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ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS GREATLY BENEFITTED

Red Cross Seal Fund Larger Than Any Previous Year

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 26.—The annual report of the W. G. Raoul Foundation just made public, shows that the anti-tuberculosis campaign work in Georgia during 1915 was extended to over 5700 cities and towns, or in all an increase of at least 200 over the number of communities it reached the previous year. The Raoul Foundation has general charge of the state wide work, but the mission of the Foundation is principally one of the stimulation and scientific direction, the object being not to assume authority anywhere over local organizations but to co-operate and aid efficiently.

The report made by Executive Secretary James P. Faulkner showed also that the annual distribution of Red Cross Christmas seals was very much in excess during the season just past, and that the total this year will be more than \$5,000, an amount considerably larger than Georgia has raised any previous year.

Clark and Bryan.

All there is to the story that Bryan would be likely to support Champ Clark in order to defeat Wilson for the nomination is the fact that one of two active Bryan men have been inquiring around to see if Champ could be induced to run against Wilson. They didn't even go so far as to profess Bryan support. Nor did they approach Clark with the proposition. One can readily imagine how much faith Champ would put in a Bryan proposition after his experience at Baltimore.

Schedule Beginning Sunday Jan. 30

This will deliver freight, express and mail in Statesboro an hour earlier than in now done and will afford a much greater convenience to business concerns, and the traveling public.

HUGHES' SILENCE WORRIES LEADERS

Looked on as Most Likely Choice of Republicans.

CANDIDATES IN THE SENATE

When Democrats Had Long List of Names to Choose From in Baltimore Not One Came From the Senate.

Now All G. O. P. Possibilities Are Senators Except a Judge and Colonel.

Washington, Jan. 25.—(Special).—Four years ago when there were so many Democratic candidates for president none was from the United States senate, although two of the most prominent possibilities were in the house of representatives. This year there are no candidates for president in the house on the Republican side, although there are several candidates and a number of possibilities in the senate.

And yet the impression seems to be that the Republican candidate will not be a senator. Something tells the average politician that the Republican choice will fall outside of the senate.

A Sphinx With Whiskers.

Very seldom do cartoonists put whiskers on a sphinx, but it appears that the sphinx of the Republican presidential situation is ornamented with whiskers.

"That animated feather cluster," as William H. Hearst once remarked, and Hearst grew, for he ran against him for governor and was defeated.

What does Jim Mann imagine he is minor leader? Here is one of his utterances recently: "It is one of the peculiarities of politics that when the Democrats are short of other things they phase Republican leadership." That is always safe. It never takes either acumen, intelligence nor any other attribute which naturally belongs to a member of congress.

Of course if the man to whom that address was anything but a rubber ball he would have been crushed. But it happened to be Congressman William H. Hearst and he was not crushed.

FARMERS USING TELEPHONE SYSTEM EXTENSIVELY

More Than Sixty-Eight Thousand in Use

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 26.—That over 68,000 farmers now have telephones on their farms, in the territory covered by the Southern Bell and its branches, is declared by F. W. Webster, head of the farmers' line department of the organization, in an interesting statement just made public here.

"According to the 1910 census there were in the territories of our two companies 909,450 farms operated by owners," he said. "On this basis, our development, which has been pointed to with pride on numerous occasions, still represents only 7.42 per cent of the owned farms. Twenty years from the time when our first special efforts began for this class of business, which will be 1928, we feel that at least 50 per cent of the owned farms should have telephone connection. This would mean 450,000 stations."

Automobiles and Moving Pictures Tend to Broaden Life

THE automobile and the moving picture, two of the newest material forces in American life, so unlike in themselves, are yet having a similarly tremendous effect on American character. THEY LESSEN PROVINCIALISM AND LOCALISM IN KNOWLEDGE, FEELING AND APPRECIATION. THEY HELP TO MAKE A LARGE CITIZENSHIP.

These are good results, but there are also possible dangers. We must see to it that sensation and sentiment do not kill thought. In other words, that insight is not partially sacrificed to sight.

Our fathers saw little; they thought much. They did not go out into all the world; neither did all the world come into them. They were not the creatures of sensations, but their feelings ran deep.

The pendulum ever swings between the material and the spiritual; between the outer sense and the inner feeling. But at the present moment there is a peril that these two new universal forces are making the people too dependent on the visible and the tangible.

