The Mayor's proclamation follows: Whereas, Hon. Nat E. Harris, governor of the state of Georgia, has seen fit to designate Thursday Nov. 18th as Georgia Products Day, urging upon the citizens to join together in Georgia Products dinners, exhibits, parades, etc., intended to further the best interests of all the people toward the uplift of the commonwealth, and

Whereas, The citizens of Statesboro and the Statesboro Board of Trade, and the citizens of Bulloch county will join on that day in a general meeting and barbecue dinner to be held on the grounds of the F. D. A. S. in keeping with the proclamation of the governor, and

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WILSON SURE OF WINNING FIGHT

Only Democrats Could Carry Out Preparedness Program.

REPUBLICANS WILL GIVE AID

Vote on Bill Will Not Be Divided by Party Lines—Roosevelt Was Unable to Get Four Battalions Authorized, as All Democrats Voted Against the Increased Appropriations.

Washington, Nov. 17.—(Special.)—Only a Democratic administration could put through such a military program as has been outlined by the president and his army and navy secretaries.

Theodore Roosevelt at the height of the power tried to put through a four battalion program. He was opposed by the entire Democratic party and many of the leaders in his own party. Aldrich and Allison stopped him in the senate. It was at that time that Aldrich made his famous remark that the government could be run by a business man for \$200,000,000 less than it was then costing.

When the Democrats came into power in the house they cut out all battalions in the navy program, and the Republican senate made a fight for two ships and succeeded in getting one each year.

Present Attitude of Democrats. There is not the slightest doubt that if the Democrats could vote secretly on the subject of the big military program they would reject it almost to a man. They do not believe in the policy, but as Mr. Quay used to say, most of them "will go long."

Many Democratic congressmen put themselves into the hands of the administration before the policy and program were announced. They said they would stand for anything that the president wanted.

A Democratic Policy. And so the national preparedness plan has become a Democratic policy. Republican votes will put it through, but the Democratic president and the Democratic congress must get the credit of the big military program which will put the nation into the fighting trim in case any nation makes war upon us.

While this may be a party policy, it also bids fair to split the party, particularly if Bryan has any such following as he has had in the past.

The Senate Rules. It is not going to be an easy matter to apply cloture in the senate. There are a great many men who believe in it, but there are others who fear that the time may come when it will be used to their disadvantage. Many senators have come to Washington convinced that cloture was right and proper, but have changed their minds before the end of their first terms in the upper branch of congress.

One who never changed was Steve White of California. He often shocked the senate by telling what he thought of the antiquated methods of procedure. "These silly rules of the senate," he once remarked.

Billy Mason of Illinois was another who never wavered in his belief that the cloture should be applied, but he closed his term conducting a vigorous filibuster against a measure which he alone opposed.

More "Watchful Waiting." According to Congressman Clift of Massachusetts, the ranking minority member of the committee on appropriations, the Republicans will do a little "watchful waiting" on their own account. "We will watch the split develop in the Democratic party," he said. "It is promised by the attitude of Bryan. We will wait and see how many Bryan followers are still left in congress."

Chilton's Stories. Senator Chilton of West Virginia is chairman of the committee which has been sitting in Washington trying to find out what is the matter with the District of Columbia. Between times he amuses his friends and associates with negro stories. No other man in the senate has so many or the faculty of telling them as well as Chilton. No story teller is without friends around the capitol.

Bryan Has Support. "There is no doubt about the support which Bryan has in his opposition to preparedness," remarked a man who heard him speak at Paterson, N. J. "He was speaking on woman suffrage and in the course of his remarks said that one reason why he was for woman suffrage was because the women would help defeat the movement for a great military preparation. That remark brought the greatest demonstration of the evening. It convinced me that Bryan has a large following in this position to the president's policy."

Bryan is used to such demonstrations. In three campaigns he received tremendous ovations, and most of those who traveled with him were convinced from the demonstrations and the big meetings which gave him rapt attention that he would be elected. No one can tell about the demonstrations following one of the bursts of Bryan eloquence.

