured preventing this. The city then secured a restraining order preventing the sale of near-beer. All of the temporary injunctions were heard at the January term of the court. Since that time Judge Martin has had the matter under advisement. He refused the city's injunction, granted Radford's in part, refusing that one brought by Radford restraining the city from prosecuting his firm. The city can make as many cases as desired.

Young Man Arrested For Forgery.

Will Griffin a son of Mr. J. W. Griffin was arrested Tuesday at the home of his father near Register on the charge of forgery. He was arrested by Sheriff Kendrick and lodged in jail here, until Detective Umbach of Savannah came after him and took him back to Savannah yesterday morning. Young Griffin sank back at the sight of the handcuffs and pleaded that for one of his hands to be left loose but Detective Umbach insisted on pinning them both together.

It seems that young Griffin has gone to the bad at a pretty early rate. For some time he has been in Savannah and it was there where he began to sign the name of his cousin J. R. Griffin to checks on the First National Bank of this city. He had one cashed for ten dollars by D. Barnes a member of the firm of T. J. Grice & Co. of Savannah, when it arrived the bank here turned it down. His cousin states that he knew nothing of the check, but had he known that his relative needed money that badly he would have sent him the ten dollars.

Two warrants were sworn out against him by Mr. L. J. Nevill of the firm of L. J. Nevill & Co. of Savannah, on charges of forgery. These people are also Bulloch county natives and did not hesitate to accommodate the young man having every reason to believe that his actions were legitimate. There are other charges being investigated and it wouldn't be surprising if other warrants were to follow.

Mr. and Mrs. T. P. Saffold of Savannah were in the city this week. They came here to look over the Jaekel Hotel with a view of purchasing Mr. Jaekel's interest. It is not known whether they perfected a trade or not.

Mr. J. B. Groover returned from Savannah yesterday. His place of business has been closed since Monday, when he was served with a copy of the new city ordinance. He says he intends to fight the ordinance in the higher courts.
