INDICTED FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Ex-County Treasurer Again

Found Short in Accounts.

Grand Jury Takes up the Matter.

The grand jury returned a true bill against W. W. DeLoach Thursday, charging him with embezzlement.

Mr. DeLoach's troubles have been made public for many months, but it seems that the committee appointed to examine the books of the various county officers during the recess of the court, reported a discrepancy of \$685 in addition to sums reported before. A receipt in the hands of the tax collector showed where \$3,900 was turned over to DeLoach in December last, whereas only \$3,400 was accounted for. There were several other small discrepancies, making up the other amount.

In addition to this there was a matter of eighteen hundred dollars uncovered by the special auditor last fall. Thirteen hundred dollars of this, Mr. DeLoach claimed, was interest accruing on the county funds and by right belonged to him. This claim is said to be entirely contrary to law and assisted in making out the case.

There were several of Mr. DeLoach's bondsmen serving on the jury that returned the true bill, and it is now certain that he will be prosecuted in the courts.

Objects to Portrait

of Jefferson Davis

Washington, April 29.—Representative Hollingsworth of Ohio has prepared a resolution calling upon the secretary of the navy for information relative to representations that the state of Mississippi is preparing to present to the battleship Mississippi an elaborate silver service, the centerpiece of which is to be decorated with an engraved portrait of Jefferson Davis, which he had intended to present in public today, but which he was dissuaded from doing.

The resolution is preceded by a long preamble in which it is declared that "the dignity and character of the United States government and its creditable standing at home and abroad, requires that its battleships should be in command of officers imbued with high American ideals, healthy loyalty and just pride in the history and institutions of the government they serve."

In the resolution proper the secretary is requested to inform congress "by whom and on what authority such gift is to be accepted, and what lesson of loyalty or patriotism such portrait engraving is intended to teach and with what ideals of government it is expected thereby to inspire the officers and men now or hereafter to be in control of such battleship, and especially to ascertain and inform congress whether or not the proposed gift of the silver service thus decorated is agreeable to or desired by the officers now in command of the Mississippi."

Wheat Yield Will be Immense in Northwest.

Spokane, Wash., April 29.—Reports from the grain belts in eastern Washington and Oregon, northern and central Idaho and western Montana, compiled by the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, show that the wheat yield in the inland Empire will be the 80,000,000 bushel mark this season, as against 65,000,000 in 1907, the banner year in the history of the district.

Conditions are also favorable for bumper crops of oats and other cereals, as frequent light rains this spring have kept the ground moist and free from cracking.

The acreage of winter wheat is as large as it has ever been, while there will be an increase of 12 to 15 per cent in spring grown grain. What this means to the farmers of this part of the Northwest will be better understood when it is known that 50 cent wheat is profitable, 65-cent grain yields big returns, while 75-cent to \$1 wheat becomes basis of fortunes.

More than 2,100,000 acres of land in thirteen counties in eastern Washington, which yielded 40,075,000 bushels of wheat in 1907, are under cultivation this season and local bankers and millers, returning from trips into the Big Bend, the Palouse and the Walla Walla belts, say the outlook is better than ever, adding that a good rain in May or early in June will insure the banner crop in the history of the district. They report that the ground is well pulverized, thus conserving the moisture, and that the growing wheat is in excellent condition.
