Boy's Throat Lacerated

by Teeth of a Dog.

With his throat lacerated by a dog until his windpipe was exposed, Louis Kennedy, the 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wright Kennedy, of No. 380 East Anderson street, had a close call from death yesterday morning.

By the fraction of an inch the dog's teeth missed the little fellow's jugular vein. As it was required five stitches to close the ugly wound and Master Kennedy took considerable blood. The attack by the dog occurred at Ott and Anderson streets and was witnessed by several terror-stricken playmates of young Kennedy.

The boys had been playing with a water spaniel owned by one of the number. They were all armed with switches and were engaged in driving the spaniel into the yard of the owner. Just as the Kennedy boy struck the spaniel, a dog owned by Mr. C. F. Horne, of No. 1001 East Henry street, passed and the switch hit his tail.

Informed by the blow the dog turned and sprang at the throat of Master Kennedy. The child was thrown to the ground and for an instant it seemed that the boy would be strangled, so firm was the hold of the dog. The other boys were too frightened to assist their playmate and but for the fact that the dog released its hold after the first bite young Kennedy would probably have been killed. The dog appeared satisfied with the initial attack and ran before the injured boy got to his feet.

The Kennedy boy's home is only a block from where he was attacked and assisted by his frightened playmates he hurriedly made his way to his mother. A physician was summoned and the wound was given immediate attention. It is not believed that the boy's condition is dangerous, although he is weak from fright and loss of blood. While it is not thought the dog was suffering with rabies an effort will be made to have the dog killed and an examination made of its brain.

Relatives of the injured boy will ask the permission of Mr. Horne to have the dog killed so it can be determined if its victim should be sent to the Pasteur Institute in Atlanta. Because of the close proximity of the wound to the brain it is urged by Mr. Kennedy that the question is one that should be determined immediately.

Mr. Wright Kennedy is a brother of Mr. Perry Kennedy of Statesboro.

Is McLendon to

Follow Joe Brown,

Will Governor Smith, following the precedent set in the case of Joseph M. Brown, now governor-elect, suspend Chairman S. G. McLendon from the railroad commission?

While Chairman McLendon has, as yet committed no overt act in direct opposition to the governor's wishes, or against his policies, it is evident, from what has already transpired, that it is his purpose to oppose the reduction of 5 cents per 100 pounds in the rate on cotton from interior points to the ports of this state.

The Constitution has already given an account of the statement prepared by Chairman McLendon with a view to showing that Georgia now enjoys advantages over other cotton states in the matter of rates on cotton to the ports. A copy of this statement was sent by the chairman to Governor Smith.

When the governor returned to the city from south Georgia yesterday, he received and read the statement from the chairman in opposition to the reduced port rate on cotton.

To say that the governor didn't like it a little bit, is putting it mildly.

It is stated that for some time Governor Smith has suspected the deflection of Chairman McLendon from "reform," but that he had hoped the chairman would stand with him in this matter, especially in view of a statement made by the chairman in 1906, in which the latter took a strong stand in behalf of port rates and especially port rates on cotton.

It is Governor Smith's opinion that there is a decided difference between the attitude of Chairman McLendon in 1906 and in 1909. Attention was called at the capital to the statement regarding port rates which Chairman McLendon made in 1906. Here is a paragraph from the chairman's 1906 report on port rates to which Governor Smith referred in his letter of February 20, last asking the railroad commission to take under consideration the matter of port rates:

"Yonder stands a train of forty cars of cotton at Memphis to be shipped to Savannah. It will take the Memphis rate and cost 2,250. Another train falls in behind it at Atlanta and the rate to Savannah is \$4,300. A third train falls in at Macon and the rate will be \$3,400, and a fourth train falls in at Savannah and the rate will be \$3,650. This is the rate charged the farmers of Washington county for their cotton shipments to the ports, and yet they have been told that nobody was interested in port rates except Atlanta."

Now Chairman McLendon's most recent statement relative to port rates on cotton is an exhaustive argument going to show that in other cotton states with advantages similar to those in Georgia, the rates to the ports is higher than they are in this state.

The conclusion is, of course, that the Georgia rates should not be lowered. And, as an additional argument in this connection Chairman McLendon quotes some figures about the long string of idle freight cars in the country, going to show that there is depression upon the railroads which would be increased by any such reduction at this time.

Gov. Wilson Hanged

in Effigy.

Frankfort, Ky., April 24.—Unlabeled "Guss Wilson, murderer of justice," from a high girder of the bridge spanning the Kentucky river here late last night, following the announcement of pardons to ex-Governor Taylor, former Secretary of State Findley and others charged with conspiracy in the Goebel assassination. The effigy bore this inscription:

"Gus Wilson murderer of justice; Taylor, Powers, Howard, Finley, etc., murderers of Goebel. To show the world that Kentucky believe in justice; that they do not approve the action of Wilson in pardoning the murderers before a trial, and to show why there is such a thing as mob law."

