Waycross, Ga., March 24.—Local parties residing at Blackshear this morning offered a reward of \$150 for the capture of James D. Hendry, who is wanted on the charge of murdering a woman upon his mother-in-law, Mrs. J. W. Easterling.

The words about Waycross are full of hunting parties. Bloodhounds have been put on the track of Hendry, who was seen at a distance late yesterday southeast of Waycross.

Last night officers from Pierce county search Waycross, believing Hendry had returned to his old home.

The first report of the trouble reaching Waycross was that Mrs. Easterling died shortly after she was wounded. Later it was learned that she was only unconscious when found. A long-distance telephone message from Blackshear at 11:30 o'clock this morning stated that she regained consciousness and has a slight chance to recover, though having two serious knife wounds.

To Test Legality of Appointment of Commissioner.

Atlanta, Ga., March 27.—Quo warrant proceedings will probably be brought in the near future to test the legality of Murphy Candler's appointment as railroad commissioner. It is understood that preparations are already being made to bring the suit.

The purpose of the proceedings, which, in a measure, will be friendly, is to settle definitely all question as the new commissioner's eligibility. Persons having some important petitions before the commission which are yet to be acted upon, don't want to have whatever favorable action they may obtain made null and void—or, at least, they don't want to run the risk of having to make their contests over again. Personally, they do not object to Mr. Candler, and they will not be grieved, but more likely pleased, if the court upholds his appointment. But they want the matter settled before he, as commissioner, passes on any important questions before the commission.

It is claimed that Mr. Candler is ineligible because of the fact that he was a member of the last house of representatives and a member-elect of the new. The constitution says that no member of the legislature, after he qualifies as such, shall be appointed to any office of emolument during the period for which he was elected. Mr. Candler has not yet qualified for the new house. Those who claim that he is qualified for the appointment which he was recently tendered and which he accepted say that his membership ended when he was elected his own successor last October.

Others claim that Mr. Candler is a member of the house, under his old election, until his successor has qualified. This question revolves around another often raised: If the governor were to call an extra session of the legislature between the October election and the following June, at this time, for instance, which would be summoned—the old or the new? If he should call the old, Mr. Candler must then be still a qualified member of the legislature; if the new, he is not a qualified member, except possibly, under the general hold-over rule.

An interesting circumstance developed by discussion of the question is that if the governor were to die during an interim like the present, a problem as to who should take charge of the affairs of state would arise.

The constitution says that the president of the senate would assume the office, pending an election; if no president of the senate, then the speaker of the house. The new legislature has chosen no presiding officers, for it has not met. If the old one is "dead" there is no president of the senate nor speaker of the house. If this be true, there would be no one with authority to assume charge in case of the governor's death; for the legislature does not meet regularly until June, and the governor is the only one who can call that body into extraordinary session. If Mr. Candler is held to be eligible to become railroad commissioner, the above state of affairs will be a possibility, until the difficulties are removed by a constitutional amendment and a new system of "succession" established.

Even if no immediate quo warranto proceedings are brought the question of Mr. Candler's eligibility is bound to get into the courts sooner or later. After he takes his seat on the commission, the

Receivers not to Accept Returns Below Real Value

Atlanta, Ga., March 27.—The books of tax receivers throughout the state will be opened for the reception of tax returns April 1. Comptroller General W. A. Wright, who is chief tax gatherer for the state, has issued his annual book of instructions. It contains some interesting matter.

Few property owners know that the law of Georgia does not permit any one to legally return his property at one-half, two-thirds or other part value as is the custom in many, if not all counties, but says that the same shall be returned for taxation on at its full market value. It is needless to state that if this law were strictly enforced that the total valuation of property in this state would be far more than a billion dollars.

The failure to enforce this law is one of the arguments used by persons who are advocating county tax assessors and a state board of equalizers.

Comptroller Wright cautions receivers against accepting returns that are below the real value of the property, calling particular attention to the general custom of assessing city and town property on lower valuations than that placed by municipal authorities. He says:

"There is very just complaint against the custom of practice of tax payers returning for the state and county at a very much lower valuation than the same property is returned to the corporate authorities for taxation. It must be manifest to everyone that property is worth as much when returned for taxation in the state and county as when returned to be taxed by the cities. Look closely to the returns of this species of property and endeavor to correct this evil. You have no right to receive this class of property except at its full market value."

