## MORSE MUST GO TO ATLANTA PRISON

The Court of Appeals Confirmed Verdict of Lower Court Sending former Ice King to Atlanta Federal Prison.

New York.—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals affirmed the decision of the lower federal court sentencing Charles W. Morse, the former banker and steamship capitalist to 15 years imprisonment in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga.

The decision of the circuit court of appeals is final so far as the direct appeal is concerned.

At the office of the counsel for Morse it was said the case would be taken to the United States supreme court and application for bail would be made. In the meantime Morse will be sent to the Tombs prison or he might be sent to Atlanta to begin his sentence unless the circuit court of appeals

in New York grants a stay in the execution of the sentence.

The courts of appeals in the decisions says:

"We fully realize the consequences to the defendant which follow an affirmation of this judgment, and yet we cannot doubt that he was given a fair trial and the verdict was amply sustained by proof. No unprejudiced person can read the record without being convinced that by the defendants procurement the bank (National Bank of North America) bought its own stock and the stock of the Ice Securities Co. and by his procurement the entries in the bank book and in the reports to comptroller as to these transactions were so arranged as to conceal the truth and to record transactions which in reality never took place."

## SOUTH'S WORST HAIL STORM.

DID DAMAGE IN THREE STATES.

Denmark, Tenn., May be Entirely Wiped Out by Storm and Fire.

Atlanta, Oct. 14.—The worst hailstorm perhaps that the south has ever experienced, with its accompanying wind and electrical display, assuming, in some sections, cyclonic proportions, left serious damage to crops and property in its wake through North Georgia, North Alabama and Tennessee late this afternoon and claimed several lives in the latter state.

With wire communication badly crippled in every direction and hundreds of towns in the path of the disturbance entirely isolated, it is impossible with the meager reports received to estimate the damage, but it is believed here that the cotton remaining in the fields in the path of the storm is practically a total loss with the damage to other property running into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Starting about sixty miles east of Atlanta at 5 o'clock, the storm swept northwest and inside of two hours had traversed a large section of this state, crossed several counties in Tennessee and was last reported moving westward over North Alabama. Hailstones varying in size from one to three inches in diameter, fell all the way from Athens, Ga., to Decatur, Ala., and at point in Tennessee.

Denmark, in Madison county, Tennessee, is practically demolished, the added horror of fire following quickly in the wake of the storm, and at midnight it seems certain that the wrecked town will be in ashes. At this place eighteen of the mere modern buildings were torn from their foundations and wrecked, while the smaller buildings were demolished. Of the fatalities, two occurred at Denmark. Albert Barnes and his child, an infant, were caught among the falling timbers of their home and crushed to death. Mrs. Barnes was injured near Mulberry, in Lincoln county, Tenn., Thomas Helm was killed and Homer Ashby and his wife were injured.

Near Wartrace, Tenn., a negro settlement was blown away.

### Registration Books are Open.

The News has just completed the registration books for Bulloch and several adjoining counties, and turned them over to the various tax collectors. The new registration law makes it incumbent on every voter to register six months before any election is held, therefore, in order to vote in next year's primaries you had better get your name on the books as soon as possible. Tax Collector Allen has the books and will take them with him on his rounds for the purpose of registering the names of the voters. Remember you have to register now in order to vote next year. You cannot do as you have done in the past, wait till a few days before the election and register. And you will have to do this in person, there will be no such thing as sending your name in, you will have to subscribe the oath in person.

Better get busy and meet the Collector, who under the law is the registration officer.

## SEABOARD AIR LINE TAKES OVER ROADS

Merger of Tributary Lines With Main System is Announced by John Skelton Williams.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 12.—The Atlanta and Birmingham Air Line railway, operating 237 miles, the Florida West Shore railway, operating 70 miles, the Plant City, Arcadia and Gulf railway, operating 20 miles, and the Tallahassee and Southeastern railroad, operating 39 miles, were merged with the Seaboard Air Line railway as of September 29 and 30, 1909, according to statements given out by John Skelton Williams.

This increases the operated mileage by nearly 400 miles, so that the mileage operated or owned by the Seaboard Air Line from October 1, 1909, will be just 3,000 miles.

These several subsidiary roads have been controlled heretofore, but have been operated separately. Their operations hereafter will be included in the operations of the Seaboard system proper.

