ELECTRIC BRIEFS

Electric vehicles water the streets of Blackpool, England. Green bananas are ripened by electric heaters in fruit warehouses. Miss Kathleen Parkin, a California girl, fifteen years old has constructed a wireless outfit which she used expertly to send and receive messages. The new battleship "Tennessee" will use 27,500 electrical horse power, enough power to furnish heat, light and power for a city of 100,000 inhabitants.

A self waving flag which waves regardless of wind or weather has been invented by engineers of the General Electric Illuminating Laboratories. Intercommunicating telephones, electric lights, call bells, and a complete fire alarm system of American in modern farm buildings on the estate of a wealthy Long Islander. Electrically-driven musical instrument makers will combine with electrical manufacturers, central stations and contractors in the celebration of "American Electric Week" December 2-9.

FIND SALE IN HOLLAND.

SAYS DUTCH DEALER

That American automobiles have satisfactorily filled the gap in Europe caused by the discontinuance of automobile manufacture by the big war, is the opinion of Anton P. Ceurovoort, Overland and Willys-Knight dealer at Amsterdam, Holland, who is also the distributor for these two cars in the land dikes and windmills. He has just completed a visit to Toledo factory of the Willys-Overland Company.

"Before the war," said Mr. Ceurovoort, on his trip to Toledo, "there were only four makes of American automobiles sold in Holland. Today scarcely an American car lacks representation."

"We sold more Overland and Willys-Knight cars during the past year than ever before; in fact, our sales would have been tripled had we been able to get the cars."

Unfortunately, shipping facilities to Holland have been uncertain. 90 per cent of the space on board steamers bound for this country is used by the Dutch government for its own needs.

"In Holland," continued Mr. Ceurovoort, "the system of automobile taxation differs from the one in our country. Over there we are taxed according to the bore and stroke of the motor; thus, an Overland Model 75-B with 16 motor of 3 3/8 inch bore and 5 inch stroke is taxed \$80 per year. The Overland Model 85-B with 24 motor of 3 3/8 inch bore and 5 inch stroke is taxed \$100 per year. The Willys-Knight Model 84-B and the Overland Model 86 sell for \$2,000 in American money."

"The Willys-Knight car finds a very big market in our country. Unlike the situation in our country, the Knight motor is a very well-known motor in Holland, due to the fact that the Daimler, Minerva, Mercedes and Oldsmobile, all Knight motored, have found a ready market in Holland. However, all these cars are very expensive, costing from \$4,000 to \$5,000. Naturally, when we can sell the same sort of a motor in a car for \$2,000 we can find a market for it without the slightest difficulty."

Mr. Ceurovoort estimates that in Holland, a country of six million inhabitants, there are about 7,000 registered automobiles.

One of his pupils, Diogenes, who was a joker as well as a philosopher, upon hearing this, immediately left the class. He reappeared shortly, bearing a plucked Rostand rooster. Holding it at arm's length, he exclaimed: "Here is Plato's man!" and the class in the Grove Academy roared.

But Plato precluded the possibility of a repetition of the joke by adding the words, "with broad, flat nails," to the definition.

Since Plato's time, many and various have been the definitions of a man.

He has been likened to almost everything: from a son of the sun to a son-of-a-bitch, to a bit of a rascal and a cheese paring. Generally speaking, the popular conception of what constitutes a real man was based upon the idea of leadership. We thought he must excel, he must have an unbending will that bends all minds to his own. But alas and alack, how often do we find that the leader becomes a menace to progress.

The lesson resolves itself to the teachings of the gentle Nazarene. He who mingled among the most lowly. There is no story so fascinating, so gripping, so lasting, as the one which is as old as man. Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 30.—That the repeal of the Federal statute permitting U. S. THOMAS E. WATSON CREATES SENSATION