He also ordered that the receivers require city and town property to be returned by street and number, saying that he is "confident that heretofore much of this class of property has escaped taxation, I shall expect a large increase in the value of city and town real estate if these instructions are carried out."

The evil of accepting returns unless made in person and sworn to by the property owner is pointed out by the comptroller, and it is noted that to permit the same pays the receiver liable to prosecution for a misdemeanor.

Relative to tax returns, there is an old requirement which is believed to be little complied with. It is that each white real estate owners shall not on his returns the number of negroes or "freemen" in his employment. This is an old requirement, and was first made in order to keep track of all the negroes of the state.

Banks are required to return their stock at market instead of par value, and must return their real estate and other holdings as well. Receivers are especially cautioned to see that proper returns are made by financial institutions, saying that the state has lost much by proper care not having been taken in this regard.

But with factories, iron works, etc., actual values of property held, without regard to the market value of the stock, must be returned, says the book of instructions.

"I desire to stress the point that the value or amount of the capital stock of these companies is not to be considered," says the comptroller, "because I am informed that tax receivers in some of the counties have been accepting returns on this basis in violation of law and instructions from this office."

The comptroller notes, also that improper returns of merchandise have been the custom and calls for greater care in this respect.

He calls on receivers to require the returns of all stock owned by citizens of this state in foreign corporations.

"Shares of stock in non-resident corporations owned by citizens of

this state," he says, "whether held in or outside the state, are by the constitution of this state made subject to state and county taxation, and you are its taxed to require them return to you for taxation. Should the owner of any such stock fail or refuse to make return of them, claiming that they are not subject to taxation, your duty is to assess them on the digest of your county."

When property is returned below its "full and market value," says the comptroller, it is the duty of receivers to reject such returns, and proceed to assess the property according to section 839 of the code.

KURIOS FROM KORRESPONDENTS

Q. Is there such a thing as getting two strains from the same flock of hens in a season?

A. Yes, and more. Breed with males of different strains and allow the males five days' grace between matings.

Q. Why is sand kept in the moisture pans of some incubators?

A. It prevents the water from evaporating too fast.

Q. Do you think it just fair for a breeder of show birds to exhibit against his customer?

A. Of course this is a free country, but when an extensive dealer shows the best birds he has reserved against inferior ones he has sold it does not seem fair. He should exhibit at shows where his customers do not enter.

Q. What is meant by a fancier getting "cold feet"?

A. When competition is too hot and he is afraid to show.

Q. Please let me know the best crosses for market geese.

A. Embden gander on Toulouse. White China or African goose, wild gander on African goose.

Q. What do you consider the best green food for young stock?

A. Lettuce and young green clover. Q. Kindly let me know why my White Wyandottes throw single combs and green legs.

A. You head your pens with narrow rose combed males with off color legs. Never breed from a green legged Dotter, male or female. Broad, small pebbled combs close to the head and rich yellow legs will make things all right.

Q. How can I get a good five point cockerel Leghorn?

A. A great many breeders use a standard combed male with a female whose five point comb does not lay over. We generally get enough in breeding straight standard. Please remember the comb is not the whole bird. Breed shape first always.

FEATHERS AND EGGHELLS.
The easy winter in the east made some of the sports careless. The first zero weather caught them unawares, and long rows of roosters at the shows with black frozen combs and wattle told the story. We saved ours by watching the thermometer and pinning them in covered boxes kept for the purpose.

The third day of incubation turn the eggs by rolling with the hand, or if you prefer, mark eggs on two sides and turn the egg separately. Eggs should be turned twice a day up to the eighteenth day to exercise the embryo.

A newspaper on which was the title's name was found in a rooster's hen-coop, near Lancaster, 14 old roosters to the man's house, where six hens were being roasted. The pen is more powerful than the police.

The incubator companies are continually preaching the old hen out of existence, but with all her faults we love her still. If she is such a failure and a back number, why are the winners at the big shows hatched with these "awful chicks"?

We believe in incubators, use them and have won cups with birds hatched by machinery, but no incubator has yet been invented that can beat the equal mother hen in hatching and rearing vigorous, beautiful birds.

