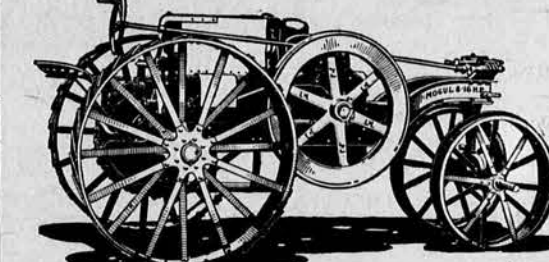

EXTRA SESSION TO CON- VENE ON NOV. 3

Soft Drink Fight to Be As Conspicuous As Real Prohibition Fight

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 27.—Governor Harris has issued his proclamation convoking an extraordinary session of the general assembly, on Wednesday, November 3, and statements published here today to the contrary notwithstanding; the proclamation is not so worded that it will "be impossible to get an action on the soft drink tax bill." It is known that it has been the governor's desire all along that nothing be brought into the extraordinary session which would be material for a filibuster, or would string the session out unnecessarily long, but, as he himself is known to have said, it is not his desire that the legislature shall be bound by technicalities.

That portion of the call which covers the inclusion of the prohibition issue is so worded that it applies to any measures which will amend the existing act or acts prohibiting the sale of alcoholic liquors, therefore, it is held in official circles that the Stark soft drink bill would not be inclusive under that feature of the call nor is it taken that such was the intention. At the same time that portion of the call which provides for legislation on appropriations is sufficiently broad to include—in fact, to practically necessitate—that attention be given to matters providing for the state's revenues, and under that soft drink bill is administrable. It is known, too, that it is the intention of Judge Stark to introduce and pass the bill in that connection, and that he has taken the position that its provisions will furnish the state an avenue for revenue.

Atlanta, Sept. 27.—Governor Harris, in announcing today the date on which he will direct that the extra session of the legislature convene, has changed his mind from the original intention. Some days ago he made the statement that he would direct that the session convene on the first business day in November, which would be Monday, Nov. 1. Today the definite announcement was made by the governor that, in issuing his proclamation, he would call the session to meet on Wednesday, November 3.

Atlanta Sept. 27.—The statement published this morning from Judge W. W. Starke, of Commerce, chairman of the house temperance committee, that he intends to urge to passage his soft drink tax bill has already served to indicate quite clearly that the soft drink fight is going to be pretty nearly as conspicuous in the legislature when it meets in November as the prohibition fight.

The question was raised today of whether or not, under the general call, Judge Stark would have the right to introduce his bill. On a study of the question, it is found that he will have that right, particularly in view of the fact that it pertains to revenues, and local bills related to general subjects may be introduced for the specific purpose of revising county revenues in the event of the near by tax being eliminated by passage of a prohibition bill.

POSTOFFICE FORCE BUSY WITH CATALOGUES

Fourteen Truck Loads are Handled and Dispatched In a Day.

Eight men under the supervision of Assistant Postmaster Greene, including clerks and laborers, were kept busy from 9 o'clock yesterday morning until 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon unloading and dispatching 20,000 catalogues shipped here for mailing by a big New York mail order house.

The catalogues arrived Saturday afternoon from New York. The shipment made up an entire box car load. The catalogues were removed from the car in the Central of Georgia Railway yards, hauled in fourteen doubleteam truck loads to the Central and Union depots and there mailed to points throughout Georgia, South Carolina and Florida. The entire shipment of catalogues weighed about 58,000 pounds and the postage amounted to over \$1,400.—Savannah Morning News.

understood that whatever action the legislature may take at the extra session, an understanding exists whereby the state's revenues for the year 1916 will not be changed. What these conditions are is not known, but it is taken that the effect of the bill which the legislature will pass is not going to bear on the state treasury until after next year. Whether that plan will go through, when the entire membership of the legislature gets into a fight over the question is another matter. It is true that one desire is to pass the prohibition bill and make it become effective January 1, 1917; another is to make it effective April 1, on which an effort to compromise until July 1 has been made. Under the latter information it is now taken that there is quite probably some tentative agreement that the bill will not be made effective until Jan. 1, 1917. No definite information is obtainable on that however, at this time.