Prevention of Tuberculosis the Country's Greatest Health Problem

By Major General WILLIAM C. GORGAS, Surgeon General United States Army.

CONSIDER that prevention of tuberculosis remains the most important health problem in this country in spite of all the work that has been done along that line. I believe that if it were possible to place every person with the disease in a hospital tuberculosis probably would be stamped out in a few years.

I am informed that a number of counties in New York state are voting this year on the question of establishing local tuberculosis hospitals. It seems to me that with the question of saving lives so squarely put up to the voters there can be no doubt of the results.

Scientific Farming

WHEN TO SOW ALFALFA.

Some Farmers Prefer Spring and Others the Fall.

The soil for alfalfa should be plenty of humus. A deep, rich, sandy loam will grow alfalfa to perfection. The land should be well drained, for alfalfa will not be a success on swamp land, says a contributor to Farm Progress.

There is a difference of opinion as to when alfalfa should be sown. Some prefer the spring and others the fall. I think one should be governed by conditions of climate and soil. In those sections where there is little moisture in the fall and the winters are exceedingly cold spring seeding is preferable.

drumstick will give better results when

seeded in the spring. When seeded in the fall the roots go into winter quarters very tender and are apt to be winter killed.

When there is plenty of moisture and soil is alluvial and sandy and winters light, fall seeding is recommended because the alfalfa can be sown after the season's crop is harvested. When planting in the early spring one should be certain to wait until all danger from frost has passed. The soil should be harrowed and disked until it is like an ash bank, then packed until it is firm below. Lack of thorough preparation of soil is the cause of more failures to get a stand of alfalfa than anything else.

When alfalfa is planted in the spring it should have a nurse crop. Oats are considered the best nurse crop in certain sections. They shade the ground and protect the young plants from the hot summer sun and at the same time give a profitable crop. The ground should be full of moisture when planting the seed so that it will come right up and start to growing.

Acres of Farm Lands. The last federal census shows the total number of farms in the United States to be 4,391,502, containing 878,788,325 acres.

The land in farms represents 46.2 per cent, or less than one-third of the total land area of the country. Of the total acreage given only 478,451,750 acres are classed as "improved land." The balance comprises wood land and other unimproved land in farms. The improved land given above is only about 25.1 per cent of the total area of the country. The average size of farms, as shown by the last census, is 138.1 acres of which an average of 75.2 acres are improved, and 62.9 acres unimproved.

A NEW PRINCIPLE IN CREAM SEPARATORS

A New Suction-Feed Machine of Reliable Capacity Claims to Skim at Any Speed—Cream Always Uniform—Speed Indicators Unnecessary

In view of the recent tests made by experiment stations throughout the country, in which it was shown that 90 per cent of all cream separator users were turning their cream separators below proper speed and losing, collectively, more than \$100,000,000 a year in cream profits, which might be saved if the separator were operated correctly, it is interesting to note that a new-principle cream separator has been patented, which will skim clean no matter whether the speed of the crank be fast or slow—an individual feature absolutely new to cream separators.

In addition to this valuable feature, another advantage of the new machine consists in its ability to produce cream that is uniform and even in density at varying speeds of the handle.

The capacity of this new machine, which is being manufactured by one of the oldest cream separator companies in the United States, is termed "raisable," in that it may be increased at will simply by turning the crank handle faster than normal speed.

The new suction-feed principle upon which the success of the machine depends, operates as follows: The speed of the machine creates a suction in the bowl which sucks milk into it through a hole in the bottom. Hence the higher the speed, the more milk is sucked in, and vice versa.

Obviously, a very high centrifugal force is necessary to accomplish both functions, and this in

turn is made possible by the singular construction of the separator bowl, which is in the form of a steel tube, ranging in diameter from 14 to 24 inches and in length from 12 to 18 inches. This bowl is suspended from a single ball bearing at top and is driven by gears which run in a spray of oil in a closed case, protected from dust and foreign matter of every kind. Because of the close gearing of the machine, the bowl achieves a normal speed of 16,000 revolutions per minute, which is very high, considering that no other separator manufactured makes more than 8,000 revolutions. The small diameter of the bowl, being driven at this high speed, creates an intensely high centrifugal force, which separates the cream and skim milk quicker and cleaner than any other type bowl ever made.

