**State Colleges and Common Schools**  
Appropriations Are Decidedly Unequal Says Keesee.

Atlanta, Ga., August 31.—Appropriations for state colleges during the last several years have increased 100 per cent, while those to the common schools show an increase of only nine per cent, according to Keesee, of Atlanta, who is making the race for state superintendent of schools. Mr. Keesee, in his speech before the Georgia State Board of Education, said that the state of Georgia appropriates \$125 annually for a boy at college and only \$4 a year for the country child, he declared Mr. Keesee. "Why such a great difference? One child in five of the public school pupils go beyond the seventh grade. Only one in thirty-five of the public school pupils graduate at a university."

Mr. Keesee, in his speech before the state, has presented many ideas for constructive work in Georgia's schools, and he says if he is elected he will put these ideas into execution. He said that the state should "make more and better schools" is one of his slogans.

A circular letter dated Aug. 29th over the signature of E. F. Bledsoe, General Manager of the Central of Georgia railway is addressed to all employees in unaffected departments of the railway. The letter is dated Aug. 29th and is an advertisement and the same date invites applications from non-union trainmen. Both are issued by the railway.

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**ATLANTIANS BURY CITY POLITICS**  
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Forrest Adair, who was one of the principal figures in Mr. Candler's victory, will speak on "How to Reclaim a City from Political Dependence." He will stress that it is possible to elect a Mayor without resorting to certain tactics that at times have made the office unattractive.

Five-minute talks on the real estate outlook in Atlanta will be made by the members of the Real Estate Board. President Otis, of the board, has sent invitations to all real estate agents of the city.

**ELECTRICITY WASHES MONEY.**  
Paper money is laundried when it becomes dirty from continuous use. Thousands of dollars of greenbacks and yellowbacks of all denominations are now being washed daily by the United States Treasury Department in specially built electrical washing, drying and ironing machines. Constant use of bills become dirty and grimy in a short time. To destroy such bills and issue new ones when they were not otherwise damaged was found to be expensive and highly inefficient. Machines were therefore installed into which dirty and crumpled bills are introduced at one end to come out of the other end in a couple of minutes looking like new. One of these machines is motor-driven and capable of washing, rinsing and pressing 6,000 bills an hour.

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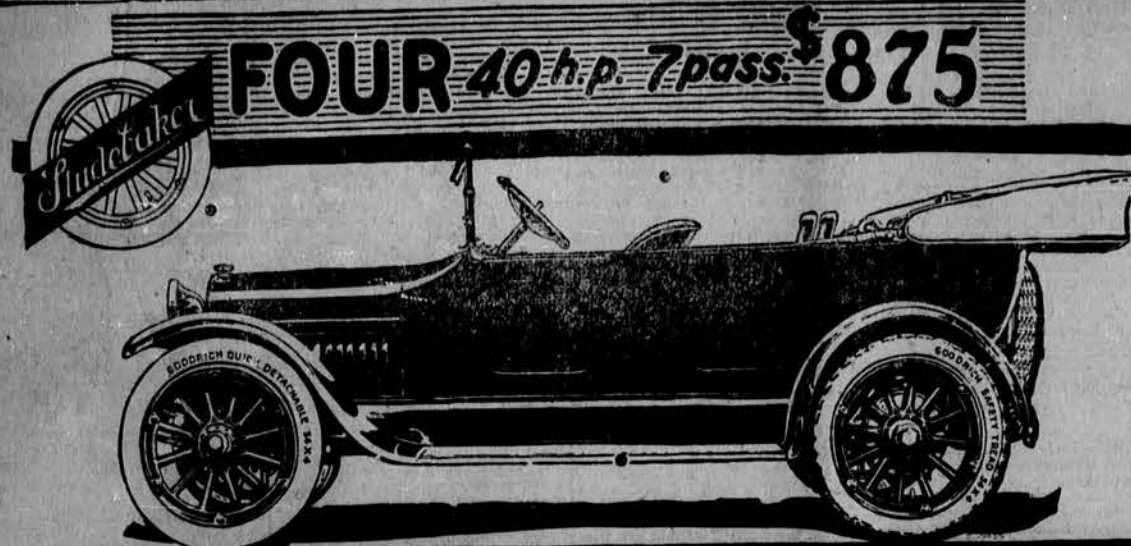

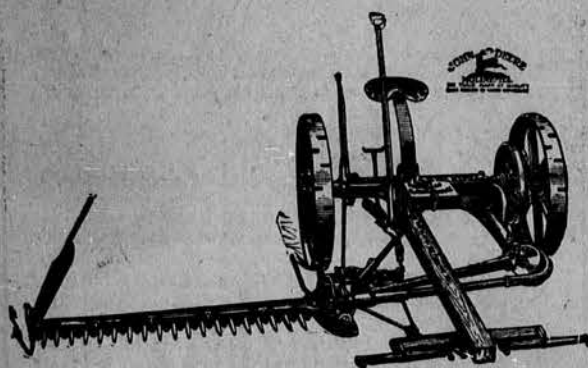

### CANDIDATE JIM PRICE TOO BUSY WITH HIS JOB

As Commissioner of Agriculture to Spout Politics.

