BY CLIMAX BANKER
DECLARES REFEREE LANE.

In Blistering Rebuke He
Scores A. D. Oliver.

Bainbridge, Ga., July 30.—At the adjourned hearing of the Oliver-Mize bankruptcy proceedings today, Sheriff Jones, of Aberdeen, Miss., identified President A. D. Oliver of the defunct Climax Bank and gave a full account of his alleged operation and escape from that state.
In a lengthy ruling which dealt severely with Oliver, Referee Lane ordered that his scheduled assets of \$179,453.90 be turned over to the trustees at once. Oliver's attitude was termed by the court as "disobedient and contemptible."
The severe rebuke of the court was caused by the delay of Oliver in naming a date for a conference when to go over the alleged assets. "Adopting the usual course," says Judge Lane, "of obstinacy and contemptuous conduct which the bankrupt, Oliver, has pursued during the entire proceeding before the court, he fails to return the letter as requested or name a date which would suit his convenience for the conference suggested by him, but instead of courteously responding to the request made by the court in the communication he sent, he very skillfully has attempted to muddy the waters, declines to name a date for the conference and has referred in a few words to practically everything else which has transpired or may transpire in this case except naming a date for his proposed conference.

SAVS THE STATE
IS GOING BROKE
Reid Says Georgia Will Owe
\$860,000 By January
1, 1911.

Riddled with amendments until it resembled Julius Caesar's body, a tax bill came to its passage Monday afternoon in the house.
And like Mark Antony, standing beside Caesar's coffin, Mr. Reid, of Campbell, delivered a funeral oration over the mutilated remains of his ways and means committee report. It will long be remembered as a masterpiece of mournful eloquence.
The ways and means committee chairman, believing that the state of Georgia faced a serious financial dilemma and would have to choose between increased taxes, reduced appropriations or bankruptcy, had framed with his committee a bill providing for a material increase. The house amended the bill so as to kill practically all the proposed elevations and incorporated in the bill a near beer tax increase so heavy that Mr. Reid believed it prohibitive and calculated to reduce to a minimum the near-beer revenue.
Just before the amendment bill was passed Monday afternoon by a vote of 101 to 13 Mr. Reid was given the floor. He said, in part: "Throughout this fight, the house has shown me the kindest personal courtesy, and for that I am deeply grateful. As to what will result from the passage of the bill, the future must determine. To me it is a disappointment. I did not explain my vote of the near beer section, nor why I wanted to leave the wise act stand intact. I suppose I will be accused of aligning myself with the anti-prohibitionists, but I regard this bill purely as a revenue measure, and my vote was controlled by that view. When the near beer question was first brought before the Georgia legislature it was a question of revenue, and it is a question of revenue today. It was passed by a prohibition legislature and was signed by a prohibition governor. They were not anti-prohibitionists, and how can I today be justly accused of joining hands with the enemies of prohibition when I vote to retain that law?"
"But as head of the ways and means committee charged with the duty of raising money to support my state, I did not feel that it would be just and proper to inject into a revenue measure a prohibitive law, and when I vote to defeat such a project it was with the conviction that I was doing my conscientious duty toward my state."
"This bill will soon be out of our possession. I had hoped that this body would see fit to provide means for raising the extra money of which the state stands absolutely in need and which she could discharge the honest obligations she has contracted. That we have failed to do so is to me a bitter disappointment."

"Because we have killed the near beer question as a revenue-raising measure, and because we have failed to vote for necessary increases in taxation, the state of Georgia, it now appears, will be forced to face on January 1, 1911, a deficit of \$830,000, raising the state's total deficit from \$530,000 to \$860,000.

SOUTH GEORGIA SHOWING
SLUMP IN TAX RETURNS.

No Explanation of the Falling Off.
From present indications south Georgia is going to show a slump in tax returns this year, with middle Georgia making steady gains a general proposition.
To date some 60 odd counties have made returns to the controller-general, and the heaviest losses are in south Georgia counties. Emanuel, Ware and others have shown a falling off. Lowndes is a notable exception with the fine increase of \$561,950 over last year. So far DeKalb is the banner county among the smaller ones in the matter of increased property values, the county showing a gain of \$54,945. Floyd comes forward with the big gain of \$601,125, while Clarke's increase is \$428,425. Bibb's gain is \$1,450,555.

There is no explanation of the falling off in south Georgia, other than that section was hit harder by the panic than any other part of the state, as the lumber interests are very large there. The total gains to date over last year the total gains to date over last year are nearly \$5,000,000, with big counties like Fulton, Chatham, Muscogee, Richmond and others not returned yet.

Straw Man Has Been Slaughtered.

The announcement coming through the current issue of The Balloch Times to the effect that there was to be no "Automobile run, or mile embankment scheme" at Cones Bridge will cause a sigh of relief to run all the way through the county even to its outermost corners.

