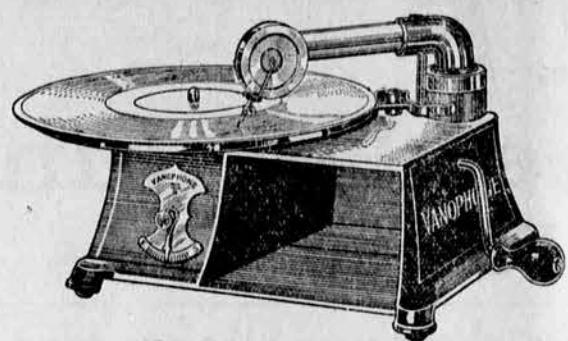

LINKING RUSSIA WITH PARIS

Wireless Station on the Eiffel Tower to Be Used to Communicate With Czar's Empire.

The wireless station at the Eiffel tower may be utilized to communicate with Russia from Paris, via British stations to the Mediterranean, instead of by way of German stations. But the Eiffel tower, however, could easily get its messages to Petrograd direct, for it is the most powerful station on the continent. The terrific "parking" from its antenna more than five hundred feet above the ground, is so distinct that those conversant with the Morse code can read its time and weather reports in the streets of Paris without any instruments. But there is no powerful wireless station in Russia, and the roundabout route will be necessary. The British government is building a station more than five hundred feet above sea level in a remote part of Oxfordshire, which will have a dozen masts, each as high as St. Paul's cathedral. This station will be able, it is anticipated, to get into direct communication with Egypt in the daytime, and possibly with India at night, when the ether is always a better carrier.

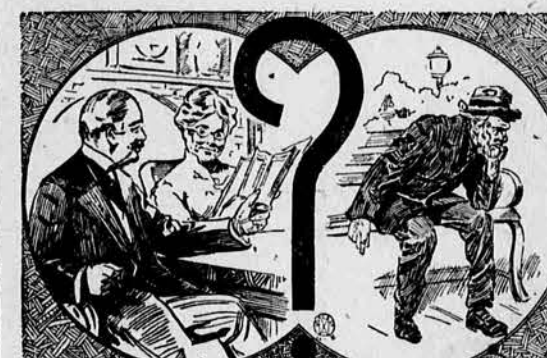

Farm and Garden

GROWING VEGETABLES.

Information as to Soil and Methods of Seed Planting.

(Prepared by the United States department of agriculture.)

Carrots are very small and grow very thickly because the seeds are very small and germinate very slowly. An excellent plan is to sow a few radish seeds with the carrots so as to mark the row and make earlier cultivation possible. Two good varieties are early scarlet horn and Chantenay.

Cauliflower is the most delicate member of the cabbage family. With it the flower is the part used for food. It does best in cool, moist climates.

The greatest success is likely to come if the heads start to form before or after the long hot summer days. It is raised in practically the same manner as cabbage.

Celery should be kept growing steadily all through the season. Any check in its growth—such as frosting, wilting at transplanting time or insufficient supply of moisture—is likely to cause it to go to seed.

Chard or Swiss chard is an excellent plant for providing greens during the

late summer. It has leaves that resemble beet leaves, except that they are a light yellowish-green. The leaves are prepared the same as spinach and the stalks and midribs are used the same as asparagus.

Cucumbers.—The earliest cucumbers are raised by sowing the seed in dirt lands about a month before seed can be sown out of doors. A heavy soil is preferred for raising a good crop for pickling. Almost any of the various strains of the white spine will do well. For pickling the Chicago pickling and Boston pickling varieties are very popular.

Egg plants require a long season and a high temperature. In our hot dry summers they will do very well if the plants are started early. The fruits are mostly black or purple in color, of rather variable size and shape. They are usually sliced and fried for serving. New York purple is a good variety.

Endive is raised as a very early crop in spring, but better as a late fall crop. It is blanched in order to reduce its bitterness and make it more palatable. Blanching is done in two or three weeks by tying the tops together. Endive is often stored for winter use in the same way as is celery.

Horse radish is a perennial plant, but is generally grown as an annual. It is raised by planting root cuttings about four or six inches long with the tops about three inches below the surface of the soil and about eighteen inches apart in the row. These root cuttings are the lateral roots trimmed off of the large roots when they are harvested. The roots should all be harvested at the end of the first year taking care not to break off any side roots that would be left in the soil, of the horse radish will become a very bothersome weed.

Kohi rabi is the member of the cabbage family with an enlarged stem. It is often called turnip rooted cabbage. It is raised by either transplanting the plants for early use or sowing the seed outdoors and thinning to about six or eight inches. In quality it is superior to turnips.

LIME-SULPHUR SPRAY.

The simplest form of lime-sulphur solution and probably the best for you to experiment with is the so called self boiled solution, says the Orange Judd Farmer. This is made of eight pounds of stone lime, eight pounds of powdered sulphur and fifty gallons of water. It is best made in large quantities because a large amount of heat is developed by the lime than if only a small amount is made at once.