Following this statement Mr. Williams added:

"I regret to see that some of the newspapers which do not entirely understand the situation and some of our enthusiastic friends are too much disposed to herald the recent action at New York in electing myself and some of my friends to the Seaboard directorate as a Williams victory. This is not a victory or a defeat for anybody and was not so intended. There has been no fight since the reorganization. It was simply a case of those most heavily and directly interested in the Seaboard getting together to harmonize all interests and to insure sure peace and effective working."

Mr. Williams declined to discuss the future presidency of the road.

### One Inch of Leopard's

Tail is Worth \$100

Macon, Ga., Oct. 14.—The Rollins animal show has brought suit for \$100 against the Southern Express Company as damages for an injury to the tail of a leopard.

The leopard was expressed from Augusta to Macon where the Rollins show was wintering at Central City Park two years ago. When the animal arrived its tail was found to have been crushed to the extent of one inch, beginning at the tip. Later an operation was performed and the injured part was removed.

Owner Rollins, averring that its tail is one of the chief features of a leopard's make-up, seeks \$100 as recompense for the loss sustained by the member of his menagerie.

## SEVERE HAIL STORM DOES MUCH DAMAGE IN CITY OF ATLANTA

Sky Overcast With Yellowish Glow During Outburst of Elements.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 14.—With the sky overcast with a yellowish glow, a fierce rain and hailstorm, accompanied by a heavy wind, struck Atlanta at 5:30 this afternoon, doing considerable damage to plate glass, awnings, skylights, wrecking many chimneys and doing other damage of a minor character.

Many telephones were put out of commission and the telegraph companies report numerous wires prostrated.

Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 14.—The town of Fenmark, Tenn., has been wrecked, two persons were killed, several are known to have been injured and others are missing, as a result of tonight's storm, according to a dispatch received here late tonight. According to the telegram the ruins of the town are burning.

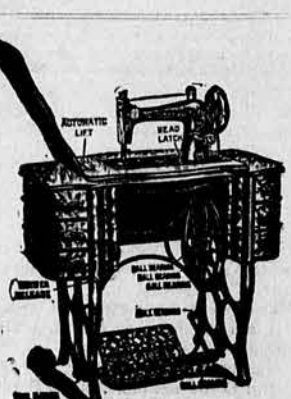

## M'Lendon Wins 1st Skirmish Against Gray

Must Show Cause Why He Should Not be Unseated.

Savannah, Ga., Oct. 16.—Following the hearing of argument on the petition of S. G. McLeod to be allowed to bring suit against Joseph F. Gray, and make him show cause why he should not be displaced from the position of railroad commissioner in favor of S. G. McLeod. Judge Charlton yesterday granted the petition, and Mr. Gray will be obliged to show cause Monday, October 25, why he should not be displaced. The hearing, being a preliminary skirmish of the court, is not to be construed as any great victory for Mr. McLeod, yet, it marks a distinct stage in the progress of the case, and Mr. McLeod won. Those directly interested would not give an expression one way or the other, but there were those outside the case who looked upon the point gained by Mr. McLeod as being offset by the fact that the defense had drawn the fire of the other side, and learned their position, and authorities in the case, and had not disclosed their own.

The decision of Mr. Gray's attorneys came somewhat as a surprise to those in the court room following immediately as it did the able argument of Judge Andrew J. Cobb, who had in turn followed his colleague in the case, the Hon. William D. Thompson, who opened the case for the relator. It had been anticipated by most of those in the court room, at least, that Mr. Gray's attorneys would present some opposition to the pleas of the counsel for Mr. McLeod.

The termination of the case as stated, followed the able argument of Judge Cobb. He had canvassed the case in a thorough manner, dwelling upon the points of law involved and ending with an eloquent statement of the effect of the verdict to be finally obtained.

A very interesting incident of the beginning of the hearing was the entry into the court room together of Mr. McLeod and Mr. Gray. Mr. McLeod, who, on account of his health, used a rolling chair, was met outside the court room by Mr. Gray and assisted up the steps and into the court room. The incident provoked considerable pleasant comment and was an interesting commentary on the personal attitude of the parties in the case toward each other.

With the exception of Judge Candler, all the visiting counsel returned to their homes last night. Mr. McLeod went to Atlanta. Before leaving the city the counsel on both sides were the guests of General Meltrim, of the counsel for Mr. Gray, at luncheon at Bannock Lodge. Those of the counsel who were present at the hearing of the case and who were entertained by General Meltrim were Judge John S. Candler, Judge Andrew J. Cobb, Judge Joseph H. Lamar and Hon. William D. Thompson, of Mr. McLeod's counsel, and Robert M. Hitch, Esq., and Colonel William Garard, of Mr. Gray's counsel.
