During the three-quarter-century period from 1849 to 1915 the consumption of cotton in United States increased from 236,525 to 6,009,267 bales, or about twenty-fold. The greatest cotton-manufacturing state is Massachusetts, which consumed 1,282,039 bales during the year; North Carolina, with a consumption of 910,154 bales, stood second; South Carolina, with 811,564 bales, third; and Georgia, with 659,853 bales, fourth.

The manufacture of cotton in the south had been carried on for many years, but only in a small way prior to the decade 1870-1880, when the industry in that section began to grow rapidly. During that decade and in each of the two succeeding ones the consumption of cotton in these states nearly tripled, and during the past 15 years it has more than doubled. During the quarter century from 1890 to 1915 the consumption in the cotton growing states increased

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## MANY CANDIDATES IN G. O. P. RANKS

Encouraging Sign, Say Leaders, as Convention Nears.

### FAVORITE SONS TO FRONT.

When Democrats Captured Prize in 1912 They Had Six or Eight Big Possibilities—Republican Leaders Draw Same Conclusions This Year—European War May Change Matters.

Washington, Nov. 1. (Special.)—There was no more encouraging sign to the Democrats in 1912 than the multiplicity of candidates from every section seeking the nomination for president. From the time the Democrats gained a victory in the congressional campaign of 1910 nearly every shrewd politician and political observer was aware that the party not only stood a good chance of winning, but that it was almost bound to win unless a miracle should happen.

Chairman Hilges and Secretary Reynolds of the Republican national committee are now talking about the number of Republican candidates for president next year and draw the same conclusions as to the possibility for success. It is stated that ten or fifteen men will come to the convention with delegates, all hoping that they may have a chance at the great prize—the nomination.

Not Quite the Same. The inference of possible Republican success might well have been drawn for several months following the last congressional election, although the Republicans did not carry the house. But times have changed conditions. The European war has spread a doubt over things political. Six weeks ago a great many Republicans did not think the Republican nomination was worth having, but there has been a change since then, and good politicians see an opportunity for success. That may account for the numerous candidates that Hilges and Reynolds see in the offing. It may be a good time for airing favorite son boasts.

Mexico Still an Issue. Mexico is going to be a political issue in congress if the Republicans can have their way. It will make some difference whether the country will pay attention to Mexican questions. After passing over all the outcries that have been committed there for years without raising much of a rumble it seems evident that the people at this time will not give attention to anything that Carranza may do or that those who oppose him may do. The worst to come can be no more horrible than what has passed.

James Hay in Line. The administration is capturing them one by one, these leaders necessary to its military policy. So one believed that James Hay, who is to be chairman of the committee on military affairs, would stand for the army plan, but it is said that he will support it—and almost like it.

The Continental Army. It is possible for Secretary Garrison to get men to enlist in his Continental army, for the period of service is short. But he will find it difficult to raise the army of regulars to 125,000. "Men are not going to volunteer for a war," he says. "The regular army I have heard more than one man say since this matter has been under discussion. Men would quickly enlist for a real war. Perhaps a few hundred thousand would go into the regular service, but that is doubtful if they had an opportunity to enter state regiments with short term enlistments. The possibilities of promotion from the ranks to be officers even during a time of war. There are always plenty of anxious young men with a pull who can get these places."

No Half Loaf For Them. The suggestion has been made to a number of prohibitionists that they make their fight on whisky, gin, brandy and other strong alcoholic drinks and let beer and wines alone. But the prohibitionists will not accept half a loaf. They intend to drive out all liquors. The first place of attack this winter will be the national capital. If they can make Washington dry, they hope to impress the rest of the country and later put through a constitutional amendment.

They Never Get Left. Those marine corps officers never get left. In the proposed increase of the navy it is observed that the marines are to get a lot more officers of high rank, while there is nothing of that kind for the navy. There has been no legislation for the navy in many years that it does not happen always that the marines get the largest slice of the pie. How does it happen? Well, they have a pretty strong political pull, and they stand well with the country.

Time For Claims. Here comes a Republican from Oklahoma who says that state will cast its electoral vote for the Republican candidate next year. It is pretty near time for claims to be made for Tennessee, which is regularly placed in the Republican column just before a presidential election.

### Preparedness a Republican Plan

If any democrat doubts that the

"The war in Europe is not the  
cause of a movement for prepara-  
tion for defense. That cause has

judgement of the people of the  
United States upon the necessity  
for the adequate preparation of de-  
fense."

