Fate of Near Beer Today

Col. R. Lee Moore and H. B. Strange will appear before Judge Rawlings at Sandersville today to argue the matter of the application of Mr. J. B. Groover asking for a permanent injunction restraining the officers of the City from interfering with him in the prosecution of his business as a dealer in near beer in the city of Statesboro. This is the same cause on which a temporary injunction was obtained for Mr. Groover by Col. Cory some weeks ago. It was set for a hearing on the 22nd of April but for some reason the hearing has been hastened up.

All is not love and peace between the two dealers in the beverage here. Messrs. Groover and Richardson are not pulling in the same harness it seems. Mr. Richardson has set up in the livery stable of Mr. O. C. Parker and has a more secluded place, where folks can sorter get around and take a drink while his neighbor remains in ignorance, in fact there is no door leading out to the side walk along and look in just at a critical moment, or the preacher or any one else get a line on the brethren. Mr. Richardson has cut the price, selling "White Top" at ten cents a bottle, for this reason he was summoned down to the Brewery this week so we are informed where he was made to walk the gang plank, the Brewery and other dealers are disposed to discourage any bargain counters in the beer business, hence all this brings about a certain amount of friction.

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BLACK HAND LETTER SENT

To Asa G. Candler—18-Year-Old Member of His Sunday School Class

Admits Guilt.

Atlanta, Ga.—Charged with attempting to blackmail Asa G. Candler, president of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, banker, and Atlanta's wealthiest citizen, out of \$35,000 by "blackhand" methods, Daniel W. Johnson, Jr., 18 years old, and a member of Mr. Candler's Sunday school class, was arrested Tuesday night at the instance of the postoffice inspectors and lodged in the Fulton county jail.

Johnson admits writing the letters and takes his arrest very coolly. He, however, declares he was the tool of three strangers, who he claims dictated his every action in the matter and forced him to write the demands for the money under penalty of death. He furnished the officers with a description of the three men.

On Friday of last week Mr. Candler received the first of the two letters written by the Bland Hand plotters, in which he was asked to place \$5,000 under the steps of the pastor's study of the Inman Park Methodist church on Monday night, April 5, "or you and your family will meet a horrible death at our hands." Sunday he received a second letter warning him to comply with the demands and further threatening him and his family if he failed to comply or if he made mention of the matter to a living soul.

Mr. Candler called George M. Sutton, chief postoffice inspector of the Atlanta division, in consultation and it was decided to trap the blackmail r. Mr. Candler drew \$35,000 in cash from the bank of which he is president, so as to guard against any possible betrayal of his plans. Monday night he made up a package and placed it at the point designated, the real money remaining in the meantime at his residence, guarded by detectives. Two detectives kept watch near where the fake package was placed, but no one appeared during the night for the package.

Tuesday morning Mr. Candler received a telephone message demanding that he place \$1,000 at a secluded spot on Moreland avenue between Anabel street and Walker alley. Again a fake package was prepared and placed at the spot designated Tuesday night and Johnson appeared from the darkness, grabbed up the package and started to run, but was in the grasp of detectives Lockhart and Coker before he was aware that he had been observed.

He was then taken to the Tower and after a grueling examination made a confession, admitting having written the two letters, but saying he acted under compulsion. The police give little credence to this story of having been forced to write the letters by three strangers.

The first letter, dated April 1, warned Mr. Candler that if he failed to put the sum at the spot indicated, "you alone shall meet death. Tell any one of it and you and your house—that is all that live with you—shall meet the most horrible death at our hands. Pony up with the sum and keep your face closed about it and all will be well. Fail to put the sum there and Hell will be to pay, nothing more or less than death."

The second letter advised Mr. Candler to "slide in close to the steps and put it under them and then '23' as hard you can. Do not fail or you will be blown to 'Kingdom Come' before April 6."

Mr. Candler was little disturbed incident and it was stated Tuesday night that he would lose no sleep over fears of his home being dynamited.