In its last week's issue appeared a scare head on the front that "the people's rights" were in great danger, and as the watchman on the tower the "big duke" was sounded and the riot call sent in. Volunteers were called for to come and "save the people." It was really alarming to contemplate the idea that this enormous prostitution of the people's rights was about to be saddled upon an unsuspecting public, and just as we were about ready to rush up and thank them for their brave and unselfish act in "saving the people" from the ravages of their officers, why the secret leaks out that the Times learns that it was "all a bluff." There is to be no reckless expenditures of the people's money, in the way of building automobile runs and mile embankments at Cones Bridge, so the Times tells us, (and they know.)

We are inclined to believe that our neighbor has rather overworked the job, if they had quit off with the first article they would have been in fine shape, they could have posed as a genuine patriots and saviors of their people, but they let it leak out that it was only a straw man that was being so numerically riddled. "Only a bluff." It was real cruel to call out such spontaneous expressions of approval from so many good citizens, congratulating them on their great bloodless victory and then in the same issue acknowledge that it was only a straw man that had been slain. In fact the letters were captioned with this acknowledgment. It was a lick beneath the belt.

Now the people are warned that there is a deep laid plot on the part of our County Commissioners to put at least a week's work on the Savannah road in the Briar Patch District. This of course is a needless and wasteful expenditure of the people's money, and should be stopped, at the earliest moment and we are inclined to believe that it is people ought to be called upon to speak out against this wanton waste of the public road funds, but in all fairness to those who come out and speak boldly in the people's interest we are opposed to having their letters bear a caption as in the last, that it was only a straw man that is being slain. Don't do it that way any more. If you once assert that the people's rights are in danger stick to it at least long enough for the ink to get dry on their communications before you publicly acknowledge that you have faked them and impose upon their confidence.

Aragon Hotel Stewart Shot.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 3.—Michael P. Anderson, steward of the Aragon Hotel, was shot and seriously wounded in the hotel late this afternoon by William White, of Nashville, a traveling man, who with his wife, was a guest of the Aragon. Anderson has not been able to make a statement.

The shooting occurred just outside the room which Mr. and Mrs. White have occupied for several months past.

From the police station Mrs. White sent the following note to Anderson at the hospital:

"I sincerely regret this horrible accident and truly hope you are not seriously hurt. I am now at the station, for what I know not." White declined to make a statement until after he had consulted an attorney.

Secretary Orr Mills Arrested.

Anderson, S. C., Aug. 3.—Calhoun Harris, secretary and assistant cashier of the Orr cotton mills here was arrested today, charged with breach of trust. Expert accountants who are going over his books announced that \$50,000 was missing.

Harris, who is socially prominent, says the apparent shortage will be found due to clerical errors.

In the cotton company's vault the accountants found between eight, nine and ten thousand dollars in checks, currency and silver which had been stored in bags, some of it for eight years and apparently forgotten.

Some of these old checks were tendered in payment for accounts with company and apparently had never been cashed.

Harris is a prominent lodge man. He is 35 years old and was married a few months ago.

IS NO TIME NOW FOR POLITICS

STATE'S BUSINESS INVOLVED.
Officials Confer on the Treasury's Condition.

Atlanta, Aug. 3.—There was a conference held in the office of Gov. Brown this afternoon in which the Governor, Attorney General John C. Hart, Comptroller W. A. Wright, Treasurer J. Pope Brown and Chairman Charles S. Reid of the House Ways and Means Committee participated for the purpose of discussing the serious condition which confronts the Georgia treasury.

No statement was given out, but it is said to have been the opinion of all those present that the treasury's condition is becoming more and more serious, and that unless the general assembly releases the near beer tax fund, \$230,000 now held by law only for penitentiary purposes, the state will face a deficit of more than \$20,000 by the close of the present quarter.

The bill providing for turning the near beer tax into the general fund of the treasury is to come up following the appropriations bill and the McLendon case in the house. It is said the only solution of the present predicament will be passage of this bill before the general assembly adjourns.

It is said that all those at the conference deprecated the efforts which are apparent in certain quarters to deal with the treasury situation upon a partisan basis, "for," as a state official remarked regarding the matter, "it is the business and the standing of the state that is involved now, and not the affairs of any politician or any political party."

COACH TURNS OVER; TEN ARE INJURED.

Train Leaves Central Track
Near Lexsy, Emanuel Co.