Yes, the republican leaders have  
had it in mind for a long while—

they seized upon the war as an ex-

Mr. Root is also quoted as say-  
ing that the defense program "will  
include a universal military ser-

old days—their eyes are looking  
forward. The 500,000 against Mr.  
Root's New York constitution will  
be nothing to the majority against  
compulsory service and European  
military standards.

## NO SENATE PLACE FOR UNDERWOOD

Democrats Must Provide Good  
Committee Assignment.

THERE ARE NO VACANCIES.

Committees Must Be Enlarged or Else  
an Incumbent Must Step Down and  
Out—Republicans Fear That Minor-  
ity Assignments Will Be Reduced by  
the Democrats in Control.

Washington, Nov. 24.—[Special.]—It  
will be interesting to see whether the  
Democrats of the senate will be as in-  
sistent on spreading good committee  
places among a considerable number  
as they were two years ago, when they  
took control of the senate. At that  
time the slogan was an equal division  
of the committee assignments.

The question becomes all the more  
interesting, as there is no good place  
for Oscar W. Underwood of Alabama.  
A man who has been chairman of the  
ways and means committee of the  
house and leader for four years is en-  
titled to consideration when he goes to  
the senate. But there is no opening for  
him. Only three Democrats retired  
from the senate last March, Camden  
of Kentucky, Thornton of Louisiana  
and White of Alabama. As to Beck-  
ham and Broussard, who succeeded in  
Kentucky and Louisiana, few will care  
where they land, nor will much atten-  
tion be paid to Johnson of South Da-  
kota, Phelan of California and Husting  
of Wisconsin, all new senators. These  
new men can wait their turn.

**Good Places Filled.**  
There are no Democratic vacancies  
on finance, foreign relations, appropri-  
ations and judiciary, the four big com-  
mittees. The same is true of the sec-  
ond rate committees such as Interstate  
commerce, agriculture, privileges and  
elections, commerce, banking and cur-  
rency and military affairs. There is a  
vacancy on naval affairs and postoffi-  
ces, but these are not likely to tempt  
a man like Underwood, who has had  
what he wanted in the house for many  
years.

**Reduce Republican Representation.**  
It is quite likely that an attempt will  
be made to reduce the Republican rep-  
resentation on the committees, al-  
though this will be considered an out-  
rage by the minority. One difficulty  
which will be found in regard to the  
most important committee is that it  
would cut off La Follette, who has  
often helped the Democrats and has  
been a member of the committee since  
he was a senator. The alternative is  
to enlarge two of the big committees  
to give Underwood his proper place.

Senators who now have two places  
on the four big committees on the  
Democratic side are: Culberson of  
Texas, Voorhees of New York, Over-  
man of North Carolina, Shively of In-  
diana, Smith of Georgia, Stone of Mis-  
souri and Williams of Mississippi.  
Overman, Stone and Culberson are sen-  
ators of long service. The others are  
serving their first terms.

**Knows All About It.**  
A would be political prophet asserts  
that Woodrow Wilson will not be a  
candidate for president and that  
Champ Clark will be the nominee of  
the Democrats. There is no reason to  
suppose any such thing should happen.  
And it is well to remember that earth-  
quakes in politics do not often occur.  
If Mr. Wilson does not want the nom-  
ination he should not allow quite so  
much activity in his behalf by men  
high in office who surround him.

**An Extinguisher Wanted.**  
If any man can find a good extin-  
guisher he can sell it to Joseph P.  
Tamm at the White House. But it  
must be a good extinguisher, one war-  
ranted to suppress the fool friends of  
the president. He would like a pattern  
which would fit officeholders who are  
so zealous for the president as was the  
Illinois postmaster who discharged his  
assistant for commenting upon the  
president's coming marriage. Breaks  
of that kind make Tamm very tired.

**Talk on the Philippines.**  
Even before a bill can be brought  
into the house for the freedom of the  
Philippines there will be a great deal  
of discussion on the subject. Congress-  
man Miller of Minnesota, who has made  
two long visits to the islands, will be-  
gin at once to criticize the present Phil-  
ippine policy. It is probable that he  
will be supported by Congressman Aus-  
tin of Tennessee, who is another Re-  
publican who has much information  
concerning the government of the is-  
lands. These members will vigorously  
oppose granting the Philippines any  
further concessions in the matter of self  
government.

The last Jones bill was not an in-  
dependence measure, but promised the  
natives of the islands a little more  
control. It is not believed any meas-  
ure which goes further can pass.

