1916 AUTO RACING SEASON CLOSES

Final Classics at Ascot and Santa Monica Win Championship for Goodrich

Chicago, Dec. 12.—In a burst of speed, fitting to end the season of the fastest automobile driving the world was known, 1916 automobile racing established Dario Resta as champion driver, and Goodrich Silvertown as the champion tires.

World records came literally fast and furious in the dying days of the season. First at Santa Monica, where Resta by winning the Van der Vliet Cup, won the premier honors of the season, and the A. A. A. trophy, and again on Thanksgiving Day at Ascot, when Resta captured the 150-mile final race for the championship, wonderful time was made.

In the final classic Silvertown tires wound up their season in a blaze of glory. Resta, who had won the distance in 2 hours, 13 minutes and 1 second over the hardest track in America, Silvertown took him in the way. Silvertown equipped cars won more than 80 per cent of the prize money positions in the 1916 season and more than \$210,000 in prize money.

In all these races Silvertown's ethereal, established a world record, a new track record or a new record for the event.

The official award of the championship will be made during the course of the next few weeks by the American Automobile Association.

CANNING CULL APPLES.

New Recipes For Utilizing Windfall and Unmarketable Fruit.
(Prepared by United States Department of Agriculture.)

New recipes for utilizing windfall and cull apples for home use are being furnished to canning clubs by the office of extension work north and west, states relations service. There are many ways in which such apples may be made into valuable and palatable food products, such as apple sauce, preserves, apple butter, etc. The new recipes which follow are for canning apples whole, to be sliced for pie and quarts for fruit salads.

Only reasonably sound fruit should be used. Injured or decayed parts and overripe fruit should not be canned. Wash apples, remove core and stems (pare if desired), place whole apples in blanching tray or cheesecloth and blanch in boiling water for two minutes. Remove and plunge quickly into cold water. Pack in large empty

PLANTING ONION SEED

I am now preparing the ground to plant onions. First I put two tons of stable fertilizer to the acre down in the old water furrows, having the rows about three and a half feet apart. The land that I am going to plant is growing a crop of corn from the pass and stable fertilizer. This will mix the fertilizer with the soil, then I will take a good turning plow and throw two furrows together, then when my peas come off I will take a six-inch shovel and plow out those peas middles and apply tons per acre of stable fertilizer in the water furrows. I will then take a turning plow and throw two furrows from one row. When onions are large enough to transplant, then I will draw them out and set out in the onion rows about twenty-one inches apart. They can be worked as deep as you wish. By this method anyone can grow fine large onions—C. E. Kates, Roxie, Miss., in Southern Ruralist.

LIVING ON A SIX-ACRE FARM

I moved here January 6th. I had no money, but good health and a will to work. The first thing I did was to borrow \$50.00 to buy a milk cow, as I had none. We only had one horse, a brood sow and forty-three chickens, and had the feed for our stock to buy at war prices. I then proceeded to get my garden in shape, as I am trucking for the local market. I had forty-five one-horse loads of land manure from town, two miles, and saved all I could at home besides. I planted two acres in corn, two in sweet potatoes, one-fourth in Irish potatoes, a half in sorghum and Spanish peanuts, three-fourths in watermelons and cantaloupes, and one-half in garden truck.

The two acres I planted in corn was the poorest land in the country, so with a small turning plow and followed with a four-horse team I turned the same furrow. After running a log over it to break the clods and firm the ground, I laid off rows forty and a half feet apart and ran the log over it again. I could not tell where the rows were when I started through until the corn came up. When the corn got knee high (which I thought it never would) I put 150 pounds of blood and bone to the acre, cultivate, level, and at laying by, which was about the time it began to tassle, I put 100 pounds of cotton seed meal to the acre. I gathered seventy bushels of as good corn as I ever saw. My neighbors across the line only made ninety-five bushels on six acres, and had far better land. He used barn manure on three acres, and cut down his corn on three, but did not prepare his land at all—not so much as to cut his old corn stalks, and laid by with turning plow on a high ridge. I find it always pays to put land in good shape before planting.