The effigy was cut down during the day and placed on exhibition at a local newspaper office.

YOU ASK FOR PARDON.

Frankfort, Ky., April 24.—"I am as much entitled to a pardon as those men," said Henry Youtsey last night when he was told that Governor Wilson had pardoned the six men accused of the murder of Goebel. Youtsey read the story of the pardon to the accused men carefully and then said:

"I think I ought to be pardoned, too, I think that something ought to be done for me at once. I would not criticize the governor for granting the pardons, for I am glad that he did it and am glad that the cases are never to be tried again. It was a fearful strain on my nerves to testify in those cases and get before a jury and the court room full of persons and tell the horrible story, especially when I was involved in it. The three trials have made my wife a nervous wreck and she never will be well again. I am not well, either, and my condition physically is bad. I think that I am as much entitled to a pardon as Taylor and Finley, and if they were turned loose I ought to be."

Youtsey told of how he had begun business life with bright prospects, had graduated in the same law class with Congressman Longworth, and then had fallen into politics and ended in the penitentiary. It is probable that Youtsey will make application for a pardon.

TAYLOR AND FINLEY REJOICE.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 24.—The pardons of former Governor W. S. Taylor and former Secretary of State Charles Finley by Governor Wilson of Kentucky last night has caused great rejoicing not only with the two men who have been exiled from their homes for nine years, but to their friends and families. The exile of former Governor Taylor has practically meant a similar hardship for his family. To Mr. Finley the pardon meant an opportunity to visit his aged father and mother and care for them in their old age.

Mr. Finley expects to return to his home in Kentucky, but Mr. Taylor says he does not intend to return immediately, and if he goes back to his former home it will only be for a visit. He intends to remain in Indianapolis and care for a good law practice which he has established here.

Friends gathered at the Taylor home in North Delaware street last night to congratulate Miss Anna Taylor, the former governor's

eldest daughter upon the pardon of her father.

The news is almost too good to be true, she said:

"I have always longed to go back to Kentucky to the old home. Of course, since the death of my mother it would not be the same, but there is no sport in the world like one's native state. I don't know about going back to Kentucky, I shall go wherever my father goes."

"I may return to Kentucky for a visit," said Mr. Taylor, "but probably will not remain there. I do not believe that I have a personal enemy in the state, and in my judgment I could go back there without personal violence."

Mr. Taylor's home is at Morgan-town, Ky. His wife died in Indianapolis in 1901.

Mr. Finley expects to return to his home at Williamsburg within a week. There a paternal welcome awaits him.

"If ever there was a time when a son should give his father and mother the care that is their due, that time has been in my life during the last nine years," said he. "My ambition is to return to them and do what I should have done during these nine years."

Since the flight from Kentucky in 1900, former Governor Taylor has not been out of Indiana. Mr. Finley has left the state but once, when he was advised by his physicians to go west for the benefit of his health.

RECEPTION FOR FINLEY.

Lexington, Ky., April 24.—A public reception will be tendered Charles Finley when he returns to his home at Williamsburg, Whiteley county, from Indiana, where he has been an exile for nearly ten years on account of charges against him growing out of the Goebel murder. Reports from there say that there is no danger of a personal attack on him if he returns.

A telegram from York, Pa., to The Lexington Leader says Caleb Powers is there visiting a young woman whom it is said he will marry.

JOHN POWERS IN AMERICA.

Kittanning, Pa., April 24.—John L. Powers, brother of Caleb Powers who was thought to be in Honduras, made himself known today to friends in this place, where he has been located for the past sixteen months under the name of Prof. J. W. Cristie, in charge of the Snyres business college. Cristie or Powers as he will be known from now on came here after having traveled all over the world it is said. Powers learned of the pardon only today.

Heav Property Losses

in Deadly Cyclone.

Fort Gaines, Ga., April 23.—A cyclone passed through the northern suburbs of Fort Gaines at 9 a. m. today, dipped down and demolished the beautiful residence of B. F. Grimley, [the damages being estimated at \$20,000, with only \$1,000 insurance.

It came from a southwesterly direction and was seen up in the air going northeast of Fort Gaines. Great excitement prevailed while it passed over the city.

It was seen many miles from here coming twirling in this direction.

B. F. Grimley and his mother-in-law, Mrs. B. A. West, were injured, the latter seriously.

No news news yet received from east of here in the direct path of the tornado.

Lizella, Ga., April 23.—With the blackness of night and a mighty rumbling a cyclone struck this place [this morning shortly after 9 o'clock, seriously injuring Martin Toole and a young woman, demolishing three dwellings and a score or more of out houses, uprooting trees and spreading havoc in its wake.