**Possibilities For Mexico.**  
Men from Mexico say that if any-  
thing like stable and safe conditions  
can be established in that country  
there will be a wonderful development  
of the country's resources. There is  
a great demand for copper on account  
of the war and for other metals as  
well. This will stimulate mining. Ag-  
riculture and other products will also  
be in demand. It is too bad that self-  
adventurers are keeping Mexico from  
prosperity.

to start in the business of raising  
hogs.

County Farm Demonstrator, and  
handled by him as best suits the  
hogs and in conformity with the  
rules governing pig clubs.

International Treaty, a Very Explicit Law, a Presidential Proclamation and Army and Navy Orders Regulate Aid to Wounded.

Washington.—The American Red Cross is in receipt of inquiries indicating that there is a lack of understanding in regard to relief work in time of war. There is an international treaty, a very explicit law, a presidential proclamation, and duly promulgated orders of the war and navy departments relating to the furnishing of volunteer aid to the sick and wounded of armies in time of war. It apparently is not fully realized that war relief work must be accomplished, under definite regulations; that a precise plan of action was long ago adopted, and that a nationwide, officially recognized and chartered relief organization, with departments designed to meet every phase of war relief work, exists. The conduct of war is regulated by certain well-established and recognized rules that are usually designated as "the laws of war" which comprise the rules, both written and unwritten, for carrying on of war, both on land and at sea. Should there ever come a time when the United States would be involved in war it would be imperative to enforce with the utmost stringency the law, and the executive and departmental orders governing the use of the Red Cross emblem and the functions of the government's chartered, supervised and systematized volunteer relief association.

All volunteer aid must come under the direction of the American Red Cross in such a contingency to carry out the obligation of the United States under the treaty of Geneva, to fulfill all requirements imposed by congress, to secure efficiency under centralized authority and trained organization in close affiliation with the army and navy medical service, and finally to safeguard the American public against fraud and abuse.

It should be understood that the surgeon generals of the United States army and navy are appointed by the president of the United States to represent these departments in relief work. They are members of the American Red Cross executive committee, and chairman and vice-chairman, respectively, of the war relief board.

All accounts of the American Red Cross are required by law to be audited by the war department and an annual report, also required by law, detailing the activities of the organization, is made to congress by the chairman of the central committee. It may be seen from this that the American Red Cross machinery would be set in motion at once and that its activities would be definitely co-ordinated with the legislative and executive work of the government in time of war. Merely as an example of its preparedness in one branch of its organization, there are 6,000 enrolled American Red Cross graduate nurses who have been accepted by the war department as the army nursing reserve corps.

The war department and the navy department long ago formulated regulations governing completely the duties and functions of the American Red Cross with reference to rendering aid to the land and naval forces in time of actual or threatened war. The sign of the Red Cross is protected by law and the fraudulent use thereof is punishable by fine or imprisonment or both.

President Taft in 1911, by proclamation to the army, stated briefly the regulations that must exist between the military departments of the government and volunteer relief in the event of war. General Orders, No. 170, war department, 1911, publishes the proclamation, stating in effect that the American National Red Cross is the only volunteer society authorized by this government to render aid to its land and naval forces in time of war; and that any other society desiring to render similar assistance can do so only through the American National Red Cross; that to comply with the requirements of Article 10 of the International Red Cross Convention of 1906 (revision of the Treaty of Geneva) that part of the American National Red Cross rendering aid to the naval forces will continue a part of the sanitary service thereof.

The law, approved January 5, 1905, as amended, which chartered the American National Red Cross, stipulates as follows:

Sec. 3. That the purpose of this corporation are and shall be:

First. To furnish volunteer aid to the sick and wounded of armies in time of war, in accordance with the spirit and conditions of the conference of Geneva of October, 1863, and also of the treaty of the Red Cross or the treaty of Geneva of August 22, 1864, to which the United States of America gave its adhesion on March 1, 1882.

Fourth. To act in matters of voluntary relief and in accord with the military and naval authorities as a medium of communication between the people of the United States of America and their army and navy, and to act in such matters between similar national societies of other governments through the Comité International de Secours, and the government of the people and the army and navy of the United States of America.

## Scientific Farming

### HOME GROWN SEED CORN.

Will Yield Better Than That From Some Distant Section.

[Prepared by North Dakota experiment station.]

The selection of seed corn is one of the most important points that require attention at a particular time. Numerous investigations have shown that home grown seed corn will yield better than seed from some distant section of the country even when the climate conditions are not materially different. In North Dakota, where our climate differs from most of the other corn growing states, it is especially important that attention be given to field selection of seed corn at the proper time. Mature corn has a much higher feeding value than immature corn, and the only way to grow mature corn is to select the seed from the best ears. When such seed is planted germination is surer under adverse conditions and a better stand is secured.