Supposing you want to make 200 gallons of the mixture, put thirty-two pounds of stone lime in a barrel or tub with five or six gallons of water. As soon as the lime begins to slake vigorously put in thirty-two pounds of powdered sulphur. Stir constantly and add more water as needed, so that it forms a thick paste and is thoroughly heated. When the boiling has stopped and before any red or orange streaks appear in the mixture add several gallons of cold water to cool it. Strain it, dilute the 200 gallons and the mixture is ready to put in the spray machine and apply. The other forms of lime-sulphur solution are somewhat similar, but are made by boiling the mixture in a kettle.

Speed of Separators. A good deal of loss of butter fat has been occasioned by the fact that cream separators often are run at too low a speed. The manufacturers have determined at what speed the machine will run at highest efficiency, and this is ordinarily marked on the crank. Most farmers, however, merely estimate the speed without timing themselves, and according to official observations they usually turn too slowly and lose from 2 to 50 per cent of the butter fat. A speed indicator similar to the ones in use on automobiles is now being used on cream separators, so that the proper speed may be ascertained and the machine efficient.—American Agriculturist.

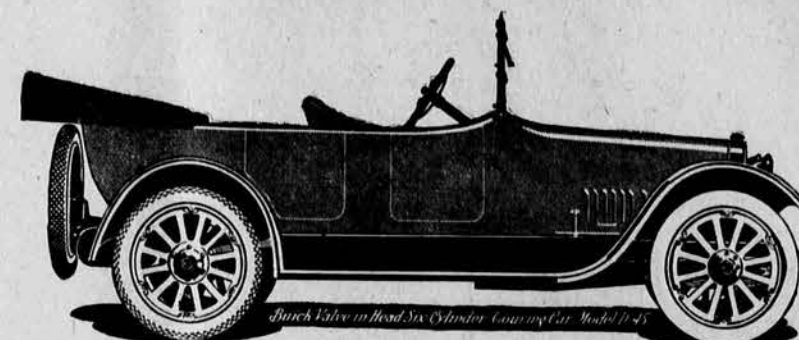

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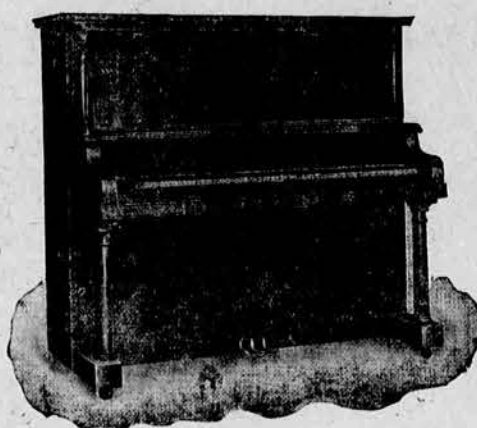

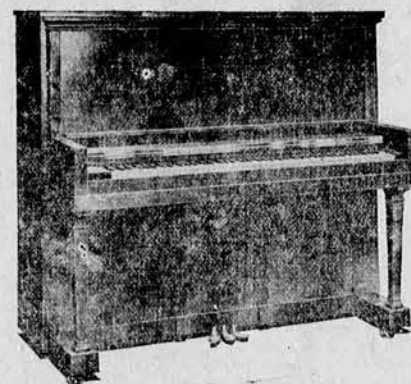

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THOUSANDS DIE NEEDLESSLY IN SEARCH OF HEALTH

National Tuberculosis Association Tells Who Should Go West

From 10,000 to 15,000 consumptives go West in search of health every year. Such is an estimate made by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis in a statement issued today based on recent investigations of the United States Public Health Service. The Association concludes that there are at present between 100,000 and 200,000 consumptives in the states of California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Colorado.

Investigations were made during the past year by surgeons of the United States Public Health Service, P. M. Carrington in California, E. A. Sweet in Texas and New Mexico, and A. D. Foster in North and South Carolina. The National Association draws the following conclusions from these studies:

(1) Thousands of consumptives, attracted by the climate, migrate every year to the West and Southwest. While no definite figures can be procured, the facts ascertained would indicate an annual migration of at least 10,000 and possibly 15,000 into the states of California, Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas.

(2) From 30 to 50 per cent of these consumptives are hopeless cases and die within six months after their arrival. The percentage of those dying within 30 days running as high as 15.

(3) A large but unknown percentage die in almshouses or are the recipients of charity, and the great majority of these could have been made comfortable in their last days if they had stayed at home among friends and relatives.

(4) From 40 to 50 per cent of all deaths from tuberculosis in the West and Southwest are natives of other states, nearly 50 per cent coming from Illinois, nearly 50 per cent from Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee and New York.

(5) People who can afford it and who are not in too far advanced stages of tuberculosis will find the climate of the West and Southwest an aid in the treatment of tuberculosis.

