M'LEOD CONFESSES FIENDISH MURDER.

**Inhuman Deed Prompted By
Insane Jealousy—Says
He Loved Woman.**

Douglas, Ga. Aug. 20.—Declaring
that he had rather see her
dead than married to another,
William McLeod, a farm hand,
today confessed to Sheriff Ricketson
that he murdered Miss Mattie
Graham, a wealthy and refined
young woman whose body was
yesterday discovered in a swamp
near her home at Hokesboro, Coffee
county.

Going into every detail, his
statement is that he left his work
and went to house before dinner.
Not seeing her he asked for Mattie
and being informed that she
had gone to her field for a melen,
he followed and found her.

Both started back towards the
house side by side.
Coming to a branch near the
house he left her proceed him.
When at her back he caught by the
left arm and cut one side of
her throat.

She turned and looked him in
the face and exclaimed: "Lord
have mercy," the only words she
ever spoke after the attack. Then
he finished cutting her throat and
cut her in the side as she fell.

He stamped her in the face,
washed the blood from his knife,
face and overalls, and when dry
went to the house and ate dinner.
His only motive for his crime was
that he had rather see her dead
than see her marry Boyd Mobley.

While he loved her he had never
told her and if she was now alive
no motive could induce him to
harm her. His only fear appears
to be of being lynched. He does
not show any remorse.

Douglas, Ga., Aug. 20.—Sheriff
Dave Ricketson has returned from
the scene of the murder of Miss
Mattie Graham and looked up
Will McLeod, a white man, who
has worked for the Graham girls
for two years, under a charge of
murder according to the rendering
of the following verdict by the
coroner's jury:

"We, the jury, after hearing the
evidence in the case, find that
Mattie Graham came to her death
by having her throat cut with a
knife or other instrument in the
hands of Will McLeod and pro-
nounce the same wilful murder."

There being no grounds upon
which to hold Messrs. Carter and
Phillips, the two men first ar-
rested on suspicion, they were promp-
tly discharged.

From all the facts that the
sheriff was able to obtain, the
murder, the blackest and most
foul ever committed in Coffee
county, was actuated by jealousy.
It appears that the murderer was
infatuated with the deceased, for
when he worked as a laborer, and
that Mr. Will Mobley, in nothing
but a spirit of fun, seeing that
McLeod was easily tamed, a short
while before the horrible crime
was committed, told McLeod that
he (Mobley) intended to marry
Miss Mattie, and it appears from
what could be learned that Mc-
Leod let the demon of jealousy
get hold of him to the extent of
murdering the object of his af-
fections, before, as he thought, he
should become the bride of an-
other.

WON'T SIGN OATH TO BE CONONEL.

G. N. SAUSSY OF SYLVESTER

Atlanta, Aug. 21.—Hon. G. N.
Saussey, of Sylvester, has politely
but firmly refused to accept an
appointment as a member of the
military staff of Governor Brown,
because he says he is an unrecog-
nized Confederate and cannot
subscribe to the required oath.

When Mr. Saussey was appointed
lieutenant colonel on the staff
there was sent him along with his
commission the usual form of oath.
Among other things it is required
that the appointees shall take oath
to support the constitution of the
United States.

In signing the oath, Mr. Saussey
wrote upon it:
"I am a Confederate soldier on
parole. I except to the twelfth,
fourteenth and fifteenth amend-
ments."

Where the blue uniform was
prescribed, Mr. Saussey also
scratched out the word "blue"
and wrote in the word "gray."

Adj. Gen. A. J. Scott returned
him it must be accepted in full or
not at all. The result was that
Gov. Brown received a letter to-
day stating that while the writer
keenly appreciated the honor of
the appointment, he could not
yield his position in the matter
and respectfully declined it.

Mr. Saussey always wears the
gray uniform and is noted for his
allegiance to the lost cause.

COTTON COMING IN AT A RAPID RATE.

It is Opening Fast and Firm-
ers Are Selling.

From present indications the
upland cotton crop will soon be
marketed in this county. Up to
yesterday afternoon 283 bales had
been put in the cotton warehouse
here and more came in during the
afternoon.

Saturday was the biggest day of
the season so far, there being 92
bales sold on the local market that
day. The first day of the season
five bales were brought to town.
This was last Friday a week ago.
On the following day six bales
were sold. The first few days of
the following week only a few
bales arrived until Thursday, when
41 bales came in; on Friday last
44 bales were sold; Saturday 92,
and yesterday, up to 8 o'clock, 37
bales had arrived.

Due to the extreme hot weather
cotton has been opening faster
than it has in many years, and the
fact that 253 bales have been sold
here already this season is taken
to indicate that the farmers are
selling their cotton as soon as they
can get it ginned. This number
for this season of the year is much
greater than years heretofore and
if it continues to arrive as it has
done the short cotton will be mar-
keted by the time the sea island
begins to open. The prices are
fairly good—around 12 cents—and
the farmers are not taking any
chances on its reaching a higher
price.