Now for my year's harvest. I have two good milk cows and one heifer. My sow has brought three litters of pigs. She has nine four weeks old from a registered Berkshire male, and five came the first of February, which will more than make my meat. I will have plenty of potatoes in the field to fatten them. We have 125 grown chickens, and one horse, with sufficient hay and corn to go on next year. The wife has provided for the winter by putting up 97 quarts of tomatoes, 24 cans of okra and beans, about 40 jars of figs and peaches, and we also have plenty of butter, buttermilk, and eggs. We will sell enough cane to buy my syrup, and have lots of sweet potatoes besides, and best of all, we don't owe anyone a cent.

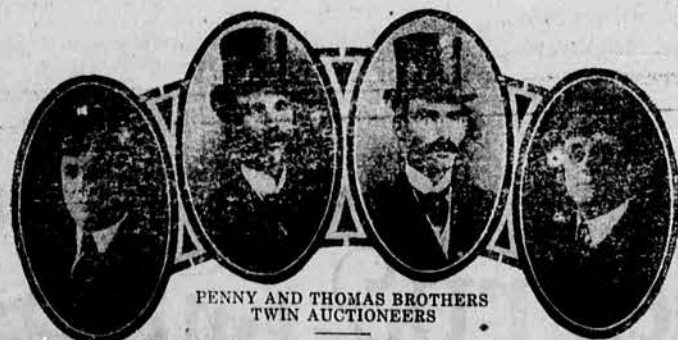

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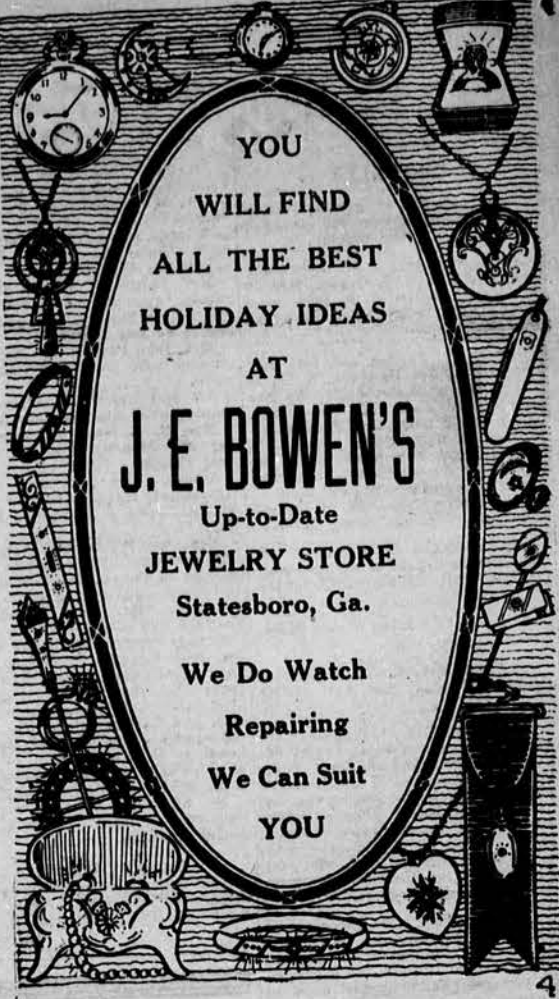
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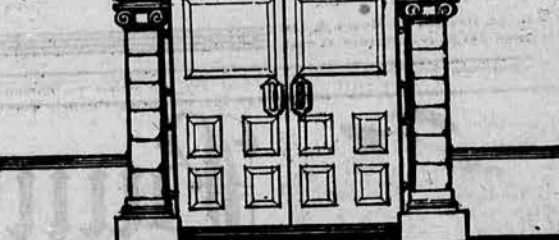

Loomis, Scout Executive, and Mr. Samuel Gompers, International President of the A. F. of L., and has received the endorsement of the investigating committee.

