## COACH TURNS OVER; TEN ARE INJURED.

Train Leaves Central Track  
Near Lexsy, Emanuel Co.

Stillmore, Ga., Aug. 3.—Ten persons received injuries when an eastbound mixed train on the Brewton and Pineora branch of the Central of Georgia was derailed near Lexsy at 11:05 o'clock this morning and one coach on the train rolled down an embankment. P. M. Pickle, of Savannah, received slight injuries, while J. D. Martin, who resides at 120 Jones street, west, was also hurt. The list of injured includes, in addition: Mrs. L. M. Williamson, Vidalia, Ga.; Mrs. Victoria Murray, Mrs. Alice Murray and child, all of Summit, Ga.; J. E. Etheridge, Adrian, Ga.; J. M. Thigpen, Norristown, Ga.; D. D. Finn, Dover, Ga.; T. W. Belcher, conductor, Brewton, Ga.

The injuries of Mr. Etheridge are the most serious. His head was badly hurt and he has internal injuries.

All of the injured were brought to this place and are being cared for here.

The accident occurred one mile west of Lexsy, near bridge A 103. The coach which was attached to the rear of the train followed the engine and freight cars from the rails, ran on to the edge of the fill and tumbled down the embankment, turning over. All of those who were hurt were in this coach. Their injuries are chiefly lacerations and cuts, but none of them, with the possible exception of Mr. Etheridge, is fatally hurt.

The train was in charge of Conductor Belcher, and the coach was well crowded. An examination of the track at the scene of the accident leaves the cause of the wreck a mystery.

## M'LENDON IS OUSTED

House Votes to Sustain Act of Gov. Smith and Senate in Removing Railroad Commissioner From Office

S. G. McLendon is no longer a railroad commissioner of Georgia. By a vote of 129 to 40, the house at 6:45 Thursday evening passed the resolution by Representative Hardeman for the removal of S. G. McLendon from the office of railroad commissioner.

Similar action had been already taken by the senate on resolution by Senator Burwell.

By a vote of 121 to 47 the house at 6:30 o'clock Thursday evening voted down the Anderson resolution, which provided for disagreement on the action of Governor Smith in removing the former chairman from office as a railroad commissioner.

On the Hall resolution for impeachment proceedings against S. G. McLendon, the vote was 119 against and 55 for it. This was considered in the nature of a test vote, to show the division of sentiment regarding the former commissioner. The vote was not reached until 6 o'clock.

During the debate Thursday morning the galleries were crowded with spectators, and while it was evident the greatest interest was felt in the result, there was no demonstration at any time.

Pursuant to the action of several days ago, setting it as a special order, the house of representatives Thursday morning took up the suspension of S. G. McLendon from the railroad commission.

There were three resolutions concerning the McLendon suspension before the house.

The first was that of Mr. Hall, of Bibb, which called for impeachment of the chairman; the second was a resolution by Mr. Anderson, of Chatham, providing that the suspension be disapproved; the third was a resolution by Mr. Hardeman, of Jefferson, providing that the suspension be approved.

**CAROLINIAN'S CHILD-BRIDE  
DISAPPEARED IN ATLANTA**

Mrs. Cora Belle Corley mysteriously Leaves the Hotel Kimball.

Atlanta, Ga.—Nothing more mysterious has occurred in Atlanta for some time than the sudden disappearance Monday night from a room in the Kimball house of Mrs. Cora Belle Corley, the 16-year-old child-bride of Fred Corley, of Greenville, S. C.

The Corleys were married just one month ago, and Monday came to Atlanta to spend a few days. They went to the Kimball and were assigned to room 501. At 5 o'clock Corley returned again and brought his bride some fruit; he again left and when he returned the room was dark and his wife was gone, leaving absolutely no trace of her movements. Mr. Canley is a telegraph operator; he says he can assign no reason for his wife's disappearance.

The matter was at once reported to the police and a thorough search of the city was made, but Mrs. Corley could not be located. Mr. Corley remained at the police station nearly all night Monday, hoping to hear from his missing bride.

## EDWARDS GETS AN IMPORTANT APPOINTMENT.

HON. CHARLES G. EDWARDS.

Congressman Chas. Edwards has been assigned to Col. Lester's old place on the River and Harbor committee the announcement coming at the close of the session on Thursday.

