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## THE CRUCIAL MOMENT

Statesboro is at the apex, or as possibly more aptly termed by Mr. Bland in his letter last week regarding the packing plant, "We are at 'The Forks of the Road,'" disaster on one prong and success on the other. If we take the right step and build a packing plant against the day of adversity, thereby developing a stock raising instead of a cotton producing country. I can see no good reason why within a few years we should not have one of the richest counties in the state." Mr. Bland's remarks are opportune. After weeks of missionary work through the columns of the NEWS and personal efforts by members of the Board of Trade and several enterprising citizens who dedicated their time to personal trips to Moultrie on tours of inspection and investigation, the subject has crystallized to formal organization and a stock selling campaign. The substantial and reliable farmers of the county and Statesboro business men have joined hands, so to speak, in a determined effort to put this project through on a sound financial basis and on plans looking well to the future progress that the enterprise will beyond all question endow to the material benefit of every citizen of the county, be he stockholder, merchant, banker, broker, or just an ordinary laborer. If every man would but realize the great productive wealth this enterprise will bring to the community and join in a wholehearted united effort of push, to bring this industry to an actual fact, there would be no semblance of chance connected with it. This self same industry has made more individual millionaires, and enriched more communities than any other one commercial pursuit in America. Bullock county is particularly adapted to, and gifted with resources requisite for obtaining almost unlimited results in this field. Statesboro is most advantageously located from a geographical standpoint to handle the project successfully covering a wide area of territory.

## Items Concerning the County Schools

Miss Zulime Lane has accepted the principal's place of the Reedy Branch school, succeeding Prof. C. Harmon, who resigned on account of ill health. This will be the third time Miss Lane has taught in this school. She is well and favorably known in this section.

A strong "Mothers Club" has recently been organized at Register, which will be heard from right soon. They propose to immediately install up-to-date single patent top desks in the school and a modern bubbler font. What the ladies go after they get. You may look for things to happen in the way of school equipment and general improvement in the Register school right soon. This school is progressing nicely under the management of Prof. R. T. Pigue and Mrs. Beatrice Lee. It is hoped that before very long these people will erect a modern brick school building which no doubt they will do when financial conditions become normal again.

One of the most elaborate Washington Birthday programs was rendered at the Sylvester school on the 22nd instant that it has ever been my privilege to witness. The Newcastle school combined with this school and the program rendered was appropriate in every way and unusually well rendered. An address was delivered by Prof. L. D. This school is being taught by Misses Ruth Proctor and Carrie Jones. There was an average of 77 this month.

More than fifty dollars was raised by the box supper at the Rimes school Saturday night. This is the school that was destroyed three times last year. These people are very liberal when it comes to helping the school to get back on the map. Miss Leona Groover is teacher. She has a splendid school this term.

The Mill Creek school is being painted now. This is a new three room building that is one of our very best. When the painting is done they propose to fence the school grounds and cultivate trees and do general school gardening. Prof. W. T. Womack is principal and Miss Mary Fields is assistant.

Teachers will meet on the second Saturday for their regular institute work. The same program that was arranged for last meeting, Feb. 12th, will be carried out on this occasion. Let all the teachers attend. The board of education will meet the first Saturday, as is advertised, to approve teachers pay.

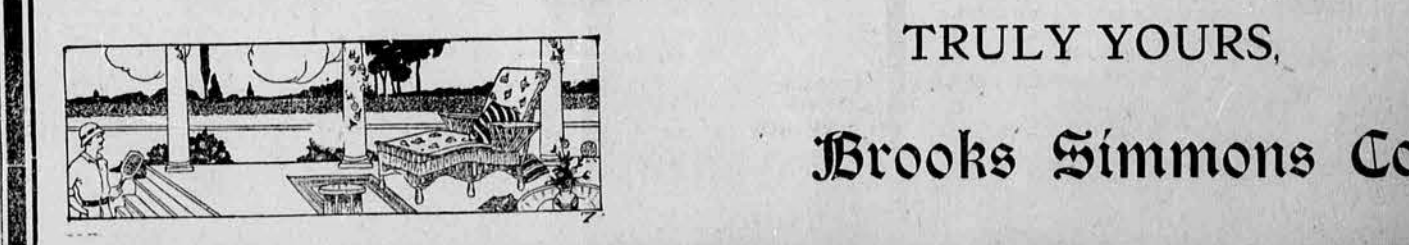

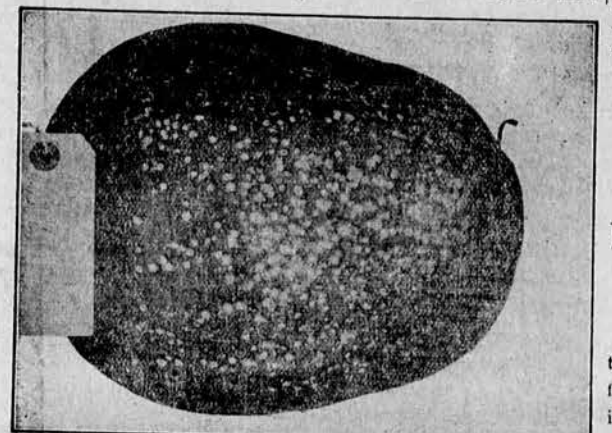

Bordeaux Mixture the ingredients of which is Copper sulfate 4 pounds, combined as otherwise clogging of the spray nozzle might result. Quicklime 4 pounds, Water to make 50 gallons. Watch carefully for the leaf-spot and then spray

thoroughly. In any case spray two weeks before maturity and a second a week later. Prepare the copper sulfate by suspending it in a gunny sack just below the surface of several gallons of water in a clean barrel. When the sulfate is dissolved, which requires three