It is much more to be prepared and cultivate the land for a good stand than it does for a poor one, as shown by the Iowa experiment station,

where a 15 per cent stand produced twenty-three bushels per acre and an 84 per cent stand produced eighty-three bushels per acre with the same cultivation, it is evident that the time spent in selecting and caring for seed corn is exceedingly profitable.

In a year like this, when every growing day is needed to mature a sufficient quantity of seed, pickings should be delayed until after the leaves have been killed by frost. A light frost will not injure the corn materially, and the increase in the value of the seed due to its more mature condition will largely offset any decreases due to light frost. As soon as the leaves have been frosted so that growth is stopped the ears should be picked. Immature corn should be hung up or placed in drying racks the day it is picked, and mature corn should not be left in piles more than a day or two and then only in small quantities.

Seed corn picked in the dough stage will grow if properly cured, and enough seed should be saved for next year's planting as soon as the leaves have been killed by frost, even though it is in the soft dough stage.

Mature corn, selected before killing frosts in an ordinary year, is the safest seed to plant. However, in a year when the frost free period is so short and the weather conditions so unfavorable that no mature ears are produced by a variety which ripens in an ordinary year seed should be saved even though it may be immature. By this means the strains which are best adapted to the region can be perpetuated, immature seed from these strains will prove more satisfactory than mature seed shipped in from the state to the south, where the growing season is longer than we ordinarily have in North Dakota.

Inasmuch as the moisture content of immature corn is very high, it is especially important that it should be given careful attention during the drying and storing period. After having placed the ears on a drying rack a free circulation of air should be provided by opening all doors and windows during the day and warm nights. While thorough ventilation is desirable at all times, the room in which the corn is being dried should be kept above freezing temperature.

After the corn has been strung or placed in the drying racks it should be suspended or supported by some means so that it is beyond the reach of rats and mice in a well aired room. The corn should be dry before freezing weather, and every means should be provided for as rapid drying as possible. Windows and doors should be kept open during the day so that a current of air can pass freely through all parts of the room.

## WORK OF THE EXTRA SESSION

Salons Glad It Is Over—Legislature Back Home for Christmas

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 1.—Well, the extra session of the Georgia Legislature, now ended, turned out to be not so much of a useless cat-and-dog fight comedy after all. Quite a bit of serious work was finally accomplished and the legislators are now safely back at home with plenty of time to prepare for Christmas.

The prohibitionists succeeded in passing a set of measures which gives Georgia one of the strictest prohibition laws in the world, a law which will not merely prohibit the sale of liquor in the saloons and clubs, and kill the beer saloons, but which will actually limit the amount of liquor a man can privately have in his own home and will go so far as to bar national magazines and publications containing liquor ads until the ads are clipped out or covered over with lamplack.

The general appropriations bill was put through in splendid shape, and the various state institutions generally speaking got fully as much as they had reason to expect.

Last and most important of all, the Western & Atlantic railroad ex-leasing commission, which Col. Walter P. Andrews and the other students of the situation have sat up at night and studied for months, and which was in a sense the most important thing before the legislature, was finally put in excellent shape and the commission created along what are believed to be the proper lines. Col. Andrews, representative for Fulton, has done more work, perhaps, than any one man in working out the details of the Western & Atlantic problem, and he has received many congratulations from all parts of the state on the final happy outcome.

## SUFFRAGETTES WILL ENDEAVOR TO WIN OVER THE PRESIDENT

To Their Way of Thinking

New York, Dec. 4.—Officers of the congressional union for woman suffrage are wondering today how they can best make use of one thousand dollars contributed by Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont for the express purpose of "converting" President Wilson to the support of the proposed suffrage amendment to the federal constitution.

Mrs. Belmont did not stipulate the manner in which the funds will be expended, but, in announcing her contribution, said she is sure the federal amendment advocates eventually will win the president to their cause.

"The president has said he believed woman suffrage a good thing for New Jersey," she continued. "We must keep at him now until he says it is a good thing for the whole country."

Mrs. Belmont also advocated expenditure of Suffrage funds to induce southern congressmen to support the federal amendment.

The congressional union has received a contribution of one hundred dollars to "convert" Elihu Root, who was one of our strongest opponents in the recent campaign in this state.

