
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"LARKLAND" WILL FURNISH BIG FUN FOR VISITORS TO ATLANTA FAIR

SOUTH ANXIOUSLY AWAITS BIG FAIR

Prepares For First Southeastern Exposition Oct. 14, \$60,000 CASH PREMIUMS.

Grounds Near Atlanta Almost Completed—Grand Circuit Race, Agricultural, Educational, Automobile and Other Shows Attracting Exhibitors "Larkland" Veritable Cony Island.

Atlanta—Work is nearly completed for the opening of the Southeastern Fair, Oct. 14. At an expenditure of \$60,000 the association has converted Lakewood Park, a suburb of Atlanta, into an ideal fair ground.

The coming of the Grand Circuit race is an event that has revived interest in harness racing in the south. The 1916 season will be closed here with six days of racing for purses aggregating \$25,000, besides numerous trophies.

The cattle show will be national in its scope. The American Rural Live Stock Show, the year's famous stock show, and the Omaha Swine Show will

be here. In addition the most reputable cattle and swine breeders of the south will exhibit for the \$17,000 in premiums.

The sixth annual Georgia corn show, the boys' corn show and three crop contests and the girls' canning club will be combined in one gigantic exposition. Cash and commercial prizes are offered.

In the Liberal Arts building visitors, particularly the farmers, will have an opportunity to study modern farm implements and methods. Applicants to the school, state superintendent of schools, has charge of the educational exhibition. Competitions will be held in essay work, drawing, sketching and domestic science work for county, city, town and high schools.

Every woman in the south is interested in the women's department. Mrs. Samuel Lumpkin of Atlanta has charge of this. Contests will be held in all kinds of needlework, embroidery, painting, drawing, stenciling and domestic science. A model cottage will show all modern comforts.

The fair association has arranged for two distinct exhibitions of horseflesh. The first is the contest for light harness horses, saddlers, draft horses and second will be the evening horse show, the social feature.

The automobile show will be the biggest ever staged in the south. The poultry and rabbit show is attracting every variety of utility and fancy birds.

Now for the amusements. "Larkland" will be a veritable Cony Island with speeding coasters, the "Old Mill," twenty high class carnival attractions free vaudeville and hippodrome attractions each evening.

Each evening there will be a magnificent fireworks display. For the opening day of the Grand Circuit a souvenir key pin is being sold. These may be obtained at any county or town bank. They will pass the holder to the fair grounds and at the same time entitle him or her to a change on a \$100 automobile.

R. M. Strickland, secretary, is being besieged with entries in every department and demands for floor space for the commercial exhibits and automobile show. From indications \$20,000 will be attracted to the opening, and it is believed there will be a daily attendance of 25,000 or more.

The Central of Georgia Railway will maintain an excellent service to and from Atlanta.

## TWO CENTS WORTH OF ELECTRICITY ON THE FARM

Ten years ago central station electricity retailed for 18 and 20 cents per kilowatt in some communities, and was not obtainable at any price in most farming districts. Since then, improvements in electrical machinery and the extension of high power transmission lines and the development of great power projects has brought electric power into hundreds of farm homes at a price within reach of the humblest farmer's purse. The rate is usually between 10 and 15 cents per kilowatt today, and recent improvements in motors and lights make the consumer's money purchase more light and power than it ever did before.

At 10 cents per kilowatt-hour, the price usually charged, engineers of the General Electric Company have figured that the price of a postage stamp will buy enough electricity to: Milk ten cows. Churn 20 pounds of butter. Separate 1400 pounds of milk in a cream separator. Do two large family washings. Heat an electric flatiron for half an hour. Run a sewing machine for one hour. ## Plant a Patch Of Alfalfa This Fall

Should Be Preceded By Cowpeas And Lime  
Andrew M. Soule, President Georgia State College of Agriculture  
One desiring to sow alfalfa in fall should undertake to prepare the land as soon as possible. We prefer the cowpeas as an improvement crop to use on land intended for alfalfa because it will mature in sufficient time to be turned under to good advantage. This should be done when the peas are in good condition to make into hay. It would be good practice to put at least two tons of crushed raw rock on the land before sowing the legumes. If this has not been done it is suggested that as soon as the cowpeas are turned under that at least two tons of lime be applied and harrowed well into the soil. The land should be worked as a fallow from the time the peas are turned under until September 15 or October 1. If there is a heavy frost in the soil at the

time, sow the alfalfa, using about twenty pounds of re-cleaned western grown seed per acre, and inoculate it very carefully. Sow on a cloudy day. A strong sunlight will often kill the bacteria of the inoculating material. We would fertilize the land with two sacks of cotton seed meal and 400 to 600 pounds of acid phosphate. These ingredients should be mixed together and put on the soil before the seeding is done. Harrow the fertilizer into the soil. Some peash could be used with excellent advantage under alfalfa, but it is now impossible to secure it by reason of the European war. Therefore, one must take the best of the existing situation and use such fertilizing material as is available. The alfalfa should not be grazed or cut during the fall.


