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THE FRUIT CROPS 40 PER CENT OFF

Agent Mallory of the Central
Makes Preparation for
Handling Same.

Savannah, June 7.—[Special]—After a trip over the fruit-growing district, taking in the Fort Valley and Marshallville peach district, Industrial Agent J. M. Mallory of the Central of Georgia Railway, returned to Savannah on Saturday and ordered out such refrigerator cars as he thinks necessary for the movement of the output from lines. One thousand nine hundred and thirty three refrigerator cars were ordered out to handle the peach crop, while 169 cars were ordered out for the cantaloupe crop. Many years of experience have perfected Agent Mallory in his line, and it is seldom, if ever, he misses the number of cars by fifty on either side. With no droughts or cold weather, both of which seem unlikely this late in the season, the amount of cars ordered will be necessary to move the Georgia peach and cantaloupe crop this year. The watermelon crop is not moved in refrigerator cars, the Central of Georgia simply sending ordinary freight cars for them.

The cars are ordered from the Armour Refrigerator Car Company, and have been ordered sent to the Central Railway as follows: In June 757, and in July, 1,151. The August movement of fruit is usually handled by hang-over cars. The cars for cantaloupes will be sent as ordered by the road, about three days in advance.

The crop this year, according to Mr. Mallory, will be 60 per cent of that of last year. So firm is he in this belief he has made his car orders accordingly. The comparative car statement will show the difference in the movement of the two years, last year being the banner year for the Georgia peach crop. The comparative statement follows:

Agent Mallory says the crop in Middle and South Georgia this year will be of the usual size, although very much smaller than that of last year. The last year crop was an extraordinary one, and is not to be used as a criterion for the State output. He says the North Georgia district will be short this year. Especially will this be true along the line of the Western and Atlantic and Southern railways between Atlanta and Chattanooga, and the Central railway between Griffin and Chattanooga.

This shortage in the Northern district will mean an early closing season for peaches this year. Usually the South Georgia district opens up the season with the clingstone peach of a hardy variety; then, between June 20 and July 10, the Middle Georgia section, noted for the celebrated Elberta peach, takes the lead. The season generally ends with a week or so of peaches from the Northern district.

Will Seaboard and

Central Consolidate?

Comment was rife in Savannah yesterday concerning the article which appeared in the Morning News concerning the mysterious movement in real estate which has taken place during the last few weeks in the vicinity of the Central of Georgia depot.

If Harriman really has turned his attention to the advantages of Savannah as a southern railway terminal point, it will mark an important era in the growth of the city. With the discussions came rumors and rumors. None can be verified at this time. Local men supposed to be close to the management of the Central of Georgia profess to be ignorant as to any move in which that road may be interested. Real estate men said to hold options on the property in question make the same plea.

One rumor which savored much of the possible was to the effect that Harriman is about to secure control of the Seaboard. In that event it may be that the Seaboard and Central may be consolidated into one great Southern rail system. Great machine shops might then be erected on the land south of the Central depot.

By one source, claimed to be authoritative, the Central of Georgia is said to be attempting to secure possession of the land near its present station as a site for its general offices. It is declared that these are to be moved from West Broad street to a magnificent new building.

Still another bit of railroad gossip has it that the Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio Railroad company is seeking an entrance to Savannah. This is the new line which was inaugurated several weeks ago at Norfolk, and was headed by H. H. Rogers previous to his death recently. It is currently reported that Savannah will be made this line's outlet.

Real estate dealers are as a unit in maintaining an innocent front whenever the subject of the rise in values at Jones street from West Broad to West Boundary streets is mentioned. However, it is known that property there has increased greatly in value, and the reasons are expected to develop publicly within a short time.—Savannah News.

Scatters Money to

Cure "Soul Storms."

Berlin, June 5.—The per capita wealth of Cuneo-dorf in Silesia, has been suddenly increased as a consequence of the visit of a Berlin merchant, who sought to cure a temporary fit of mental depression by throwing away handfuls of money and precious stones.

He arrived from a neighboring village in a cab, which he discharged after handing the driver \$25. A 4-cent bridge toll, payable upon entering the town, he discharged with \$12.50.

Upon every person he met he forced either a \$2.50 or a \$5 gold piece. Among others he distributed his gold watch, his diamond tie pin, his pearl cuff links, and other articles of jewelry. Reaching the market square with several pockets full of cash, he drew forth handfuls and threw them into the air, with the result that true square became the scene of wild scurramongos among the townspeople. At the tavern where the unknown benefactor took lodgings for the night he explained that he was suffering from "soul storms" in consequence of the death of his wife. He said he had got rid of \$750 in coin and of jewels worth the same amount.

Bulloch, Chatham, Bryan, Effingham and Jenkins Counties Planning Big Event.

Arrangements are under way for a great big picnic at Jenk's Bridge over the Ogeechee River near Blifton in the near future, probably about Saturday week.

President F. C. Battey of the Savannah Automobile Club, accompanied by Mrs. Battey spent some time in Statesboro on Tuesday morning, coming in the night before on his return trip from Millerville and Augusta. Mr. Battey was traveling in his six cylinder automobile, the one that was used as the pilot car on the endurance run between Savannah and Augusta last week.