The committee is finally convinced that the Boy Scouts of America do not sanction attacks upon the Trade Union movement, but are heartily in accord with it.

"We find that the leaders of the Boy Scout Movement of this vicinity are men of sterling character and have the welfare of the boys' future at heart; they have invited representatives of the Trade Union movement to take an active part in helping them to make better men and citizens of the boys. We also heartily endorse and approve the recommendation of our investigating committee."

"This rule is a national one and is as old as the organization itself. Any one who represents the organization as taking sides in questions involving these subjects, or anyone who attempts to distinguish in any way between the members or adherents of the organization because of their attitudes or affiliations in these respects, is in violation of the rules."

"What any man, individually and personally, may say or do is not in any way affected by the rule of the character of the Boy Scout organization."

The aims, methods and scope of Boy Scout training are clearly set forth in the official literature of the Boy Scouts of America, copies of which have been given you. In Boy Scout training the whole effort is to cultivate manliness, generosity, resourcefulness, sound character and genuine democracy among growing impressionable boys during their participation in wholesome recreation.

This is accomplished by training in the following respects: (1) By the exercise of a boy's abilities and initiative by inviting his allegiance to the organization and by the leadership of capable, broad-minded men of fine sympathies and motives. If the boys bring together a host of attempting anything else is not only a severe blow to Boy Scout training, but a severe blow to the community as well.

"We confidently hope that your investigation will reveal the fact that Boy Scout training is in reality a movement without class, po-

"The Committee is going to present the following recommendation to the Executive Council meeting of the Boy Scouts of America on December 11, 1916:

"That the Massachusetts State Branch, F. of L., endorse the Boy Scout Movement and that officers of the G. L. U. and local unions shall keep in constant touch with the Movement, so as to prevent its activities or purposes being directed toward the interests of labor movement or militarism in any form, and matters affecting the rights and interests of the working people; the Boy Scout Movement be urged to a constantly closer and more sympathetic attitude toward the organized labor movement, in its work and struggle for the achievement of a higher material, political, moral and social standard for the toilers of our State."

Some 800 weekly newspapers have been obliged to suspend publication owing to the high cost of paper so the Secretary of the California Press Association reports. If the government investigation now on in Washington does not bring relief America will be long to be entirely without the country papers.

The new administration lost no time whatever in grappling with the paving proposition which has been uppermost on the public tongue for some weeks culminating in a petition of several hundred signers of property owners praying for it. The new Mayor and council have instructed the city attorneys to draft an ordinance covering a special bond election for the purpose of defraying the cost of this much needed street improvement.

ALL EYES ON CHICAGO

(From Macon News)

Expert investigators operating in Chicago where the prices of foodstuffs are fixed for the entire United States find there is little or no excuse for the present carnival of extortion. With more wheat at hand than has been the case for many years, even after Europe's needs have been supplied, with more corn for stock-fattening purposes and more live stock than at any period during the regime of the last administration and without adequate excuse.

If, as charged, the Chicago speculators have "autocratic control of basic prices through the mediums of the Chicago board of trade, the Chicago butter and egg board and Elgin board of trade," the situation is susceptible of immediate correction. The federal government has the power and the necessary law is doubtless already in the statute books or can be readily placed there. Gambling in stocks may be a defensible proceeding from an economic standpoint, but gambling in the necessities of life, a game in which the ultimate consumer is always the lamb to be slain, is a moral crime and ought to be a legal one.

President Wilson is reputed to be preparing to grapple with the high cost of living problem, the most important domestic question he has confronted. There is no doubt the Chicago situation will early engage his attention if the nation-wide hold-up centers there as the experts appear to have convinced themselves. Certainly no more promising field for government inquiry and governmental action is offered.