The home of S. B. Williamson was blown to atoms, and how the family escaped, a number being in the dwelling at the time, is considered a little short of miraculous.

Martin Toole was sent to Macon at once for attention.

The storm came with little warning. Lowering clouds overcast the sky and huge raindrops began falling, but there were few signs of the impending outburst of the elements. Suddenly the sky became inky black and a peculiar noise was heard in the distance. The wind came in gusts at the

start, but soon the usual funnel shaped cyclone was apparent and everything before it was demolished. Parts of the Williamson's residence were picked up and carried away.

A number of hogs were killed and several cows were injured. Growing crops were beaten into the earth by the terrific wind and rain.

The path of the storm was about two hundred yards in width.

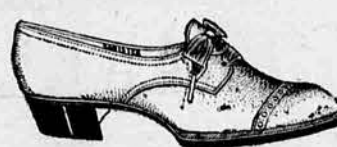

UNVEILING MONUMENT WAS GREAT SUCCESS.

Largest Crowd Ever Seen at Similar Occasion, Despite Inclement Weather—Exercises Held In Court House.

Notwithstanding the fact that the weather was so threatening Tuesday that the stand, which had been erected to serve the purpose of the unveiling ceremonies had to be abandoned and the speeches delivered in the court house, there was one of the largest crowds in town that day that has been seen here in many months.

The ceremonies began at 11 o'clock, when it was announced that the speeches would be delivered inside the court house on account of the rain which was then falling. The great building was soon packed to its full capacity, standing room both on the main floor and in the gallery being at a premium. So great was the crowd that many turned back and never made the second attempt to gain admittance to the house, which they knew was packed to suffocation.

The Confederate veterans formed in line under the oaks near the monument and marched into the building, all being seated to the left of the aisle, going in. The line of march, though it has been gradually thinning out with the passing years, was an exceptionally long one, many Vets from the adjoining counties being in line.

Mayor H. B. Strange had charge of the execution of the program, which was carried out as follows:

Invocation—Rev. Massey. Dixie—Male Quartette.

Introduction of speaker—Rev. Patterson.

Address—Hon. Enoch Giles.

Presentation of Monument to County and Veterans—Hon. R. Lee Moore.

Unveiling of Monument—Miss Annie Groover.

Speech of Acceptance—Mr. Jacob Rucker.

Tenting on the Old Camp Ground—Quartette.

Tribute of Laurel Wreaths—Thirteen Girls Representing the Thirteen Confederate States.

Acceptance of Monument in Behalf of County and Veterans—Maj. J. S. Cone.

Benediction—Rev. Massey.

The speech of Mr. Rucker came as a surprise, a request having come from some of the Veterans that he have something to say.

Mr. Rucker gave his experience in leaving Germany at the age of 17, one year before he would have had to go into the German army, and coming to America and enlisting in the army in defense of the Southern cause. He received liberal applause.

The address of Col. Giles was a masterly effort, being one of the best ever heard here, taking about one hour's time for its delivery.

Mr. Giles is one of the best stump speakers in the State, and while the people expected a fine speech, they were not disappointed.

After the conclusion of the speaking in the court house the large crowd assembled around the monument, where the veil was withdrawn from the soldier, whose attitude is that of resting arms.

The monument was admired by all as a magnificent piece of work and one that will be a source of pride during the ages to come.

One of the prettiest speeches on this occasion was that delivered by Maj. J. S. Cone, in accepting the monument in behalf of the Veterans. It was well delivered, being short and to the point, and many they are who say it was the best production of the entire program. It is here given.

Daughters of the Confederacy: There are times in life when language seems but a feeble thing to express the emotions of the heart; and I feel now that I might best express our appreciation of your thoughtfulness and love by simply laying my hand upon my heart in reverent silence.

But while we may not and cannot tell you in words how we have been stirred by the tender token of your love for us and our comrades who have passed over the river—yet we want you to know, that though our lips may fail, yet our hearts speak at the meaning and would not die your debtor. In the name of the old gray-haired veterans around me; in the name of the fathers and sons who marched under the Southern cross, and of the mothers and daughters who fought as bravely the silent battles at home; in the name of all that the Southern heart holds dear; in the name of the generations that shall come after us, and in the name of all men everywhere who love civil liberty—thank you, one and all, for this crowning expression of your love. We would not speak truly, Daughters of the Confederacy, did we not tell you that life for us can now hold nothing half so sweet, as to feel and know, as we know today, that in our Sunny Southland time has not dimmed the holy lustre of that cause, and that the memory of those who battled for it and those who died that it might live, will remain forever green in the hearts of the people.

Worthy daughters of those noble mothers of the South who made possible the valiant deeds of the Confederate soldiers, again from our heart of hearts we thank you for this beautiful shaft that you have erected, and for the tender love and sentiment that have inspired you in its building.

Big Catch of Fish.
