### Fireman Struck by Flask Hurlled From Viaduct

Atlanta, June 3.—C. C. Farmer, one of the reinstated white Georgia Railroad firemen, was struck in the head with a thrown whiskey flask and was painfully injured as he was firing a locomotive in the yards here early Wednesday morning. Three men were arrested, but no delinquents showed the incident to have been connected even remotely with the recent strike trouble.

Farmer was passing on the engine under the Whitehall street viaduct, when someone threw the flask from the bridge above. It struck the fireman in the head, being smashed by the force. The victim was so badly injured that he had to be sent to the Grady hospital.

A policeman saw three men run from the viaduct. He gave chase and captured them after a lively sprint. They gave their names as Frank Russell, Joe Goins and Ben Villard. The first two are well known to the police. The third put up collateral of \$10.75, but failed to appear in court this morning. The other two were fined \$25.75 each, and the arrest of the other was ordered by the recorder.

The men denied throwing the flask but admitted they were drinking on the viaduct. They said someone let the bottle drop to the yard below by accident.

It is suspected by the police that the men thought the engine was fired by a negro, and for that reason hurled the missile.

The injured man is a member of the Brotherhood.



**Train Falls From Trestle, Passengers Swim to Land.**

Birmingham, Ala., June 6.—Eight persons were injured, none fatally, this afternoon when a combination freight and passenger train on the Short Creek division of the Southern Railway toppled into Black Creek near Maxine, Ala.

The engineer, fireman, two trainmen and four negro passengers were injured.

The train ran upon a fill supporting the approach to the trestle, which had been softened by the hard rains. The engine and some of the freight cars got across but the fill gave way under the strain and the passenger coaches were precipitated into the creek and entirely submerged.

The trainmen regard it as remarkable that the negroes were able to get out of the submerged coaches and swim to land. After crossing the trestle the engine was overturned and the men on the locomotive were injured in jumping.

### WITH BIG KNIFE HE DEALS DEATH BY WHOLESALE

Without Warning Murphy Seized a Big Knife and Began to Slash His Fellow-Workers.

Somerville, Mass., June 6.—Five men are dead and three others injured as the result of an attack by a workman who became suddenly insane at the North Company's plant here.

The workman, whose name is Thomas Murphy, was seized with the mania while at work in the slaughter house. Armed with the big knife which he used in his work, the police say, he ran through the factory lunging at everyone within reach. Five of the eight men attacked are said to have been almost killed.

Murphy is a pig killer. The knife which he used is as keen as a razor, and has a blade about sixteen inches long. Those near him received no warning of their danger. The first man attacked was Dr. Hayes, a government meat inspector, who was probably fatally injured by a terrible cut in the neck and groin. Next John Cheever, a Poland, was stabbed over the heart. There was no chance to oppose the crazy man, and in the next five minutes five men fell to the floor with stab wounds through the heart or in other vital parts. Another escaped with a bad cut.

Workmen out of Murphy's path seized clubs and barrels staves, and rushed upon him, but he ran down stairs to the yard. There he was surrounded, beaten down and captured. He was a powerful man, weighing about 200 pounds.

Two of the dead men were negroes and the others were foreigners.

Murphy is 50 years old, and lived with his family in this city.

"Buddie Love" Makes Escape in the Dark Followed by Deputy's Bullet's.

On Saturday night two or three pistol shots rang out on the night air in the vicinity of the county jail told of the escape of "Buddie" Love, who had just been arrested for selling whisky. Love, who is a notorious character, and suspected of an illicit whiskey dealer for many months was pulled by one of the city police force and turned over to Deputy Sheriff Kendrick for safe keeping. Mr. Kendrick escorted him down to the jail and when he stepped a few feet aside to get the keys, the negro made a wild leap for liberty into the dark. Mr. Kendrick whipped out his pistol and fired on him, but the negro continued to run until he was lost in the darkness.

Word was received back in town that he was wounded in the thigh and was laying up somewhere in hiding. The deputy sheriff expects to have him in a short time.

# THE FRUIT CROPS 40 PER CENT OFF

Agent Mallory of the Central  
Makes Preparation for  
Handling Same.