An advantage of the suction-feed principle lies in the fact that the same force which does the skimming also draws the milk into the bowl. When the speed is high and a large amount of skimming force is present, the suction is intensified and an equally large quantity of milk passes through the bowl. As the machine slows down and the centrifugal force diminishes, the suction is also lessened and a smaller quantity of milk is drawn into the bowl. It will be seen, therefore, that the skimming force and milk feed rise and fall together. No more milk can ever enter the bowl than will be skimmed perfectly clean by the skimming force present therein.

The capacity of the new machine, by which is meant the amount of milk which can be separated in a given time, usually one hour, is regulated by the suction-feed principle. A cream separator of the new type, in one of the average dairy sizes, which skims 400 pounds per hour at 45 turns, will skim 500 pounds per hour by simply increasing the crank speed. It will be readily seen, therefore

that the invention of this new machine marks an important advance in cream separator construction. Heretofore, it has been absolutely necessary that all separators be turned at a given speed, ranging from 45 turns to 60 turns per minute in the respective machines. If this speed was not maintained regularly, the separator did not skim clean and a large percentage of the cream was lost in the skim milk. At exactly normal speed that is the speed indicated on the crank handle of the respective machines all cream separators skim fairly clean, much cleaner than any gravity or deep setting system previously in use. But in practice separator users cannot keep the speed exactly right and thus lose quantities of cream. The new Suction-feed Separator has the advantage of skimming clean at any speed, high or low, thus preventing this loss.

They will help you wonderfully.

The canning club work will now be under the management of Miss Myrtle Odom who has arrived and is actively in charge. She will immediately get in touch with the girls who are interested and will give you definite instruction as to how best to proceed to make a success of the work. Girls made an excellent showing this year; let us see if we can't lead the state next year. I believe we can. We have the material and why not let us lead? Girls, write to Miss Odom and get quickly in touch with the work. Get an early start and win first honors. You can do it by starting quickly and working hard. Do it now.

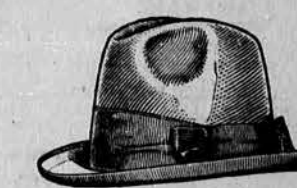

CAUSE AND CURE OF PELLAGRA DISCOVERED

Regarded by U. S. Health Service as One of the Most Important Achievements of Medical Science in Recent Years.

Announcement has been made at the Treasury Department that as a result of continued research and experiments of the Public Health Service, both the cause and the cure of pellagra have been discovered, and that the spread of this dread malady, which during the past few years, may now be checked and eventually eradicated. Assistant Secretary Newton, in charge of the Public Health Service, expressed great interest in the discovery and regards it as one of the most important achievements of medical science in recent years.

Pellagra has been increasing alarmingly throughout the United States during the last eight years, and it is estimated that 75,000 cases of the disease will have occurred in the United States in 1915, and of this number at least 7500 would have died before the end of the year. In many sections only tuberculosis and pneumonia exceed it as a cause of death.

The final epoch-making experiment of the Public Health Service was carried out at the farm of the Mississippi State Penitentiary about eight miles east of Jackson, Miss., and together with the previous work of the service completes the chain in the prevention and cure of the disease. The work at the Mississippi farm has been in charge of Surgeon Joseph Goldberger and Assistant Surgeon G. A. Wheeler of the United States Public Health Service. The farm consists of 3200 acres in the center of which is the convict camp. The final experiment was undertaken for the purpose of testing the possibility of producing pellagra in healthy human white adult males by a restricted, one-sided, mainly carbohydrate (cereal) diet. Of eleven convicts who volunteered for this experiment, six developed a typical dermatitis and mild nervous gastro-intestinal symptoms.