At the Jaekel Mr. Battey was met by a large number of citizens who called on him and discussed with him the plan for a good hard surfaced road between Statesboro and Savannah. The News is always opposed to the slicing of Bulloch county territory any more or anywhere, but we trust this new county child will not scratch us like some of the others have. The editor of this paper has a weakness to stand by the homefolks and the home territory, and in the past has had the butt end of the situation put to him. Unfortunately for us, folks seem to think we are the daddy of all their troubles and all their woes and they insist on driving their daggers directly at us.

It hasn't been many months since we emerged from a new county fight with the smell of the battle hanging to us. All other people have a right to express their opinions on these matters but it has been decreed that the editor of this paper has no rights along this line. Hence, when he dips in they get their backs up.

We will promise our Groveland friends that we will remain as quiet as usual and say as little as possible for or against. We have learned by bitter experience that it is a whole lot better to pick berries on both sides of the fence on questions of this sort. Why, last year we lost all of the job printing from a certain neighborhood and it was almost a daily occurrence to see large juicy watermelons passing our door going on to other friends who were to partake of these pleasures as the price of their friendly spirit exhibited towards having the county slashed.

Take Gaudy Uniforms Away From Negroes.

Tallahassee, Fla., June 5.—The spirit which prompted the senate late Thursday night to strike out the \$25,000 appropriation from funds allotted to the negro agricultural and mechanical college of this state, was voiced by the speech of Senator Conner.

"Take these brass buttons and chevrons away from these negro boys and make them plough the fields."

"Think of it, men, negroes wearing uniforms and walking around the streets of our capital city. Why, Mr. President, I have even seen them sitting up here in the senate. Negro captains, yes captains. We'd better be making farmers out of them. Patent leather shoes, red neck ties, brass buttons and chevrons are breeding in the breast of every negro lout their ambition to be Booker T. Washingtons and eat at some white man's table."

"It is not right to appropriate them all this money to be used in that way. Why, they even have tennis courts out there. Why not make them plough these courts up and plant something in them? It's called an agricultural school, not a military college. Let's make them wear homespun shirts and jeans breeches and get in the fields and plough. We will cut this appropriation down and say to our state board of control, 'You take these uniforms from these negroes or we will ask the governor to remove you.'"

"We have got to stop them or we will have trouble with them pretty soon."

Agitating Drinking Fountains

There is some agitation now on the subject of pure water for our much cows, and one suggestion is that Crinkling troughs be arranged on the outskirts of the city where pure artesian water will always flow into them. There is one hydrant on the upper end of North Main street where all the milk cows in that section of the city stop and drink as they go out and as they come in. They got into this habit last summer when the streams around town all stopped running and dried up. They would come up in droves after water. Notwithstanding the fact that it was troublesome to be letting water on for someone else's cow, yet when a thirsty cow came up during a hot parching day most anybody would have turned on some water for her. This practice has been kept up and they have become accustomed to drink at this hydrant all through the year, instead of drinking the filthy water in the streams and ditches and mud holes around town. The result is that that section of Statesboro has had less sickness in it than any other part of the town. The physicians say that it is largely due to impure milk that fever is started in a family or community.

One of best things the city could do for the health of the town is to provide pure water for the milk cows. A man had just about as well drink impure water himself as to drink the milk from a cow that drinks water that is impure.

S. A. & N. MUST FIND \$300,000 OR BE SOLD.

Yesterday was Last Day of Grace on the W. J. Oliver Debt.

Macon, Ga., June 8.—Unless the Savannah, Augusta and Northern railroad has \$300,000 on hand tomorrow to pay over to Contractor W. J. Oliver, that road will probably be sold so that Mr. Oliver can get back the money he put into the road while building it.

Ten days ago Judge Speer ordered the road to pay the money and gave until June 9 for the payment to be made. Since that time the attorneys for the road have been in consultation, but it is not believed that the money will be forthcoming.

If the money is not paid over a decree will probably be passed authorizing the sale of the road to the highest bidder, so that from the purchase money the court may deduct enough to make good the amount spent by Oliver and for his time.

ROADS PROPERTY TO SELL AUGUST THIRD.

Decree of Foreclosure Entered by Judge Speer Yesterday.

Yesterday was the last day for the Savannah, Augusta and Northern railroad to meet the terms set down in the recent order passed by Judge Speer in the case of Oliver vs. that road. When the road failed to pay the sum of \$286,515.84, the amount found they were due Oliver by the master in the case, the attorneys for Oliver and for the road were present before Judge Speer in open court yesterday morning and arguments were heard.

Mr. Hinton Booth, of Statesboro, the attorney for the road, moved to vacate an order confirming the report of the master and to hear exceptions to that report. Arguments were heard by the court.

Mr. Oliver was represented by Messrs. J. R. Lamar and Henry Cohen, of Augusta. An opinion was granted by Judge Speer that he would overrule the motion of the road's attorney which sought to vacate the order confirming the master's report, and that the court would enter a decree of foreclosure. This means that the road's property will be sold to satisfy the claims of Mr. Oliver.

The date of sale was settled for the third day of August. It is understood that an appeal will be made in the case.