This is one of the most important committees of the National House, and one which generally takes years of continuous service to reach. This committee controls all the appropriations for the United States, and renders the young congressman from the First a very valuable man to our ports. Savannah will feel gratified over Mr. Edwards landing this place. This has always been their strong card, this was what made them stand so firmly by Col. Lester even during his long years of infirmities. They always argued that a dead man holding a vote on this Committee was worth more to this section than any new live man we could put in; who could not hope to land on it in many years to come.

Mr. Edwards has surprised even his most staunch friends in this matter, and now that the District has a real live fighting ambitious young man on this committee it means much for Savannah and the interior streams of the district. Much fun was poked at Mr. Edwards when he announced two years ago that he was going to have some work done on our rivers, folks turned up their noses at the announcement that a young strip of a boy who would never reach in forty miles of a position where he could influence this committee was going to get things done, yet a very short period has shown us that our congressman has the get there qualities about him that enables him to hold his own.

In his new position he is strongly entrenched in the good graces of the people of Chatham.

Mr. Edwards has provoked some criticisms in the past on account of his seemingly friendly attitude to Bulloch county. It has been charged against him in other quarters that he has shown partiality to the people of Bulloch, and while he has always stood close to us and our interest the criticisms do him an injustice. True, he has fathered some legis-

lation that centers itself in this county; for instance, the government soil survey which will be started here in November, when the national government will send a large force of men to this county to make a survey of the soil and make of it a map. Every farmer in this county will have his soil tested. He can look on this map and tell exactly was class of soil he has. He can refer any expert to his place on the map and they can tell him exactly what class of fertilizers he needs. This work will take a large force of men all the winter. The government was willing to make this survey in one county in the district and by reason of the Agricultural school being here, and that tract having already been surveyed, this was the natural starting point for this work.

There is a bill pending by Mr. Edwards to appropriate twenty thousand dollars to equip a station to experiment in the destruction of the black root and other cotton diseases, and the fact that this is the center of the district and the home of the Agricultural school made this the logical point for its location.

While Mr. Edwards no doubt feels very kindly toward our people for their support in the past, yet in the legislation proposed and obtained as mentioned above he was simply doing what was his plain duty.

But Charlie Edwards is a friend to all the people in the district and stands ready to do what is in his power for them. He is a hard worker—camps on the job till something "draps." He is true to his friends and loyal to his state and section and the News takes pleasure in joining his many friends in congratulating him on his appointment on the most important committee of the lower house of the national congress. He has an opportunity now to do some real work for his district and section and nobody doubts in the least that he will be always found doing his level best.

## TARIFF BILL PASSES CONGRESS

SIGNED BY TAFT.

27 Democrats, 7 Republicans  
Cast Ballots Against  
Bill.

Washington, Aug. 5.—The vote in the Senate today on the tariff was as follows:

## McLendon Reaps His Reward.

The House of Representatives following the action of the Senate on Thursday voted to oust Chairman McLendon from the railroad commission by the very large vote of 119 to 40. While it was expected that Gunt would get it where Mollie wore the beads in the House, yet the majority against him surpassed all expectations. It simply shows that when a fellow starts down hill every body is ready to give him a kick. The Smith men are congratulating themselves, claiming that the vote sustains the Governor's action, while the Brown men say that it was simply carrying out what the people started in June, 1904, that when Governor Smith, the chief champion went, it was natural that the others must go too. The legislature finished the job which the people started last year.

The News is rather slow to endorse the action of the partisans who have allowed their political prejudice to control them in this matter; but at the same time Mr. McLendon seem to be reaping that of his own sowing. There was no more positive exponent of the Smith doctrine on port rates than Gunt McLendon. He remained strong in the faith until he saw the downfall of his chief, and instantly began to soften up. ## STATE IN BANKRUPTCY WITHOUT QUICK ACTION.

Governor Again Calls Attention of General Assembly of Treasury's Financial Distress.

URGES NO MORE DELAY IN DIVISION OF BEER FUND.

Limited Income not Sufficient for this legislation. To Meet the States' Obligations.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 4.—Governor Brown sent in today a special message to the general assembly, again calling the attention of the legislators to the financial distress of the state and urging them not to delay longer the division of the near beer fund to general expenditures.