(6) No one should think of going West or Southwest for his health unless

Items of Interest Concerning People and Things in the State

Atlanta, June 23.—J. J. Flowers, who lives near Lumberton, recently caught a white possum, with eleven young ones. This is the second white possum caught in this section of the country during the past few months. The other was captured by John Parker.

Atlanta, June 23.—Farmer lads who are yearning to come to the city will be interested in statistics just prepared showing that of 2,000 bank clerks and men in similar clerical positions in large cities, only three per cent were found to be free from physical impairment or harmful habits.

Taking 2,000 city clerks with an average age of 33 years, 13 per cent had hardening of the arteries, a disease which usually comes only with old age, five per cent had organic heart disease and 28 per cent had kidney trouble.

Most of this constitutional weakness and impairment is said to be due to confining occupations, lack of fresh air and exercise and living in the artificial surroundings of city life.

The cities produce some of the best athletes in the world, but they are the exceptional men who have opportunity and leisure to find regular exercise in the gymnasium or at the country club. The average young city clerk soon becomes the physical inferior of his sturdy brother in the country.

Atlanta, June 23.—The 1915 session of the Georgia assembly opened at the capitol Wednesday morning with appropriate exercises and much speculation as to what the next fifty days will bring forth in special legislation and in disposition of the various standing problems which confront the state.

The legislators view the Western & Atlantic issue as perhaps the biggest and most important single business matter which they will have to deal with. The prohibition fight will also cause a good deal of interest.

The inauguration of Governor-elect Nat E. Harris will take place on Saturday. It will be one of the most elaborate of recent years and will include a big parade, since about 2,000 citizens of Macon are planning to come to Atlanta on a special train Saturday morning to aid in honoring their fellow townsman and bidding God-speed in his journey at the helm of Georgia's ship of state.

Atlanta, June 23.—Radical changes in curriculum that will raise Brenau college at Gainesville to a still higher rank in education circles, and will put the Georgia institution on a par in every respect with the greatest institutions of the east, have been announced by Presidents H. J. Pearce and T. J. Simmons, following the commencement exercises.

The conservatory which has heretofore been operated jointly with the collegiate department, has been chartered as a separate institution and the scope of its work has been materially enlarged; the preparatory department to the college branch has been abolished, and the teachers' course has been approved by the state board of education so that graduates of the college who are preparing to teach will hereafter receive the state license with their diplomas.

State Superintendent M. L. Brittain appointed Dr. H. W. Odum, of the University of Georgia, to go over the course of study thoroughly and Prof. Odum a few days ago recommended the granting of the state teacher's license to those who complete their pedagogic studies at Brenau.

Atlanta, June 23.—One of the most interesting bills that will be introduced during the present session of the legislature is that prepared by Col. Walter P. Andrews, representative from Fulton county, requiring that the United States flag be flown during the school term from the building grounds of every building in Georgia which in any way uses state funds.

The passage of such a measure would put the Stars and Stripes over the University of Georgia, the agricultural colleges, the public schools, the rural schools and practically every school in the state.

Col. Andrews' idea is that the continued display of the flag will help in still principles of patriotism into the hearts of the children and students.

In a recent address before the Eiks Col. Andrews declared his belief that all children from their earliest school training should be taught to respect and revere the stars and stripes and should have explained to them the true and broadest interpretation of the real meaning of patriotism.

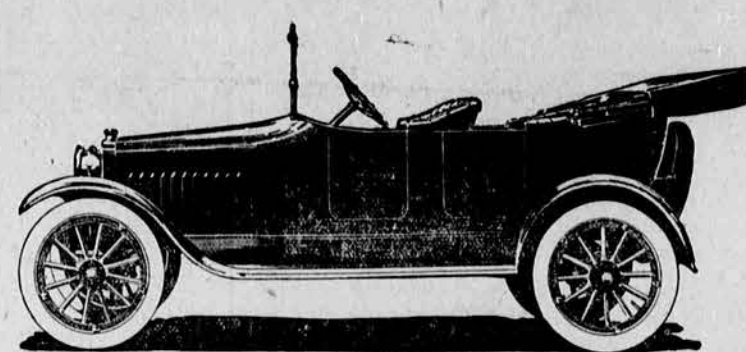

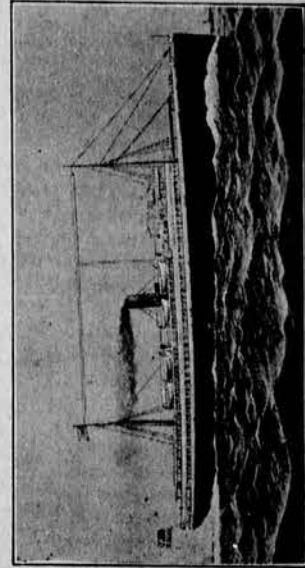