How is this for hoodoo? We selected a cock and two hens and sent them to a big fair. They came from a flock of thirteen, the cock wore the leg band thirteen and the secretary tagged them thirteen, and with all that they won ribbons for first cock, first hen and second hen.

The trap nest dealers advertise rap-turously over the profits that come from the method and the ease of manipulating their fancy jiggers, but they never tell how these trap nests make the roosters lay. Every fellow knows how roosters help hens hunt the news. Just as soon as the trap nest is set the rooster leads the way to show Eddy where to lay and is trapped to his dismay.

The output of Kansas in poultry and eggs for 1908 is \$34,000,000. Many of you eastern states step down to the foot of the class. Old Pennsylvania, with her \$18,483,450, will please hustle to spell hustle.

The Chester (Pa.) tuberculosis dispensary treated 750 patients and distributed 61,000 quarts of milk and 65,000 eggs during 1908. The poultryman or dealer who sells bad eggs to such an institution should meet with instant prosecution.

Woman in Irons on

Atens Chaingang.

Hon. John R. Cooper of Macon speaks in strong terms of the treatment accorded a white woman whom he has been employed to represent by court and chaingang officials in the city of Athens. He leaves today for that city in order to argue on application for habeas corpus before Judge Charles H. Brand.

"It is the most disgraceful thing that has ever come to my attention," states Mr. Cooper, "and I consider it a reflection upon the great state of Georgia. Why, when I went to Athens last Sunday I found this young woman in chains, with manacles around one leg and irons around her body. Furthermore, she was chained to the floor of the cell. I saw all with my own eyes and I was more than astonished. I immediately resolved to conduct the prisoner's fight for freedom whether I get paid for it or not.

"Her name is Kate O'Dwyer. Several months ago she was convicted of conducting a disorderly house, and was found guilty in two counts. She was given a maximum sentence in each case—twelve months on the chaingang six months in jail and a fine of \$1,000. Judge Brand later suspended sentence on the condition that she leave this district at once. This she did. When she returned to Athens last week however, he issued an order for her arrest on the ground that she had failed to stay out of the county as promised. She was arrested and put on the chaingang and also put in irons. She is only 30 years of age, still a young woman, and has been convicted of only a misdemeanor of fence.

"I contend that the putting of chains upon her was an illegal proceeding, to say nothing of it being highly disgraceful to keep a white woman in irons. The act was directed by W. D. Kelly, superintendent of the chaingang, who says that he received orders from the county commissioners. Mr. Cooper believes that the writ of habeas corpus will be granted. His chief contention is the judge committed an error of law in banishing her from her home, that such an act was illegal and unconstitutional; that in suspending sentence he invaded the province of the governor of the state; that there was no justification for her arrest upon her return to Athens; that she was arrested without due process of law. Macon lawyers state that Mr. Cooper's contentions are strong ones.—Macon Telegraph.

The Corn-Planting Time.

When putting in corn—and the time is about ripe for the planting—the Georgia farmer should not overlook the handsome premiums offered by the State Fair Association.

There's going to be wheat at the mill and corn at the shucking at the next fall harvest in Georgia. List some of it for the State Fair premiums. Plant it, manure it, work it to the end. Win the money by making the golden grain. At Albany, at Nashville and at other points in Georgia local contest for corn-growing are on in earnest. Push it along. It is one of the best signs of the times we have seen.

Grain-growing is the thing, not altogether for the sake of the hoe-cake but because an extra rubbin' to the old sow and a quart or two of cracked corn to the old cow, means more fat pigs for slaughter, and more fat beefs for the butcher to say nothing of extra bundles of fodder for the old horse and chickens and new laid eggs for market. When there is grain in plenty there will be 'cattle upon a thicket and hills' and there will be pigs, pork and poultry and also "meat in the smoke house, butter on the board, coffee in the little bag, sugar in the spareribs and substance in the jowlers.

Talk about hoo-worms, there will be links of sausage a yardlong and fatty bread poned up like boulders at the foot of Blue Ridge. The Georgia razor-back will get his tail curled and become a thoroughbred.

Yes, plant corn. Plant it to win. Plant for shoots that will make heavy ears, not for shoots that will miss the stalk. We never saw a farmer that had too much corn in his barn, particularly if he had a runt pig or a motherless calf.

The ground lays fallow and the harvest waits upon the sowing of the seed.—Macon Telegraph.