The message follows a call upon the treasurer for a statement, which was transmitted along with it. This statement shows only \$50,386.07 available for general purposes, while the cost of maintenance of the charitable institutions of the state alone is \$50,000 a month.

For several days past, the governor, the comptroller general, the treasurer and the house chairman of ways and means have been in almost daily conference about the state's financial condition and it seems to be the opinion of all of them that prompt measures must be taken by the legislature to save the state from actual bankruptcy.

When the governor's message was read in the senate, it was referred to a committee of three, on motion of Senator Slater, with direction to report back tomorrow morning a report looking to the immediate carrying out of the recommendation of the governor.

The message and other communications follow:

To the General Assembly: I wish to submit for your consideration the attached correspondence between the treasurer of this state and myself. You will observe that in replying to my request for information relative to the status of the treasury he reports \$459,417.69 as being in the treasury, and of this amount only \$50,386.07 is available for general purposes. The sinking fund which has accumulated and now amounts to \$175,000 is not available for any purposes except to retire the matured bonds of the state. It is a sacred fund and under the constitution it cannot be used for any other purposes.

He also reports that there is in the treasury \$234,031.62 which he designates as near beer money. This money was raised under special act of the general assembly to be used only in the conduct and development of the penitentiary system of the state. This money, therefore, is not available for general purposes and cannot be used unless it be turned into the general fund.

The governor's power to borrow is limited by the constitution to a sum not exceeding \$200,000. The expenses of the state government, for all purposes is approximately \$10,000 per month to maintain the charitable institutions of the state, to say nothing of the necessary current obligations that have to be met.

The taxes will not be available until the latter part of the year, and the limited source of income from this date until the payment of taxes, plus the governor's authority to borrow, will not be sufficient to enable the treasury to meet the maturing obligations of the state.

The present condition may to some extent be relieved if the money in the treasury, known as the near-beer fund, is made available for general purposes. I again call your attention to the necessity

## PROHI VOTE MAY BE RECONSIDERED

BY STATE SENATE COMMITTEE.

Hard Fight Coming Over Increase in Appropriations in Upper House.

Atlanta, Aug. 7.—Contrary to expectations, the general tax bill was not reported back to the senate today, and there will be another meeting of the committee to consider certain additional amendments which will be offered.

It has been suggested that a tax on automobiles which was killed by the house should be put into the bill. The proposal is to offer an amendment to tax each automobile owned in the state \$5. There are four thousand of them owned in Georgia.

It was reported also that when the committee meets there will be a motion made to reconsider its action in adopting the Alexander prohibition section relating to near beer. It will be recalled that this was adopted by a vote of 7 to 5. There are fifteen members of the committee, so there were three who did not vote when the section came up for action.

Two of the three are known to be against the section, which would make a tie, and the decision would depend upon the odd man as to whether the section were given a favorable report, in the event a reconsideration should be voted.

Another amendment which will be offered to the bill is a section putting a tax upon all concerns selling kerosene oil in Georgia. It will be sought under this amendment, it is said to get specific specific taxes out of the Standard Oil Company, and if the amendment should be adopted it is said the tax will probably be a pretty stiff one.

The senate will not reach final disposition either of the general tax bill or the general appropriation measure until the closing days of the session next week.

The present session of the general assembly comes to an end next Wednesday night, a time that will no doubt see conference committees busy upon both of these measures. It is the general belief that appropriations which were materially cut by the house, particularly those to the state's higher educational institutions, will be considerably increased in the senate.

There is little doubt that the senate, following the recommendation of its appropriations committee, will materially increase the appropriation to the State Normal school, and then will come the contest between the conference committees of the two houses over this and numerous other propositions, upon some of which they are likely to lock horns hard.

It is probable that other appropriations will be increased by the senate, though there is a disposition in that body to stick closely to income, and unless there are some material increases in the general tax bill promising additional sources of income, the increases in appropriations will be closely watched.

Neither body is inclined this year to do much with special appropriations. Those which passed the house, including \$22,000 for the agricultural schools and \$10,000 to fight black root in cotton, aggregate all told considerably less than \$100,000, whereas those passed by the last legislature were \$200,000 or more.

## MORE PROTECTION FOR GEORGIA GAME.

Senate Passes The Bill—New Restrictions For Hunters.

