Roads Prepare for Last Fight.
Montgomery, Ala., April 10.—When the railroads move on Tuesday next, as they have determined to do, to suspend a part of the order of Judge Thomas G. Jones of the circuit court, so they can proceed with the taking of testimony on the reasonableness of the rates that are a part of the commodity act, they are preparing the way for failure of the only two moves that seem now to be open to them, viz: application for rehearing and assumption of authority by the supreme court of the United States.
In making the orders for the injunctions, Judge Jones suspended any other action until the court of appeals had acted, such action being local only, on the filing of the mandate. This may be twenty-one days after the decree. To obviate the delay effort is being made to have the court allow pleadings and preliminary matters brushed away, so that the taking of testimony may begin at once, if, as a final matter, there is nothing else to do but put the rates in. The roads are going to contend that six months will be long enough, but the state will likely insist on a year.

Machine Shops Combined.
Messrs. Hagins and Addison have bought out the machine shop of Mr. Akerman near the Central depot. They are moving their machinery down to the Akerman shop and will conduct the business from that point. Mr. R. H. Akerman who has been in charge lately has gone back to his farm.

Statesboro needs a public hitching park with trees in it to shade the stock from the heat of the sun or a large shelter to protect them from cold and rain. People who come to a town to trade are entitled to some accommodations. This is one great need that should be looked after. This would be a good job for the Chamber of Commerce, that is if we have such an organization now.

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A SENSIBLE PLAN.

There have come to our notice lately several instances where farm proprietors, having labored for fifteen or twenty years and having acquired a substantial competence, have retired their farms to careful men and still live on the farm, but in a supervisory and advisory capacity only, helping in the busiest seasons perhaps, yet taking it easy when they feel like it. This is a capital idea and should be put into execution much more generally than it has been up to the present time. A nice thing about the plan is that it will also mean a let-up in toll and somewhat more leisure for the wife, to whose efforts, intelligence and economy a large measure of the improved financial condition is due. If there is one spectacle more than another that is pitiable as well as deplorable it is that of the man who has worked hard to amass property and when it is accumulated keeps on in the same old treadmill until he topples over into the grave already bearing the remains of a wife done to death with the infernal grind, while the property that he had looked forward to enjoying with keen anticipation, quickly becomes at once the prey and sport of greedy heirs. It is a good time to hunt before this extreme pass is reached and before the capacity to enjoy some of the fruits of one's long toil is entirely lost.

HOW SHE DID IT.

A lady county superintendent of schools of whom we heard the other day, having an unusual appreciation of the importance of the good seed corn gospel which has been preached of late, induced the boys and girls of the rural schools over which she had supervision to make testing boxes to determine the vitality of seed corn in the several localities. The boys and girls, too, took to this new idea at once, and it was an easy matter to lead them from this to a consideration of other subjects which lay close at hand and were of vital economic and social interest. Interest in this work has deepened until a very practical and helpful study of agriculture has been introduced in all the schools of the county, while the importance of the work she has inaugurated is being recognized over the whole state and in some adjoining ones. This success goes to prove that the introduction of a study of agriculture into the school courses of the country would not be difficult were only those in charge of school affairs men and women who had a ready appreciation of the worth of the work from an economic as well as from the educational point of view.

PREPARED SPRAYING MIXTURES.

A friend who has a three acre apple orchard here, says that the fruit from which for two or three years have been virtually worthless because of worm and scale damage, makes inquiry about the quality of already prepared commercial spraying materials. This is a question that it would be somewhat difficult to answer, because the reliability of such preparations would depend almost entirely upon the honesty and integrity of the firms putting them on the market. It is fair to assume that a firm which would sell impure chemicals would have even greater temptation to dishonesty when it came to disposing of a concoction in which the identity of the material could be easily largely concealed. The reverse would also be true. The preparation of the common spray liquids is neither a difficult nor a particularly disagreeable task, and as a rule, homemade sprays are stronger and more effective than those commercially prepared. Every experiment station in the fruit growing belt has spraying bulletins which take up the subject of spraying materials and methods in detail, and these may be had by making inquiry for them of the station officials.

MISPLACED CONFIDENCE.

It is sometimes pathetic to see the way in which folks and variable weather will sport with the blind instinct of wild life. We have in mind the late unexpected January springlike days, as a result of which wild geese were lured as far north as southern Minnesota to be a little later in the season. In spite of the fact that their confidence in Mother Nature is often misplaced, the wild things fare quite well and are usually able to cope with any adverse conditions with which they may be confronted.

Women Clerks Treated in a Shameful Manner.

Washington, D. C.—Immediately after convening Friday the senate entered upon the consideration of the bill providing for the thirteenth census.