Savannah, June 7.—[Special]—After a trip over the fruit-growing district, taking in the Fort Valley and Marshallville peach district, Industrial Agent J. M. Mallory of the Central of Georgia Railway, returned to Savannah on Saturday and ordered out such refrigerator cars as he thinks necessary for the movement of the output from lines. One thousand nine hundred and thirty three refrigerator cars were ordered out to handle the peach crop, while 169 cars were ordered out for the cantaloupe crop. Many years of experience have perfected Agent Mallory in his line, and it is seldom, if ever, he misses the number of cars by fifty on either side. With no droughts or cold weather, both of which seem unlikely this late in the season, the amount of cars ordered will be necessary to move the Georgia peach and cantaloupe crop this year. The watermelon crop is not moved in refrigerator cars, the Central of Georgia simply sending ordinary freight cars for them.

The cars are ordered from the Armour Refrigerator Car Company, and have been ordered sent to the Central Railway as follows: In June 757, and in July, 1,151. The August movement of fruit is usually handled by hang-over cars. The cars for cantaloupes will be sent as ordered by the road, about three days in advance.

The crop this year, according to Mr. Mallory, will be 60 per cent of that of last year. So firm is he in this belief he has made his car orders accordingly. The comparative car statement will show the difference in the movement of the two years, last year being the banner year for the Georgia peach crop. The comparative statement follows:

Agent Mallory says the crop in Middle and South Georgia this year will be of the usual size, although very much smaller than that of last year. The last year crop was an extraordinary one, and is not to be used as a criterion for the State output. He says the North Georgia district will be short this year. Especially will this be true along the line of the Western and Atlantic and Southern railways between Atlanta and Chattanooga, and the Central railway between Griffin and Chattanooga.

This shortage in the Northern district will mean an early closing season for peaches this year. Usually the South Georgia district opens up the season with the clingstone peach of a hardy variety; then, between June 20 and July 10, the Middle Georgia section, noted for the celebrated Elberta peach, takes the lead. The season generally ends with a week or so of peaches from the Northern district.

## Will Seaboard and

### Central Consolidate?

Comment was rife in Savannah yesterday concerning the article which appeared in the Morning News concerning the mysterious movement in real estate which has taken place during the last few weeks in the vicinity of the Central of Georgia depot.

If Harriman really has turned his attention to the advantages of Savannah as a southern railway terminal point, it will mark an important era in the growth of the city. With the discussions came rumors and rumors. None can be verified at this time. Local men supposed to be close to the management of the Central of Georgia profess to be ignorant as to any move in which that road may be interested. Real estate men said to hold options on the property in question make the same plea.

One rumor which savored much of the possible was to the effect that Harriman is about to secure control of the Seaboard. In that event it may be that the Seaboard and Central may be consolidated into one great Southern rail system. Great machine shops might then be erected on the land south of the Central depot.

By one source, claimed to be authoritative, the Central of Georgia is said to be attempting to secure possession of the land near its present station as a site for its general offices. It is declared that these are to be moved from West Broad street to a magnificent new building.

Still another bit of railroad gossip has it that the Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio Railroad company is seeking an entrance to Savannah. This is the new line which was inaugurated several weeks ago at Norfolk, and was headed by H. H. Rogers previous to his death recently. It is currently reported that Savannah will be made this line's outlet.

Real estate dealers are as a unit in maintaining an innocent front whenever the subject of the rise in values at Jones street from West Broad to West Boundary streets is mentioned. However, it is known that property there has increased greatly in value, and the reasons are expected to develop publicly within a short time.—Savannah News.

Berlin, June 5.—The per capita wealth of Cunedors in Silesia, has been suddenly increased as a consequence of the visit of a Berlin merchant, who sought to cure a temporary fit of mental depression by throwing away handfuls of money and precious stones.

He arrived from a neighboring village in a cab, which he discharged after handing the driver \$25. A 4-cent bridge toll, payable upon entering the town, he discharged with \$12.50.

Upon every person he met he forced either a \$2.50 or a \$5 gold piece. Among others he distributed his gold watch, his diamond tie pin, his pearl cuff links, and other articles of jewelry. Reaching the market square with several pockets full of cash, he drew forth handfuls and threw them into the air, with the result that true square became the scene of wild scurramongos among the townspeople. At the tavern where the unknown benefactor took lodgings for the night he explained that he was suffering from "soul storms" in consequence of the death of his wife. He said he had got rid of \$750 in coin and of jewels worth the same amount.
