The judges rendered their decision in favor of the affirmative side.

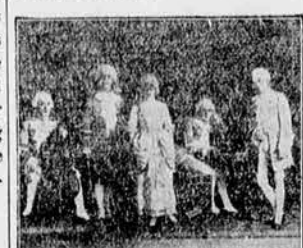

Atlanta Police Round up Violators Prohibition and Gambling.

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 9th.—The recent arrest of the manager and headwaiter of a big local hotel and their arraignment in police court for serving whiskey in the restaurant, coupled with numerous other arrests for prohibition violation and gambling, are taken to indicate that the Atlanta police department is entering upon a campaign for more rigid enforcement, or rather a more active enforcement of the law.

Only a few days ago five business men, including one proprietor of a store on Peachtree street were arrested for a quiet little poker game going on in the basement of the store, and numerous other so-called social games where money was being bet have been pulled recently.

Particularly with regard to prohibition it looks as if the police are going to endeavor to enforce rigidly the present laws as a sort of preparation for the enforcement of the stricter laws which will become operative in May.

## PRES. WILSON BEING URGED TO VISIT GEORGIA.

Young Mens Democratic League Sends Special Invitation.

Atlanta, Ga. Feb. 9th.—Atlanta democrats are making every effort to bring President Woodrow Wilson to Georgia during his speaking tour. The Young Men's Democratic League at its annual meeting passed resolutions looking to this end, and Col. Walter P. Andrews, the newly elected president of the league has sent a telegraphic invitation to Mr. Wilson.

In his speech Colonel Andrews at the annual meeting called attention to the fact that four years ago, when he presided at a league breakfast when the Governor of New Jersey was the guest of honor, he introduced him as the next president of the United States.

Colonel Andrews was also one of the Wilson managers for Georgia in the national presidential campaign, and is regarded as one of the strongest Wilson men in the south.

Colonel Andrews believes that Wilson today is absolutely without democratic opposition in Georgia, and that many southerners who lean nationally toward republican principles have also been converted to the Wilson administration policies.

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## GO-TO-SUNDAY-SCHOOL-DAY

Next Sunday February 13th. Gov. Harris Issues Proclamation

The Georgia Sunday School Association which is a co-operative organization of the Sunday Schools in the State, irrespective of denomination, and whose object is helpful and brotherly co-operation for more and better Sunday Schools, months ago agreed on February 13th as "Georgia Go-To-Sunday-School Day."

The information comes that more than one thousand Sunday Schools have already indicated their willingness to use the program which is being furnished free by the Georgia Sunday School Association, 1519 Hurt Bldg. Atlanta.

The Governor of the State has issued the following proclamation: To the People of Georgia:

Whereas the supreme need of our state today is the spread of a true intelligence among its citizens which shall direct the forces that make for character; and

Whereas one of the noblest means of disseminating this intelligence and building up a character in keeping with the teaching of a true Christianity is the Sunday School; and

Whereas the first State-wide "Georgia Go-To-Sunday-School Day" was observed with marked success on February 14, 1915, at which time the Sunday School attendance was greatly increased; and

Whereas in an effort to increase Bible study and produce Christian citizenship, the Georgia Sunday School Association has appointed February 13, 1916, as a "Georgia Go-To-Sunday-School Day"; and

Whereas the Sunday Schools of all denominations will observe this day with appropriate exercises and are issuing invitations to all our citizens to attend Sunday School; and

Whereas it is desirable that all those who feel an interest in the welfare of the State should work in harmony to produce the best results in citizenship;

Therefore, I, Nat E. Harris, Governor of the Commonwealth of Georgia, call upon all Georgians, as well as visitors within our borders, to attend Sunday School in the church of their choice on February 13, 1916, that those engaged in carrying on these schools may receive due encouragement and find the work of their hands prospering in the service of their God.

In Testimony Whereof, I have caused these letters to be made patent and the seal of the Commonwealth to be hereunto affixed. Done at Atlanta, Georgia, on this 2nd day of February, in the year of our Lord One Thousand, Nine Hundred Sixteen, and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Fortieth.



## Military School Training Helps Make Better Men In Peace

THE word militarism has now become so formidable that the word is used to shrink from anything approaching it when the word is used to mean only self defense.

We do not want militarism in this country, but every citizen should be prepared in some sort of soldier training so that he can stand side by side with the trained soldier and understand the discipline of concentrated action. THIS CAN BECOME A MATTER OF SECOND NATURE IF BEGUN EARLY ENOUGH. THE VALUE OF SOLDIERLY HABITS CANNOT BE OVERESTIMATED.

The boy who has had some soldierly training has made habits persisting thereto. He knows how to be "on the job."

If we had better soldierly training of boys we would have better business men. Hundreds of boys are turned out from our public schools and high schools into the business world who do not understand the first principles of obedience. They have a mistaken view of the importance of things. They do not know how to take their tasks.

IT IS NOT NECESSARY TO MAKE EVERY BOY A SOLDIER, BUT MAKE HIM SOLDIERLY. WHEN YOU HAVE MADE HIM SOLDIERLY YOU HAVE MADE HIM SELF RELIANT, SELF SUSTAINING.