Experts, including Dr. E. H. Galloway, the secretary of the Mississippi State Board of Health, Dr. Nolan Stewart, formerly Superintendent of the Mississippi State Hospital for the insane at Jackson, Dr. Marcus Hulse, Professor of Dermatology, Medical College of University of Tennessee, Memphis, Tenn., and Dr. Martin L. Engman, Professor of Dermatology in the Washington Medical School, St. Louis, Mo., declare that the disease which was produced was true pellagra.

Prior to the commencement of these experiments no history could be found of the occurrence of pellagra on the penitentiary farm. On this farm were 75 or 80 convicts. Governor Earl Brewer offered to pardon twelve of the convicts who volunteered for the experiment.

A Carriage That Saved an Empress

A Philadelphia carriage builder has just completed a repairing and renovating job on a vehicle which once played a prominent part in getting an empress out of the country over which her husband had ruled into another land which promised her, if not her former high estate, at least a place of security and repose.

The vehicle referred to is a four-wheeled, covered landau, formerly the property of Dr. Evans, the famous American dentist, who gained such a reputation in Paris as to be summoned to court to serve royalty in his professional capacity.

It was after the battle of Sedan, in the war between Prussia and France, and when rumors of the impending fall of the reigning dynasty became insistent, the wife of Napoleon III, the beautiful Empress Eugenie, was advised that it would be to her best interests to leave the capital on short notice, and in a quiet manner. In view of the secrecy to get the Empress safely out of France, regular methods of traveling was simply out of the question. It was then that Dr. Evans, the American dentist was appealed to, and he formed a plan of escape which was successfully carried out.

On the night of the fifth of September, 1870, the doctor provided a closed landau, to which the empress was conducted. She acted the part of an invalid patient. A Dr. Crane took the role of her physician; Dr. Evans pretended to be a brother of the patient, while Madam Labretton, Eugenie's lady-in-waiting, was the nurse. In this manner the party reached the open country on the road to Havre without having been subjected to undue suspicion or examination.

The landau was taken as far as Mainz, when it was changed for a lighter carriage to which fresh horses were attached. The party crossed the English channel on Sept. 8th, and the Empress was joined later by members of her family on English soil. Eugenie has resided in that country ever since the establishment of the latest French republic, her present address being Farnborough Hill, Farnborough, England.

The carriage to which the Empress owes her escape from Paris remained in the possession of Dr. Evans, in Paris, during his lifetime, but was brought to America recently to be placed in the Evans Memorial Museum, in Philadelphia, for which the doctor provided in his will. Dr. Evans was a Philadelphiaian.

Among the novelties noticed on many of these frocked suits is the "muff cuff." These are wide and flaring, made of fur or a fur fabric, and arranged so that the hands may be slipped into them quite as one would use a muff. This idea is especially practical for the girl who is shipping or general wear, also for the heavy coat, as there is no danger of losing a valuable muff.

Cookery Points

Twenty New Vegetables.
There are more than twenty new vegetables that show a likelihood of coming into general use on the American dinner table within the next ten years. The choice of the housewife is going to be considerably more than doubled. She will have forty different vegetables from which to plan her meals instead of twenty. There is nothing of the "fad" proposition about any of these new vegetables. All have been and are being grown and already have some market.

All have been popular wherever they have been tried, and all can now be grown at a profit. In addition, over and above the forty, there are five or six other vegetables not so new, but still uncommon as foods because they have never been put widely upon the market. These latter have passed the public verdict of approval, but in most cities and towns it is difficult to obtain them. But all the new vegetables, the experts say, are going to be possible for the slimmest pocketbook.

The aquatic potato, which Jokers, when they get wind of it, are going to designate as a "submarine" because it really grows, so to speak, under water, is one of the most spectacular of the new vegetables. The scientists and the progressive farmers who have looked into it say that the aquatic potato has a very fair chance of becoming one of the great American food products all by itself. It is good to the taste, and it grows where no potato worthy of the name could ever be induced to grow before—in very moist and marshy ground.

