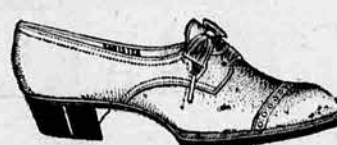

UNVEILING MONUMENT WAS GREAT SUCCESS.

Largest Crowd Ever Seen at Similar Occasion, Despite Inclement Weather—Exercises Held in Court House.

Notwithstanding the fact that the weather was so threatening Tuesday that the stand, which had been erected to serve the purpose of the unveiling ceremonies had to be abandoned and the speeches delivered in the court house, there was one of the largest crowds in town that day that has been seen here in many months.

The ceremonies began at 11 o'clock, when it was announced that the speeches would be delivered inside the court house on account of the rain which was then falling. The great building was soon packed to its full capacity, standing room both on the main floor and in the gallery being at a premium. So great was the crowd that many turned back and never made the second attempt to gain admittance to the house, which they knew was packed to suffocation.

The Confederate veterans formed in line under the oaks near the monument and marched into the building, all being seated to the left of the aisle, going in. The line of march, though it has been gradually thinning out with the passing years, was an exceptionally long one, many Vets from the adjoining counties being in line.

Mayor H. B. Strange had charge of the execution of the program, which was carried out as follows:

Invocation—Rev. Massey. Dixie—Male Quartette.

Introduction of speaker—Rev. Patterson.

Address—Hon. Enoch Giles.

Presentation of Monument to County and Veterans—Hon. R. Lee Moore.

Unveiling of Monument—Miss Annie Groover.

Speech of Acceptance—Mr. Jacob Rucker.

Tenting on the Old Camp Ground—Quartette.

Tribute of Laurel Wreaths—Thirteen Girls Representing the Thirteen Confederate States.

Acceptance of Monument in Behalf of County and Veterans—Maj. J. S. Cone.

Benediction—Rev. Massey.

The speech of Mr. Rucker came as a surprise, a request having come from some of the Veterans that he have something to say. Mr. Rucker gave his experience in leaving Germany at the age of 17, one year before he would have had to go into the German army, and coming to America and enlisting in the army in defense of the Southern cause. He received liberal applause.

The address of Col. Giles was a masterly effort, being one of the best ever heard here, taking about one hour's time for its delivery. Mr. Giles is one of the best stump speakers in the State, and while the people expected a fine speech, they were not disappointed.

After the conclusion of the speaking in the court house the large crowd assembled around the monument, where the veil was withdrawn from the soldier, whose attitude is that of resting arms. The monument was admired by all as a magnificent piece of work and one that will be a source of pride during the ages to come.

SHOOTING AT PORTAL

Elopement of Fourteen Year Old Girl Causes Gun-shot Duel.

There came near being a serious shooting scrape at Portal Monday night between Dr. J. A. Stewart and Mr. W. J. Williams. The origin of the trouble being the elopement of Maggie the 14 year old daughter of Mr. Williams with Asa Womack, the license had been issued in Bulloch but were obtained by the parents of the bridegroom and destroyed, there was also objections on the part of the parents of the bride and the ordinary notified not to issue any more being blocked in Bulloch the young couple ran away a few days ago obtained license in Jenkins county and were married. Mr. Williams accused Dr. Stewart of aiding the runaway and some words passed between the two. WOODS GOES UP FOR LIFE.

Long Trial Brings Verdict of Guilty. With Recommendation to Mercy—Defendant Breaks Into Tears.

The end of the long trial over which the best legal talent in this section of Georgia were battling for the life and freedom of Joe Woods came Thursday night at nine o'clock when the jury brought in a verdict of guilty with a recommendation that he be sent to the penitentiary for life. The verdict was not expected at this hour and there were only a small crowd in the court room. The defendant was brought in and sat unmoved while the verdict was read and for a few moments afterwards, when he broke into tears. He was not accompanied by any of his relatives at the time, they having gone home, either expecting a mistrial or acquittal.

A short time previous to the return of the verdict the foreman enquired if the jury would be authorized in returning a verdict of ten years or less. Judge Rawlings gave them the law in the case which did not admit of such a verdict.

The verdict came as a surprise to everybody who heard the case, the opinion had been expressed freely on the streets the night before and early Thursday morning that Woods would be acquitted, but as the argument before the jury progressed the acquittal idea diminished somewhat and the public were looking for a mistrial.

The question of relationship of Mr. Homer Simmons foreman of the jury to Joe Woods was fought, while the jury had been retired, while it was shown by the State that there was a relation in the fifth degree, yet Judge Rawlings ruled that he was a competent juror. It develops since the trial that Mr. Simmons is a third cousin of Wink Mikell the man who was killed. This of course would be ample grounds for a new trial and it may be that the defense may take advantage of this, though it was known they were expecting better results from this trial and had shot their big gun so to speak. Woods perhaps had the benefit of the ablest defense ever given a man in the Bulloch county court house.

It is rumored that he may go to the penitentiary with a hope of pardon, it is stated that the Solicitor General and all members of the jury would be willing to petition for his pardon after he has served a few years, though this is not authoritative.

Attorneys for Woods filed a motion for a new trial yesterday afternoon on the general grounds of the verdict being contrary to law, etc. They inserted a clause allowing them to amend their motion at any time, so as to get the benefit of the relationship of jurors should it be proven that Mr. Simmons is related in the degree set out above.

It is learned that the jury stood four for acquittal and eight for a verdict of guilty, and that finally the four went over to the eight, contrary to the expectation of the public as a mistrial was confidently expected on all sides.

Court Will Adjourn Today.

It is probable that noon today will see the end of the spring term of Superior court. Judge Rawlings dismissed all the jurors except one panel last night, and he expects to leave on the afternoon train for Millen, where he will pass the sentence of death on a negro for murder. The grand jury hopes to conclude its labors by noon.

Lester Olliff and Conley Barnes lead guilty to a charge of misdemeanor in the Superior Court yesterday. They were indicted for breaking into the store of the South Side Grocery last year.

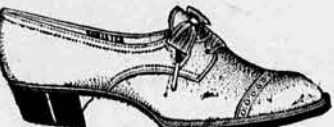