ONE CENT POSTAGE

The special committee having in charge the revised postal rates have completed their work and the bill is now ready to be reported to the house. It carries a provision for 1c postage and raises the rate on mail order catalogues from 2 to 8c a pound. This feature will no doubt meet with lobby opposition by the interests of the great mail order houses. We reprint the bill as completed in committee:

Washington, Dec. 9.—One-cent postage for local first-class mail deliveries, and a zone system of rates for second class matter, which is expected to greatly increase the charges for magazines and other periodicals having a nation-wide circulation, are provided for in the annual postoffice appropriation bill as virtually completed today in committee.

The measure carrying appropriations totaling about \$327,000,000, probably will be reported to the House next week.

Under the one cent postage provision the rate on letters

and other mail matter of the first class when deposited in any postoffice or branch postoffice or letter box or postoffice in the delivery district, for delivery within the limits of the postoffice, city or rural delivery district, would be cut in half.

The zone proposal for handling newspapers and magazines, which now pay a flat rate of one cent a pound, is regarded as one of the most radical changes in postage rates in years. It divides the country into eight zones, with rates chargeable ranging from one cent for 300 miles to six cents for 1,800 miles or more. The bulk of daily newspapers, the committee believes, will not be affected, because they do not circulate beyond a 300-mile radius. The provision follows: "That all newspapers, magazines, and other publications regularly admitted to the mails as matter of the second class, when mailed by the publisher, shall hereafter be subject to the following rates of postage, the zone system now applying to parcel post matter to be adopted also to second class matter:

"Local, first, second and third zone (under 300 miles) 1 cent per pound.

"Fourth zone (300 to 600 miles) 2 cents per pound.

"Fifth zone (600 to 1,000 miles) 3 cents per pound.

"Sixth zone (1,000 to 1,400 miles) 4 cents a pound.

"Seventh zone (1,400 to 1,800 miles) 5 cents a pound.

"Eighth zone (over 1,800 miles), 6 cents a pound.

"Provided, the free-in-county circulation provided by law shall continue as at present.

"The postmaster general shall have authority to require publishers to separate their mail into zones when offered for mailing."

Among other provisions, the bill increases the rates for mail order catalogues from 2 to 8 cents a pound, making them third class matter, instead of parcels post; rates the limitations on promotions of clerks and carriers in first and second class postoffice; broadens the postmaster general's authority to deal with lotteries, drugs and poisons; and increases the rural mail delivery appropriation by \$4,000,000 over the \$49,000,000 recommended by Assistant Postmaster General Blakale.

Chairman Moon of the postoffice committee, said today that the bill still is subject to change before being reported, and that the question of hearings on the proposed pneumatic tube service appropriation was in abeyance.