On the score of Judge Stark's proposed soft drink tax, though, it is pretty clear now that a far more stubborn fight will be made to defeat the bill than was made when it was introduced at the regular session, and at the same time Judge Stark is more earnestly determined than at that time to pass it.

NEW LOCAL OPTION BILL

Another element which enters into the situation is the definite information today that a new local option bill will be introduced simultaneously with the prohibition bills, and a strong fight will be made on the floor of the house to have that adopted as a substitute for all the suggested prohibition bills. The terms of this bill have not been announced, but it is understood that it is so drawn that it will give Georgia "ironclad prohibition" if the people vote for it at the next general election, while, if they do not vote for that, it will give the counties separately the option of voting on the sale of beer and the operation of restricted clubs if they desire.

In the course of the week it is likely that a great deal more will develop of the several plans that have been talked of, since much of what is intended has been held back until after the governor shall have issued his official proclamation convoking the extra session and outlining its business.

AMERICANS SAVING CASH

National Parks Consolation for Those Accustomed to Summer Abroad.

In a recent interview Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, expressed himself as gratified with the public interest in the development of our great National Parks. "The number of visitors has been steadily increasing," he said, "but this summer's travel will be far ahead of other seasons. As the magnitude, beauty, and healthfulness of the parks are better understood it may be expected that the yearly travel to them will rapidly increase. Thus, the damage caused by the war is being neutralized by inducing Americans to spend money at home. The whole country is the gainer by this intermingling of the people of the East and the West.

Secretary Lane's modest estimate of "at least a hundred million dollars" that Americans are saving to America this year is indeed, conservative in comparison with the figures compiled by Lockwood Bass, editor of the Wall Street Journal, who finds that the 600,000 Americans who go abroad each normal year spend in passage money alone, nearly \$87,000,000. Most of the steamship lines, of course, are foreign.

"It is quite impossible," he continues, "to get even a fair approximation of the amount of money tourists spend while abroad in hotel bills, railroad, steamboat, and other forms of transportation, gratuities, etc. An estimate by one who came in contact with a representative part of the regular summer exodus of Americans to Europe places the amount of money spent in this wise at a very conservative minimum of \$220,000,000.

"It is not inconceivable that the class of travelers made up of multimillionaires alone, if they were particularly extravagant and gratified too many of their whims, might spend in this way enough to bring up the total easily to the \$500,000,000 mark."

"Of course nothing approaching this saving is being spent on American scenery this summer. At least, however, it is kept in America.

WILL DISTRIBUTE 200,000,000 CHRISTMAS SEALS

American Red Cross Plans to Beat Record Sale of 540,000,000 in 1914

Two hundred million Red Cross Christmas Seals are now being printed and distributed by the American Red Cross and The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, according to a statement issued by the latter organization today. The proceeds from the sale of these seals will go for the fight against tuberculosis in the communities where the seals are sold.

The organization of the Red Cross Seal sale this year will take in every state and territory of the United States, including Hawaii, Porto Rico, and the Canal Zone. By December 1st, over 500,000 workers, men, women and children, will be engaged in the campaign.

The sale in 1914 broke all previous records, totaling over 55,000,000 seals, an increase of 22 percent over 1913. After deducting all expenses, this left nearly \$500,000 for tuberculosis work in this country. The money has been and is being expended by over 2,000 different agencies who benefited from the sale in amounts ranging from \$100 or less to over \$25,000. The American Red Cross announces that it will continue its previous successful policy of charging only 10 per cent of the gross proceeds to state anti-tuberculosis associations, thereby encouraging local work.

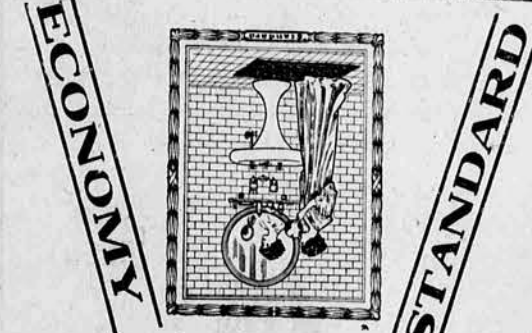

\$5,000 SUBSCRIBED