A general denunciation of the civil service law and the system of making promotions in the executive departments in Washington characterized the debate.

"I know of cases," said Senator William Alden Smith, of Michigan, "in which women clerks are humiliated by the petty chiefs to take the liberties with them that they can take with other clerks."

Mr. Smith declared that there was no more contemptible politics anywhere than existed in the civil service of the United States, which, he added, excelled anything in that line ever known during the spoils system in its operation under Andrew Jackson.

No man, or woman, he said, could get promotion "until he bows down or how tows to some petty little chief who shields himself behind the law." He denied that it is a merit system.

Senator Clapp, referring to the remarks of Senator Smith, said they hinted at matters that could not be publicly debated and he criticized the general operation of the law.

Senators Scott, Bailey, Gallinger and Bacon all joined in a general denunciation of the law, especially criticizing the pending bill, which, as amended by the committee, included messenger boys and charwomen among those who must be examined for appointment for work in the census office.

The bill was still under discussion when the senate adjourned.

Prohibitionists Win on Test Vote in Fla. House.
Tallahassee, Fla.—Representative Hatcher of Columbia, introduced in the legislature Friday a resolution, which, it was charged, was intended to balk the passage of a prohibition bill, but the resolution was tabled, after many speeches had been made. This may be taken as a test as to how the house will stand on the prohibition bill.

The resolution introduced was one requiring the secretary of state to give the house information as to how much the state now derived from the liquor interests, what these funds were used for and how they must obtain other funds to take their place.

Hon. S. J. Hilburn, who introduced the house joint resolution for prohibition, led the fight to table Hatcher's resolution. Speaker Harris voted with the prohibitionists.

Senator John S. Beard's prohibition bill has been sent for a special order on April 15 in the senate.

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Two Men Dead From Attempt to Whip Negro.
Shellman, Ga.—Alfred Iverson, a negro, living on C. M. Cheney's place, four miles from here, was shot to death by unknown parties at an early hour Saturday morning. Investigation of the premises shows blood, brains and pieces of skull with a white man's hair on the wall and in the hallway leading to the room where Iverson was found with his body riddled with bullets.
The unknown parties called for Iverson to show them the way to Shellman, but instead of going out of the house he sent his son, who says seven white men in three buggies ordered him to accompany them down the road several hundred yards, when they left him with their teams. The men returned to the house demanding that Iverson come out. The shoot began when one of the white boys was killed, evidently by Iverson, who was found dead.
News reached here that Ross Mainor, a young white man, was the member of the party who was killed and that his body has been kept hid in a house near here all day.
According to Iverson's wife, the posse consisted of four white men, who went to the cabin to whip Iverson because he had quit work. A fight ensued.
After the fight was over, she says, the men carried a body away. It is believed a part of this man's head was blown off.
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It is understood that Mr. Blake is determined to ferret out the alleged murder. Physicians, who performed an autopsy following that of the coroner, announced that the attorney received several bad blows over the back of his head sufficient to cause death.

Alfred Iverson refused to admit them, but sent the boy out to see what was wanted. They made the boy hold the horse while they forced an entrance, breaking open the door. At this juncture, Iverson's wife fled.
The negro was cut and hacked to pieces, while his head was fearfully bruised. He was also shot in several places. It was proven beyond a doubt, however, that one of the white men was also killed, as Iverson's head, while almost severed from the body, was still intact, though crushed.
Efforts have been made to ascertain the identity of the four men, and particularly to learn if there is anyone in this community missing. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of "killed by unknown parties."

Two Men Dead From Attempt to Whip Negro.
Shellman, Ga.—Alfred Iverson, a negro, living on C. M. Cheney's place, four miles from here, was shot to death by unknown parties at an early hour Saturday morning. Investigation of the premises shows blood, brains and pieces of skull with a white man's hair on the wall and in the hallway leading to the room where Iverson was found with his body riddled with bullets.
The unknown parties called for Iverson to show them the way to Shellman, but instead of going out of the house he sent his son, who says seven white men in three buggies ordered him to accompany them down the road several hundred yards, when they left him with their teams. The men returned to the house demanding that Iverson come out. The shoot began when one of the white boys was killed, evidently by Iverson, who was found dead.
News reached here that Ross Mainor, a young white man, was the member of the party who was killed and that his body has been kept hid in a house near here all day.
According to Iverson's wife, the posse consisted of four white men, who went to the cabin to whip Iverson because he had quit work. A fight ensued.
After the fight was over, she says, the men carried a body away. It is believed a part of this man's head was blown off.

It is understood that Mr. Blake is determined to ferret out the alleged murder. Physicians, who performed an autopsy following that of the coroner, announced that the attorney received several bad blows over the back of his head sufficient to cause death.