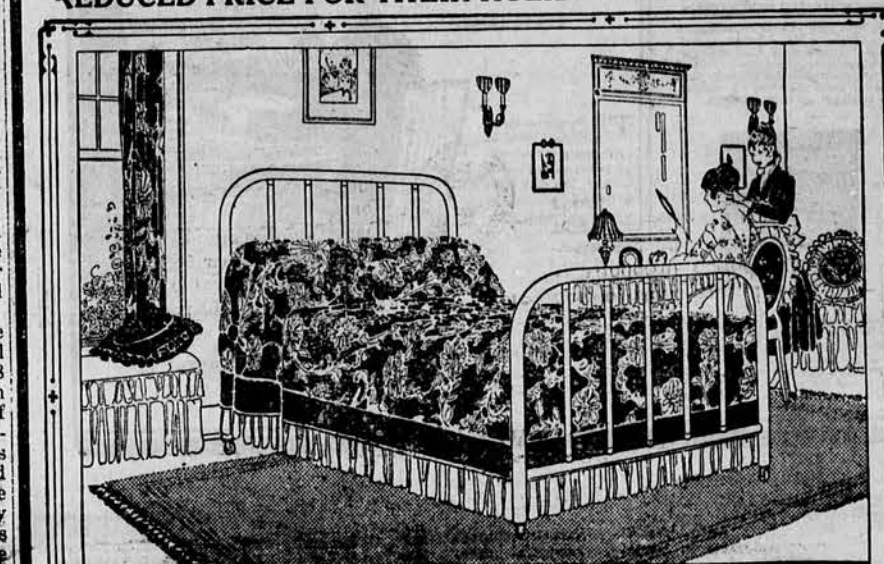

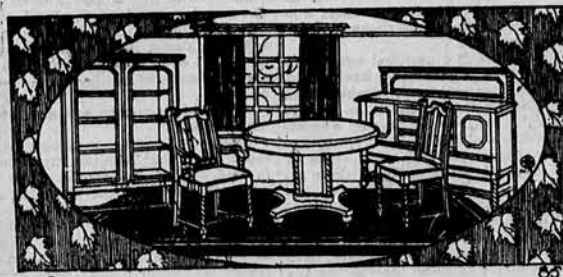

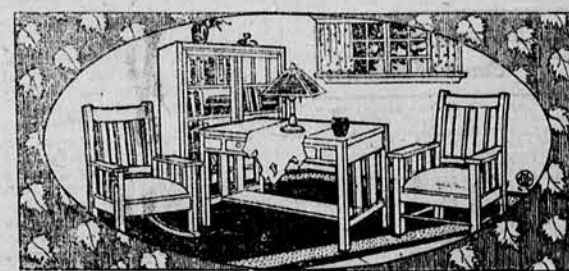

ASA G. CANDLER CHARACTERISTICS

Atlanta's New Mayor Displays Family Affection

Atlanta, Ga., December 21.—Hardly a night passes when Asa G. Candler, the south's richest multi-millionaire and Atlanta's next mayor, who goes in office on January 1, doesn't make the rounds of the homes of his children in an automobile and kiss them good night, according to his friends who are acquainted with his habits. One of Mr. Candler's predominant characteristics is his absorbing affection for the members of his family.

Although Mr. Candler's time is probably of more value, from the standpoint of dollars and cents, than that of any other Atlanta business man, the citizens of this city have secured his services for at least two years at the nominal salary of \$4,000, paid by the city government to the occupant of the mayor's office. Moreover, Mr. Candler has promised to give his entire time to the work if he finds it necessary to carry out his plans.

While Mr. Candler has invested millions of dollars in real estate and other interests in various cities and states, his principal holdings are here, for he is a great believer in home investments. He has bought hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of Atlanta real estate at top prices in times of depression, in order to sustain the market, and he has extensive interests in other lines, including a controlling interest in the two largest banks in the city, the Candler warehouse, stock in the Southern States Life Insurance Company, of which Mr. Candler is director; a number of railroads, and other enterprises too numerous to mention.

Will Lock Horns for Speaker-ship of House

Atlanta, December 21.—That the situation in which the state of Georgia now finds itself with regard to the Western & Atlantic railroad will be one of the big issues in the race for the speakership of the 1917-18 house of representatives is made plain by the recent statement issued by Representative N. F. Culpepper of Meriwether county, who is opposing Representative W. H. Burwell, of Hancock county, for re-election to the speakership, in which he blames Representative Burwell for the failure of the constitutional amendment prohibiting the construction of a line of road parallel to the Western & Atlantic, to pass the house in 1916.

Representative Culpepper declared that the house would have passed the proposed amendment, forever preventing the construction of a parallel line, if the rules committee had let him, if the rules committee had permitted it to come to a vote; and he further declared the rules committee, of which Speaker Burwell mittee, of which Speaker Burwell was chairman, would have placed the amendment in a position where it would have reached a vote. The gentleman from Hancock had exerted his influence in its behalf, "instead of exerting himself to secure the passage of a dangerous bill providing for the sale of the Western & Atlantic, which the rules committee did bring to a vote and which the house defeated by an overwhelming majority."