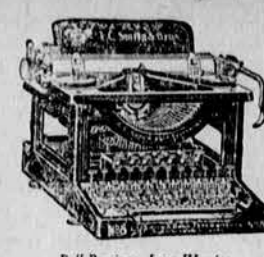

## WHO WILL BEGIN A CANVASS THEREAFTER

Another Party Headed by Brooks Simmons, W. G. Raines, W. H. Sharp, K. H. Harville, W. L. Zetterower, and Others Will Visit Moultrie

Again Next Tuesday

Was there ever a more urgent necessity and more direct proof of the monetary value of a meat preserving industry than has been physically demonstrated to the great majority of Bulloch's farmers since the holidays? Weather conditions have varied so whimsically that just when a cold spell was thought to be of several days duration, justifying a general killing of hogs, and then to suddenly rise to a mid summer temperature, and presto change, spoiled meat of untold valuation. In order to arrive at some definite basis by which the promoters of the proposed plant may be guided as to the supply of hogs that might be available next fall, and further, to secure data regarding the great amount of meat that is lost every season, to that end The Statesboro Board of Trade invites the co-operation of all farmers who are interested in the movement and earnestly requests that every farmer who reads this article will comply by filling out the coupon printed on this page and forward it as directed. It will be an authentic source of information thru which a determination may be arrived at as to the amount of money that should be invested to properly handle the project for the first year. The information asked for will be held strictly confidential as individual data, and made public only in total figures whenever the subject requires. With this issue The NEWS presents opinions of those members of the Board of Trade who constituted the committee that visited Moultrie recently.

### WHAT THEY SAY ABOUT IT

#### Bulloch County's Salvation

It's reasonable to assume that every farmer, business and professional man in Bulloch county during the past twenty four months has devoted much of his time and study to our questions relating to economics in his mode of living while searching for some means to improve his earning capacity; so that the discussion of any subject which has for its object improved conditions must be at this time of greatest interest.

Observation has convinced me. Bulloch county needs some other means of making a living than raising cotton, the price of which is practically made in Liverpool, and to lead our people from this single cash crop plan, presents one of the most productive fields for missionary work to be found. The interest in any plan of salvation should be especially seen and most thoughtful consideration given to the remedy offering relief.

I will give my views in as few words as the importance of the subject will permit.

Cotton at best is by no means a sure crop, furthermore it is a long vexatious crop from planting to marketing, and although apparently profitable when the demand is good and price well above cost of production. It is an expensive crop because as a general proposition when cotton is high and as that it is going at the same high figure.

As it stands now this county bears close resemblance to Birmingham and the coal mine section of Alabama when the demand for coal and iron is poor.

The cash crops of that section of Alabama are coal and iron and when the price of these materials are

low it matters not for what reason their business in that section is at a stand still just as it is here now. Birmingham and that section is crowded with business now for her products are selling at good figures and in demand. The world at war is crying for coal and iron and are paying the price and will I predict for several years to come.

We, in the cotton belt have had our mind on clothing the world in cotton, but they don't seem to need enough of it and I believe we should turn our attention to trying to feed them as well.

Twenty years ago every merchant large and small kept plenty of meat and generally made it a leader for his other wares. For the past five or more years one is lucky to find meat in any but the larger stores and they long since could afford to give away.

Meat of all kinds is scarce and undoubtedly will be so for years to come. The prices are governed by supply and demand and therefore I am convinced Bulloch county in order to wear the mantle of prosperity must turn a fair part of her attention to raising meat.

The census of 1910 shows that we've butchered in Bulloch county over 350,000 hogs in twelve months and I have good reason to believe more could be killed this year.

I said so-carrying cotton that it was an uncertain crop, the same is true of hogs and where the house is necessary for the storing

and sale of cotton, the hogs must have the same aid to market; them to advantage.

On a recent visit to Moultrie, Ga. I saw a plant, killing, curing and selling on an average five hundred hogs for six days in the week, eight months in the year and then some. I saw the people of Colquitt county and surrounding counties as well as nearby counties in Alabama getting away from the one cash crop cotton. The people I saw selling hogs were getting cash, good hard cash at that and they were well satisfied at the results of their labors, and to prove it they were improving their town with beautiful streets, the county with excellent roads, the farms with new fences, barns, houses and better stock.

To make this change from all cotton the citizens of Moultrie and Colquitt county united together in a firm determination to build a packing plant to kill and cure all the hogs they thought would be afforded for sale, but they can't begin to do so.

This county should build a plant that can handle not less than 48,000 hogs per year and I firmly believe such a plant could be supplied with this number of Bulloch county hogs with in the next five years and the Bulloch Packing Plant will be recognized as the county's salvation.

As one of the group of men who visited the Moultrie plant and one who went there in a measure a skeptic, I can frankly say that I returned converted to the firm belief that we of Bulloch county can more than duplicate the success of those people of Colquitt. There may be possibly some such enterprises some where in the country that have not proven successful, if so, I do not know it, but I do say that a visit to the Moultrie plant will very quickly convince one that if conducted as that plant is, such a word as failure is impossible. While it may not at the beginning pay a big dividend to stockholders, it certainly would not lose any money for them but it would prove one of the biggest assets to our farmers and business community that could possibly be promoted and we should lose no time in pushing it to a reality.