Atlanta, Aug. 7.—Better protection for game birds and animals in Georgia was voted by the Senate today by 24 to 10, and an effort will now be made to get the bill through the House at the present session.

Several charges were made in the bill, one of the most interesting being the adoption of an amendment by Senator Harrell, which makes it a misdemeanor for any person whether he owns it or not to bait a field with grain to attract doves and other game birds, which are then shot down by the thousand.

Senator Slater of the First, offered an amendment to eliminate "wild duck" from the provisions of the bill, as he has constituents in his district, who are fond of hunting this game, but the amendment was lost.

The bill as passed provides for the appointment of a state game commissioner at a salary of \$2,500 who shall give all of his time to the service of the state in carrying out the provisions of the act. It provides for county and district game wardens, requires every one who hunts elsewhere than upon his own land to get license from the Ordinary for which a charge of \$1 is made (the license being higher to hunt in other counties and upon non-residents of the state); prohibits any one from hunting upon the lands of another without "written" permission; cuts down the hunting season for quail and similar game birds one month, putting it from Dec. 1 to March 15; cuts two months off the beginning of the dove season, making it begin Sept. 1; restricts the number of quail and similar birds which may be killed by one person in one day to 25; puts similar restrictions upon the number of other game birds and animals, which may be killed during a day or during the season and prohibits the killing of game for sale in the state.

which stands a pretty good chance of enactment, although the house cut it out, is the \$10,000 asked for by the State College of Agriculture for extension work. Common schools and anything that proposes to help the farmer are favorites with the Georgia legislators, both when it comes to appropriations and when it is a matter of general legislation.

This extension work, which Dean A. M. Soule of the State College of Agriculture is anxious to put into practice, will be, in effect, carrying the college to the farmer. It is proposed to hold farmers' schools in every section of the state and to increase the work of disseminating agricultural information, especially with reference to contending with diseases of plants.

In fact, it is understood that there has been some little rivalry between the State College of Agriculture and the state department of entomology with regard to which one ought to have the appropriation for fighting black root in cotton. While the college wanted it, the house has voted it to the entomological department.

## MOTHER'S BIRTHDAY SAVES HIS NECK.

5,000 Name's Are On The Petition From Chattanooga.

LaGrange, Ga., August 7.—Because his mother's birthday is Aug. 13, the date set for his execution, Dr. J. M. Elliott today received a respite of thirty days by Gov. Brown.

A petition bearing 5,000 signatures, asking this extension until the Prison Board might act on the case, came from Chattanooga, the old home of Elliott.

Elliott went to LaGrange from Macon early last summer and opened an establishment as a veterinary surgeon, styling himself "Dr." Elliott. He was fairly successful.

He and his wife were boarding at the home of G. L. Rivers and Elliott became insanely jealous of Rivers. It is said he tried to employ an officer to watch his wife to see if his misgivings as to her relations with Rivers were correct.

At least Elliott was overcome by his jealousy and on the afternoon of September 12, 1908, as he and his wife were leaving the Rivers home, Elliott suddenly wheeled and slapped his wife, drew a revolver and with a violent oath shot Rivers. The victim of the shooting lived for a few days, and following his death, it is asserted that only the calm request of the Rivers family that the law be allowed to take its course saved Elliott from being lynched. The trial followed within sixty days and the feeling remained at a high pitch. Attorneys for Elliott introduced the plea of delusional insanity and this plea was backed up by a large volume of testimony, but to no avail, the jury convicting Elliott of first degree murder and the judge sentencing him to hang.

Montgomery, Ala., Aug. 7.—There are now five prohibition measures before the extra session of the Alabama legislature. The Carmichael, or basic bill of the prohibition scheme, will be signed Monday. The constitutional prohibition bill passed in the house should reach the senate by Tuesday.

The prohibition of locker clubs bill and the 12,000-word Fuller bill, providing for raiding, confiscation and destruction of contraband liquors, will be taken up in the house no later than Tuesday or Wednesday.

The fifth bill is one to control soft drink stands, which has not yet been reported out of committee. Evidencing the belief that the Carmichael bill will be effective when it is signed next Monday by the governor, saloon men today kept up a caravan of moving liquors. The officers of the law let it known that offenders will have no leniency.