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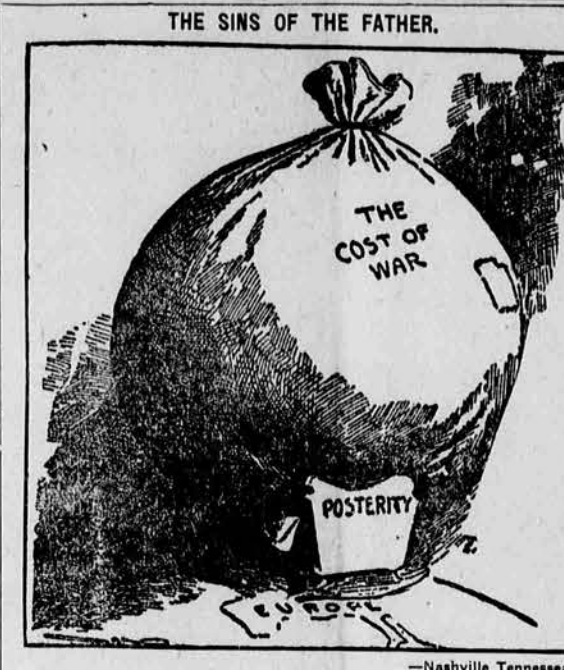
## EX-GOVERNOR SLATON TO DELIVER

## DEMOCRATS WANT PARTY HARMONY

Will Go Any Length to Prevent Friction In Congress.

CLARKE TO HOLD POSITION.

Will Not Be Deposed as President Pro Tem of Senate Because He Opposed Administration's Ship Purchase Bill Last Year—Preliminary Conferences to Avert a Split.

Washington. (Special.)—In the interest of party harmony the Democrats may make no change in the organization of the senate. To depose Senator Clarke of Arkansas from the position of president pro tem, because he led the fight against the shipping bill in the last congress might raise a question which would be hard to quiet. One of the things which led to Republican downfall was the methods

which the leaders adopted of punishing men who did not agree with the opinions of those leaders. Only those who "took orders" were allowed the rights and privileges of the party. Of course it would be an easy matter to push Clarke out of his honorary position, for that is about all it amounts to, but Clarke is a fighter, and he might make a great deal of trouble in the future. But there is a more important view. Those senators who supported Clarke are likely to be resentful if a system of punishment for independence is inaugurated.

The Preliminary Conferences. Senators have been having many preliminary conferences these days. Quite a number appeared on the ground early and began to "get the lay of the land." Since then they have been greeting the other men as they came in from time to time, and in the senate restaurant little groups assemble and try to settle the destinies of the country, or to put it more definitely, try to adjust the differences which may develop in the coming session. The Democratic senators are not altogether pleased with the president's preparedness program, but they are trying to find a common ground upon which they can unite and support the president. They know the necessity for harmony as they are about to enter upon a political campaign.

The Tariff Program. It is recognized that some action must be taken in regard to the tariff. Hoke Smith of Georgia has outlined his program, which meets with considerable favor. He says that instead of allowing the free sugar part of the Underwood bill to go into effect a duty of 1 cent a pound should be placed on sugar, a revenue duty placed upon articles which will prevent "dumping" after the war ends and such other modifications as may seem for the best interests of the country. "Let the Republicans say we are coming to their position if they want to," said Senator Smith. "If that is the case they should have no reason for complaining. As a matter of fact, we will simply be meeting conditions as they have developed."

War Lines at the White House. Those who make it their duty to fuss over diplomatic procedure have arranged to have nice distinctions drawn this winter at the White House, where there will be a good deal of entertaining by President Wilson and his bride.

There will be a dinner at which the diplomats of the allies will be present and another at which the diplomats of the Teuton supporters will be present. In these days it would be impolitic to have French and German, English and Austrian representatives at the same state dinner. Whatever else may happen, there must be nothing like a mix-up of the diplomats.

Will Not Resist For Long. It would not be surprising to see the Republicans resist cloture only with such force as to show their position and then to allow the Democrats to put it through. As Senator Smoot says, "We will be in power before long and we will make good use of cloture which the Democrats adopt."

It remains one of the days of Tom Reed, when the Democrats resisted with all their strength the Reed rules, but have since made good use of them. Perhaps it is this attitude of the Republicans which has caused a number of Democrats to say that it will be better to drop the cloture proposition. But how are they going to do so if the president insists on it?

Not Pleading to Marshall. The search that has been going on for a vice presidential candidate for the Democratic party is not at all pleasing to Tom Marshall. He sees no reason why Jim Han Lewis, Brand Whitlock and other men should be mentioned for vice president.