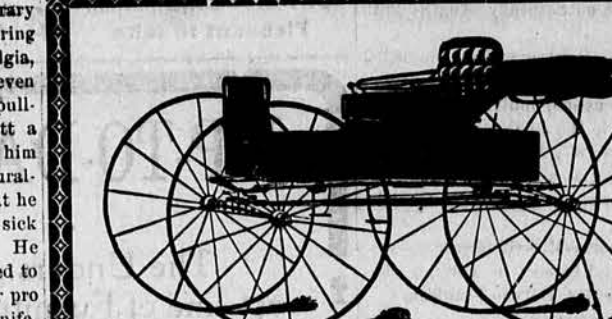

Jos. F. Gray Named

R. R. Commissioner.

Atlanta, Aug. 21.—Having received a telegram from Joseph F. Gray, of Savannah, secretary and treasurer of the Savannah chamber of commerce, that he would accept the position offered him, Gov. Brown has announced the appointment of Mr. Gray as a member of the Georgia railroad commission to succeed Hon. S. Guyton McLendon, former railroad commissioner, who was suspended by Gov. Smith and later removed by the legislature.

For some time the claims of South Georgia have been prominently urged upon Gov. Brown. It was set forth that this section of the state was entitled to representation upon the commission. It was also urged by friends of Mr. Gray that Savannah was particularly in line for such an appointment since that city has not had a man on the commission now in existence for over twenty years.

Satisfied of the rights of this section, the governor began examining the qualifications of the applicants from South Georgia and found that Mr. Gray was particularly well equipped for the work which he would be called upon to do.

Gov. Brown wanted a man with railroad experience and yet not too connected with the roads. Such a man he found in Mr. Gray, who had for a long part of his life been connected with railroads. Later his services with the Savannah chamber of commerce had made him most acceptable to the merchants and shippers of the state.

Gov. Brown delayed the appointment only long enough to hear from Mr. Gray, it being feared that possibly he would not want the place, since the man who takes it must necessarily face a court fight with Mr. McLendon, who has been waiting for an appointment to be made to unseat the dogs of war.

When Mr. Gray's acceptance was received the announcement was immediately made. Gov. Brown is greatly pleased with his success in securing Mr. Gray's services for the state. Mr. Gray was given hearty backing by a large circle of personal and business friends.

It is expected that Mr. Gray will come to Atlanta some time this week and will be sworn in and begin his duties as commissioner. It is stated here that the section of Mr. Gray means an end to the effort to secure the sort of port rates which were refused some time ago when Mr. McLendon was commissioner. It is known here that Mr. Gray was opposed to such rates. Gov. Brown also does not subscribe to that sort of port rates.

The selection also means the election of another chairman of the commission. It is generally accepted that the new chairman will be H. Warner Hill. A number of names proposed to the governor for commissioner would have secured favorable consideration had it not been for the fact that the place already had been offered Mr. Gray and the governor was awaiting his answer.

PRIZES OFFERED FOR YOUNG CORN GROWERS.

Merchants Offer \$50 And Congressman Edwards Two-Horse Plow:

Through the efforts of Mr. Ben. S. Mooney, special agent of the farmers' co-operative and demonstrative work, with headquarters in Statesboro, the banks and business men of Statesboro have subscribed a fund of \$50 as a prize to be given to the boys of Bulloch county in the boys' corn contest for 1910. The \$50 will be divided into three prizes, as follows: First prize, \$25; second, \$15, and third \$10. Congressman, who seems to take much interest in the people of this county, has also offered a two-horse plow and several other valuable prizes will also be awarded the boys of the county who enter the contest.

The rules of the contest have been arranged as follows:

Boys entering the contest must cultivate at least one acre of corn under demonstration methods; exhibits must be delivered to the president of the First District Agricultural School by October 22, 1910; the amount of the yield and the method of measurement must be certified by each boy and attested by at least two disinterested witnesses, who shall be satisfactory to the president of the agricultural school. The basis of the award will be as follows:

1. Greatest yield per acre.....\$5
2. Best half bushel exhibit of corn in ear.....25%
3. Best bushel exhibit of corn in ear.....25%
4. Best book account, showing history of crop and all expenses.....25%

Mr. Mooney is desirous of getting everything in good shape for this fall, and urges all the boys who contemplate entering this contest to send in their names to him as soon as possible that he might forward their names to headquarters and have the necessary letters mailed to them from Washington. He is a firm believer in fall plowing and is desirous of getting all the land upon which contestants will work broken this fall, and he also wants the names of all the probable contestants that he might furnish them information as to seed selection, out of this season's crop.

The demonstration work in this county is furnishing much valuable information to the farmers of the county, and the fact that Mr. Mooney is getting the boys of the county interested in the work is taken to mean that he has the interest of his work at heart.

The contest among the boys will doubtless be a lively one, and some extra fine specimens of corn can be expected next year.

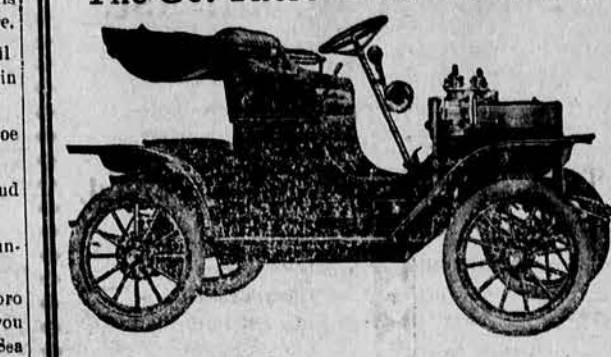