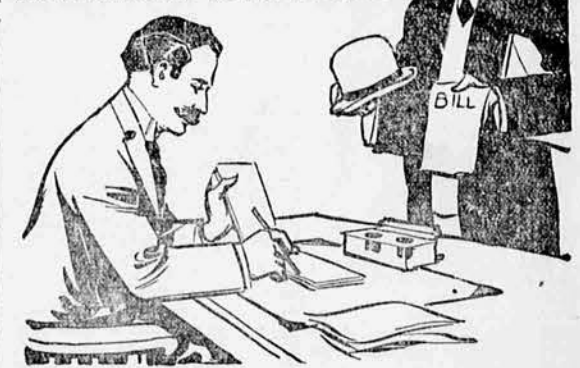

Law Regarding Registration and Branding of Fertilizers

As Construed by the State Department of Agriculture, Contained in Letter From J. D. Price.

To the People of Georgia:

Seriousness of the fertilization situation, affecting both the farmer and the manufacturer, due to the scarcity and prohibitive price of potash, because the supply has been cut off by the European war, has necessitated the most careful construction of the law by the state department of agriculture, for the protection of all interests.

Many inquiries from manufacturers regarding registration and branding of "High Grade" and "Standard Grade" fertilizers, led me to ask the attorney general for a construction of the law.

In my letter to the attorney general, I called attention to the absence of potash; and the new conditions which confront the manufacturers. I also called attention to the more extensive manufacture of ammoniated superphosphate, on account of absence of potash.

In my letter I said the present law covered complete fertilizers, acid and potash mixtures, and acid phosphate but did not seem to cover the sale of acid phosphate with nitrogen (equivalent to ammonia), or ammoniated superphosphate.

I sought information as to whether ammoniated superphosphate containing as much as 14 per cent. plant food could be branded "High Grade" or if it contained 12 per cent. available plant food, could it be branded "Standard Grade."

Replying, the attorney general quoted section 404 of the act of the Georgia legislature regulating the registering and branding of fertilizers. Construing the law, he says:

SUPERINTENDENT'S TALKS TO THE RURAL SCHOOLS

On Subjects of Interest to Teachers and Patrons

The citizens of the Elia school district have "woken up" and are now beginning to build an up-to-date school house. A large two-room building will soon be constructed. They have almost a hundred school children in the community with only one small class room; so they have decided to build one as good as the best in the county. They are taking pattern after the Pauline school, which is one of our very best rural schools.

Prof. A. O. Patrick is pushing the movement to a finish.

Miss Ruth Harville has accepted the principal's place at the Mitchell school. We predict for her a successful term there. The Mitchell school is a new one, modern in structure, supplied with single patent desks and in many ways up-to-date.

There are about fifteen schools that have been able to operate with only one teacher each, heretofore, that now require two to three teachers. We ought to be able to take the school census every other year in Bulloch county, because so many people move into the county from other sections of the state. We have the children to take care of and the other counties have the money that we have had to add to our teaching force to show how greatly the school attendance has increased in the last two years. It will be interesting to see to what extent we have had to increase our teaching force in order to take care of the children now in attendance in the several schools of the county.

The box supper given on the night of the 22nd proved to be successful from a financial viewpoint. At the Bird school the sum of \$50 was raised for the purpose of better equipping the school and to help in paying the building, etc.

The Bird school house is well arranged, and when it is painted it will be one of the prettiest schools we have. The Harville school raised something about twenty dollars for the purpose of installing maps, globes, charts and bubble maps. A movement is on foot to build and equip a new and modern school house in the town of Denmark to take the place of the old Harville school. This will be done as soon as times will warrant such

The most unique character in the United States senate today, and the one who is invariably pointed out to gallery visitors, is the blind senator from the young state of Oklahoma.

Nor is Senator Gore remarkable chiefly because he is blind. He is conceded to be the most brilliant and eloquent senator in the upper house, whose speeches are listened

to with attention and enthusiasm, not only by the crowds that fill the galleries, but by the staid and dignified senators on the floor, as well.

When in action, no spectator, unacquainted with the fact, would suspect him of blindness. He has a trick of holding a piece of paper in his hands and occasionally turning toward it as though consulting notes, which makes the initiated think he is reading it. He is an earnest, energetic speaker, with a resonant voice which is heard in every part of the senate chamber and delivery is emphasized by a wild shaking of the head, which seriously muzzles his hair.

He has another trick. Always when speaking he has a large book on the table in front of him. Upon this he places one hand, while with the other he gesticulates.

The blind senator has to have everything read to him. His wife and his secretary do this for him and it is no easy job. He listens with close attention, and when a point is reached upon which he desires more enlightenment, he insists that other books of reference shall be found and that point elucidated before proceeding further. The reading covers a wide range of subjects and his mind retains what he hears, so that when he takes the floor to make a speech he is as well equipped for the debate as other men who possess all their senses.