Stillmore, Ga., Aug. 3.—Ten persons received injuries when an eastbound mixed train on the Brewton and Pineora branch of the Central of Georgia was derailed near Lexsy at 11:05 o'clock this morning and one coach on the train rolled down an embankment. P. M. Pickle, of Savannah, received slight injuries, while J. D. Martin, who resides at 120 Jones street, west, was also hurt. The list of injured includes, in addition: Mrs. L. M. Williamson, Vidalia, Ga.; Mrs. Victoria Murray, Mrs. Alice Murray and child, all of Summit, Ga.; J. E. Etheridge, Adrian, Ga.; J. M. Thigpen, Norristown, Ga.; D. D. Finn, Dover, Ga.; T. W. Belcher, conductor, Brewton, Ga.

The injuries of Mr. Etheridge are the most serious. His head was badly hurt and he has internal injuries.

All of the injured were brought to this place and are being cared for here.

The accident occurred one mile west of Lexsy, near bridge A 103. The coach which was attached to the rear of the train followed the engine and freight cars from the rails, ran on to the edge of the fill and tumbled down the embankment, turning over. All of those who were hurt were in this coach. Their injuries are chiefly lacerations and cuts, but none of them, with the possible exception of Mr. Etheridge, is fatally hurt.

The train was in charge of Conductor Belcher, and the coach was well crowded. An examination of the track at the scene of the accident leaves the cause of the wreck a mystery.

M'LENDON IS OUSTED
House Votes to Sustain Act of Gov. Smith and Senate in Removing Railroad Commissioner From Office

S. G. McLendon is no longer a railroad commissioner of Georgia. By a vote of 129 to 40, the house at 6:45 Thursday evening passed the resolution by Representative Hardeman for the removal of S. G. McLendon from the office of railroad commissioner. Similar action had been already taken by the senate on resolution by Senator Burwell.

By a vote of 121 to 47 the house at 6:30 o'clock Thursday evening voted down the Anderson resolution, which provided for disagreement on the action of Governor Smith in removing the former chairman from office as a railroad commissioner.

The first was that of Mr. Hall, of Bibb, which called for impeachment of the chairman; the second was a resolution by Mr. Anderson, of Chatham, providing that the suspension be disapproved; the third was a resolution by Mr. Hardeman, of Jefferson, providing that the suspension be approved.

EDWARDS GETS AN IMPORTANT APPOINTMENT.

Congressman Chas. Edwards has been assigned to Col. Lester's old place on the River and Harbor committee the announcement coming at the close of the session on Thursday.

This is one of the most important committees of the National House, and one which generally takes years of continuous service to reach. This committee controls all the appropriations for the United States, and renders the young congressman from the First a very valuable man to our ports. Savannah will feel gratified over Mr. Edwards landing this place. This has always been their strong card, this was what made them stand so firmly by Col. Lester even during his long years of infirmities. They always argued that a dead man holding a vote on this Committee was worth more to this section than any new live man we could put in; who could not hope to land on it in many years to come.

Mr. Edwards has surprised even his most staunch friends in this matter, and now that the District has a real live fighting ambitious young man on this committee it means much for Savannah and the interior streams of the district. Much fun was poked at Mr. Edwards when he announced two years ago that he was going to have some work done on our rivers, folks turned up their noses at the announcement that a young strip of a boy who would never reach in forty miles of a position where he could influence this committee was going to get things done, yet a very short period has shown us that our congressman has the get there qualities about him that enables him to hold his own.

In his new position he is strongly entrenched in the good graces of the people of Chatham. Mr. Edwards has provoked some criticisms in the past on account of his seemingly friendly attitude to Bulloch county. It has been charged against him in other quarters that he has shown partiality to the people of Bulloch, and while he has always stood close to us and our interest the criticisms do him an injustice. True, he has fathered some legis-

lation that centers itself in this county; for instance, the government soil survey which will be started here in November, when the national government will send a large force of men to this county to make a survey of the soil and make of it a map. Every farmer in this county will have his soil tested. He can look on this map and tell exactly was class of soil he has. He can refer any expert to his place on the map and they can tell him exactly what class of fertilizers he needs. This work will take a large force of men all the winter. The government was willing to make this survey in one county in the district and by reason of the Agricultural school being here, and that tract having already been surveyed, this was the natural starting point for this work.

There is a bill pending by Mr. Edwards to appropriate twenty thousand dollars to equip a station to experiment in the destruction of the black root and other cotton diseases, and the fact that this is the center of the district and the home of the Agricultural school made this the logical point for its location.

While Mr. Edwards no doubt feels very kindly toward our people for their support in the past, yet in the legislation proposed and obtained as mentioned above he was simply doing what was his plain duty.

But Charlie Edwards is a friend to all the people in the district and stands ready to do what is in his power for them. He is a hard worker—camps on the job till something "draps." He is true to his friends and loyal to his state and section and the News takes pleasure in joining his many friends in congratulating him on his appointment on the most important committee of the lower house of the national congress. He has an opportunity now to do some real work for his district and section and nobody doubts in the least that he will be always found doing his level best.