Atlanta, Ga., August 31.—Commissioner of Agriculture J. D. Price may not go on the political stump after all, in advance of the coming state primary. While he has not fully made up his mind whether or not he will make any political speeches, he says just now there is plenty of state business to keep him from going without climbing the stump to talk to the boys.

Commissioner Price spent several days this week in southwest Georgia, in Early, Quitman and Randolph counties, attending the special boll weevil meetings which are being held under the auspices of the state board of entomology of which he is chairman. Meetings of the same kind are to be held next week in Stewart, Webster, Marion, Chattahoochee and Muscogee counties in all of which the boll weevil has been found active this year, and wherever possible Commissioner Price expects to attend them.

In these counties the boll weevil is no longer a theory, but a condition, and the farmers have got to use every possible means which they can command to meet and counteract the evil. While the experts are stressing the various methods of con-

trolling and suppressing the pest, Mr. Price is advocating the "live-bomb" and diversification plan, which has proven so successful in battling with the weevil wherever the farmers have followed this advice. By a combination of the two methods farmers in many sections of South Georgia continued to secure profitable yields in spite of the weevil and its activities.

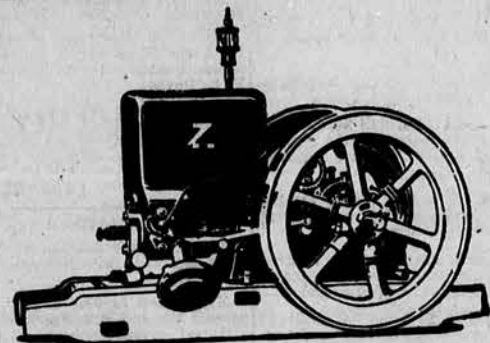

### OPENING OF HIGH SCHOOL

The opening exercises of the Statesboro High School will be held Monday a. m. Sept. 4th at 9 o'clock. All patrons and prospective students are invited to be present.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Education and Superintendent the following resolution was passed:

Students who have in the regular term made an average of seventy per cent or above and who have attended the summer school and received a passing mark will be conditioned to enter the next higher grade for one month on probation without examination. Students failing below a yearly average of seventy per cent in the regular term must take examination on all subjects in which he is deficient whether he has been in attendance of summer school or not. All students who have not attended the Statesboro summer school and thereby making up the deficiencies from the previous years work must of course take the entrance examination before entering the next higher grade. Entrance examination will be conducted on Sept. 4th and 5th.

# Georgia's Next Governor

### SOME THINGS HE HAS DONE:



Dr. Hardman introduced and pushed through the Legislature the law providing for the free distribution by the State of the treatment for hydrophobia, or mad-dog bite; 6,487 cases have been treated, only two of three cases proving fatal. Thousands of human beings have been saved from horrible deaths, and more than a million dollars in money has been saved to the poor people of Georgia by the benevolent provisions of this one act. Dr. Hardman was also author of the law providing for free distribution of diphtheria antitoxin, which has saved 10,000 children from the ravages of diphtheria, and vast sums of money to the people.

He introduced a measure looking to the free treatment of tuberculosis, and advocated and worked for the bill establishing the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Alto. He was author of the bill regulating professional nursing; introduced the first vital statistics bill in Georgia; advocated and worked for the creation of the State Board of Health.

He was author of Georgia's first prohibition law, the famous Hardman-Covington-Neel bill of 1907, which first banished the legalized liquor traffic from his native State, and coupled his name forever with Christian statesmanship.

He was author of the bill extending suppression of diseases among livestock, which means the saving of a million dollars each year in Georgia; he advocated a drainage commission, with a view to the reclamation of the 2,000,000 acres of waste lands in the State; and in 1907 he advocated and introduced a bill to create a state highway commission, which the Federal Government required the State to establish this year.

He was author of the law requiring that agriculture and civil government be taught in the common schools of Georgia. Read the following extract from an address delivered before the County School Superintendents' Association at Macon, May 11, 1903, by Dr. M. M. Parks, President of the Georgia Normal and Industrial College, Milledgeville, praising the Legislature for the enactment of this measure. Said he:

"In my opinion this will prove in the years to come to be the most important legislation of the session of the General Assembly of 1903. The measure was passed quietly and without public notice. It did not receive a one-hundredth part of the publicity given to the convict lease question and yet it probably means much more for Georgia. It did not attract a one-hundredth part of the attention given to the Uniform Text-Book bill and yet in its far-reaching effects it is probably destined to exercise greater influence in enriching the State and in properly modifying our educational theories and practices."

"The legislator voted for this law, no doubt thinking it would be a means of improving the farms of Georgia; but the modern educator believes that it will serve not only for the improvement of the farms of Georgia but also for the improvement of the boys of Georgia; and not only a practical but also an educational value in this movement; he sees a movement which answers to the sociological demands of education as well as to the pedagogical."

Following this law of 1903 and following the address of 1903, there was a great deal of discussion of agricultural education. In 1906, the Legislature established the South Georgia Agricultural, Industrial and Normal College, the eleven district agricultural schools, and appropriated one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) for the agricultural building at Athens. (Dr. Hardman was chairman of the building committee expending this appropriation and is now president of the board of trustees of the state agricultural college.)