Along with the aquatic potato is the rose potato. The rose potato is almost the star among the new vegetables, for even now it has a widespread sale. It has become a distinct commercial success. It is a substitute for cranberry, or really not a substitute at all, but something new and capable of making a jelly that can meet cranberry on its own ground and—some day—of surpassing that delicacy.

It will grow in southern climates impossible for cranberries and, best of all, a market for it is now established; Texas, California, Florida and South Carolina have all become rose potato states. One advantage it has over the cranberry is that it is very easy of culture and can be grown in any garden.—Harper's Weekly.

About Spinach.
In the early spring days, when the weather turns suddenly very mild or warm, the appetite craves something cold, crisp and green. This is perfectly natural, for in the first green vegetables, although the nutritive value is small, there is a tonic quality that is invigorating and healthful.

Of all the greens, spinach is the most wholesome. A famous physician has declared that "it is the love of the stomach." Spinach should be eaten at least twice a week during the spring season. Its value, however, can only be obtained by proper cooking. Use a very small quantity of water, just enough to keep it from burning, and cook in an uncovered kettle for fifteen or twenty minutes. Be sure that the water is actually boiling before placing the greens in it, as that is most important not only with spinach, but with all other spring greens, such as dandelions, mustard, etc.

French Dressing.
When you make French dressing how do you do it? Do you pour first the oil and then the vinegar over the salad and then sprinkle on the seasonings?

Or do you pour a little oil in a big spoon and then pour in enough vinegar to overflow it and repeat this process, beating the oil and vinegar with a fork until the salad is dressed?

You do neither of these things if you are really up to date in your salad dressing. And you use one of the Little French dressing sets. It consists of a tray containing a cut glass jug for vinegar and one for oil and three shakers—one for salt, one for pepper and one for cayenne pepper or paprika. Then there is a little silver dish about five inches in diameter, in which the dressing is to be mixed. This dish is mixed before it is poured on the salad.

Small Green Onions.
When the tiny green onions appear try cooking and serving them as you would asparagus. Wash them well, tie in bunches, drop in boiling salted water and cook for ten minutes. This time allowance is for very young vegetables, about the size of lead pencils. Drain, place on toast and pour over them a

THE NEW PROHIBITION LAW

Effective May 1st 1916.

Sweeping In Its Limitations

Atlanta, Nov. 23.—A complete victory for the prohibitionist of Georgia, leaving nothing to be desired from their point of view, as embodied in the three new prohibition bills which Governor Harris has signed, and which will become laws on May 1, 1916.

They will give Georgia, in their combined effect, one of the most stringent and radical sets of prohibition legislation ever passed by any state in the Union, not even excepting Alabama.

The first bill, called the omnibus bill, absolutely prohibits the sale of liquor, wines or beer or near beer in Georgia, and prohibits their manufacture as well. It even limits to a minimum amount per month the amount of whiskey which a man may have in his own home for personal use.

The second bill is called the anti shipping bill, and prohibits the shipment into the state or from one point to another in the state of any kind of liquor or beer, excepting only the minimum amounts to be used by private individuals.

The third measure, regarded by many as the most radical of all, absolutely prohibits the advertising of any liquor, wines or beers in the state. This includes not only papers and publications printed in the state of Georgia, but means that no national magazines or New York or one of the state papers can be sold at all in Georgia until all liquor, wine and beer ads have been either clipped out bodily or covered with lampblack by the dealers.

In Georgia Begins This Week

Atlanta, Nov. 23.—The sale of red cross Christmas seals, to raise money in the fight against tuberculosis, begins all over Georgia this week, under the direction of the W. G. Raoul Foundation of Atlanta, which has general supervision and which is furnishing the seals in the desired quantity to the local organizations which are engaged in the sales.

In nearly every city and town of Georgia the work is in charge of the two women's clubs or some other patriotic and charitably inclined organizations.

Secretary James P. Faulkner of the Raoul Foundation received this year 2,200,000 seals for Georgia, and it is expected that this year will exceed anything in the past. The sale begins this week, on Thanksgiving day, and lasts through the holidays.
