THOMAS E. WATSON'S TRIAL

Reviewed In Its Various Phases of Present and Future

Tom Watson was tried last week in the United States Court at Augusta, Georgia, for the offense of sending obscene printing matter through the mails.

The main offense alleged against him is re-publishing an article copied from a Roman Catholic book, which the Catholics are said to have sent through the mails for years.

The prosecution of Watson is an event that points the direction in which the people of the United States are traveling. We are moving toward the time when the United States will be engaged in civil conflict, if not in real war just as it is now in Europe and in Mexico, and for the same reasons, religious prejudices and hatred.

Today millions of men are engaged in war in Europe, filling their country with countless dead, widows and orphans. And the war in Europe began because Austria attempted to force her Roman Catholic religion on the Greek Catholics of Serbia, and to force the Servians to place their public schools under Austrian control.

The people of Mexico and the Roman Catholic church has been at war for several years, all on account of the fact that the church insist on running the state and public schools. Against this state of affairs the people of Mexico began a revolution, and with Carranza as leader, they have been about won their fight for the separation of church and state, and for public control of the schools.

In our own country we see constant effort on the part of not only Catholics, but protestants to set aside the great principles on which our government is founded, and to set up a union of church and state.

The great underlying principle of our government are free speech, free press, and the right of every citizen to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience, and it is written in our own Constitution that state and church should ever be kept separate.

And certain church dignitaries are seeking to bring about the same conditions that today exist in Europe and in Mexico by setting aside those great principles and to have their churches to teach their religion in our public schools, and to make a union of church and state, and overthrow these great principles if they can.

The public schools or state institutions for the purpose of teaching our children how to read, write, and to obtain a common English education, and yet in every state the Catholics insist on taking public money and teaching their own religion in their own schools, and some of the protestants are doing the same thing. Only recently certain protestant church men have been assailing our public schools and insisting that the public should exempt their wealth from taxation. Only recently a Catholic Bishop wrote a newspaper article threatening President Wilson with his church vote because he recognized Carranza as the leader in Mexico. The Catholics now vote together as a political party, and the time is coming when certain elements of the protestants will vote together as a party, and when this state of affairs comes about, we will see plenty of prosecutions like the Watson case, in which the church is seeking to throttle free

RED CROSS CHRISTMAS SEALS

Passing All Previous Records—Will Go Half Million Above Last Year

Atlanta, Dec. 8.—So rapidly has the state wide sale of Red Cross Christmas seals progressed this year under the direction of the W. G. Raoul Foundation that Secretary James P. Faulkner announces that it will probably be necessary to order at once an additional quarter of a million seals from national headquarters.

The number originally sent this year amounted to 2,200,000 as against 2,000,000 last year, so that it means that Georgia's total will run nearly half a million seals over last year.

Secretary Faulkner is much pleased with the progress of the work which this year includes practically every city, town, village and hamlet in the entire state. In many localities the children of the public schools are giving splendid aid in the sales. In other women's clubs, Sunday schools and various organizations have charge of the work.

press, free speech, the public schools and the separation of church and state. Tom Watson is simply one of the first victims of this effort to wreck our government.

When the jury was being selected in his case, a preacher of a certain protestant denomination, stated that he was too prejudiced against Watson to serve on the jury, because Watson was opposed to foreign missions. Think of a man pretending to be a preacher of a great protestant church to admit that as a jurymen he could not give justice to a man simply because he disagreed with him on a matter of this kind.

"Whither are we drifting? A wayfarer, though a fool, can read the signs of the times."

We will yet wade through blood on account of the persecutions of church men who thought it was their political duty to take charge of the people in a country and to insist that they should be religiousists of any set or faith, and men of this stamp are just as dangerous today as they were in the middle ages when men were burned at the stake and persecuted for their religious views.

Only recently in Charleston, South Carolina, at a state election in which the school question was a burning issue between the protestants and Catholics, men were shot down at the polls, and noises the people of this country stand up to the principals of our government founded by our fathers then a few years hence will see us engaged in bloody warfare over just such questions as these. In the Watson case the jury stood ten to two in his favor, while only two wanted to convict him, and this is just about the ratio in which our people stand on this question.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 8.—William Shakespeare, aged 39 years, no home, discovered there was nothing in a name when he applied for enlistment at the local recruiting office of the United States Marine Corps.

SEN. HOKE SMITH SUCCEEDS ATLANTA'S MUNICIPAL COURT

In Getting \$35,000 Appropriated to Fight Boll Weevil

Atlanta, Dec. 8.—Through the efforts of United States Senator Hoke Smith, a federal appropriation of \$35,000, will be added to the amount passed by the Georgia legislature, to aid in fighting the boll weevil in this state.

Senator Smith explained to Governor Harris the situation in Washington and the possibilities of obtaining help from the national government, while the special session was still sitting, and the telegram from Senator Smith with promises of federal aid was largely responsible for assuring the passage of the state appropriation.

By this arrangement the national government will co-operate with Georgia with its organized force and its years of experience in fighting the cotton boll weevil.

Dr. Knapp himself, who is head of the national boll weevil work, has had the Georgia situation under consideration, and the work will proceed under the most favorable auspices.

SUFFRAGETTES SWOOP DOWN ON CAPITOL

Present a Petition to 100 Congressmen

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 5.—Hundreds of women suffrage workers from all parts of the country reached Washington tonight ready to welcome tomorrow Mrs. Sarah Bard Field, of Oregon, and Miss Frances Joliffe, of California, as the envoys of western women voters, who crossed the continent with a mammoth suffrage petition to the incoming congress asking for a federal suffrage amendment.

After presentation of the petition to a hundred congressmen on the capitol steps the envoys, escorted by over a thousand women, will go to the white house to be received by the president.

The arrival of the petition and the reception at the white house will mark the opening of the first national convention of the congressional union for women suffrage, which will hold daily sessions throughout the week.

Mrs. Fields and Miss Joliffe were in Baltimore tonight accompanied by Miss Ingeborg Kindberg and Miss Marie Kinstedt, both of Rhode Island, who donated and operated the automobile in which Mrs. Field crossed the continent.

Upon the arrival on the last leg of their journey here tomorrow, they will be met by the parade of women and escorted to the east front of the capitol to present their petition.

When it started from the woman voters' convention at San Francisco in September, the petition was 18,000 feet long, and had 500,000 signatures of voters in enfranchised states. During the transcontinental trip thousands of signatures from non-suffrage states were added.

The procession to the capitol, with the petition borne on a banner of white cloth, will be headed by a division of women on horseback, followed by a group of women on foot bearing suffrage banners. Then will come a group of girls dressed in the purple, white, and gold of the congressional union, and wearing liberty caps.

Thirteen women, representing the twelve suffrage states and the territory of Alaska, will be led by a voter of Wyoming, the first suffrage state. The women envoys in their automobile will be followed by the 300 who will be received with them by the President. A cavalry escort will bring up the rear.

Signally Successful—Replaced Old J. P. System

Atlanta, Dec. 8.—The success of Atlanta's municipal court, which took the place of the old J. P. system in this city has been attested by the recommendation of the superior court to the governor for the reappointment of Judge L. F. McClelland of the municipal court for a period of four years.

Governor Harris is expected to sign the order shortly. Judge McClelland has brought to the administration of his judicial office the same brilliant legal ability and conscientious character that made him a successful state-wide figure in the practice of law prior to his appointment, and the proposed reappointment meets with general approval in Atlanta.

ATLANTA WOMEN ADEPT POKER PLAYERS

More Expert Than Their Lordly Husbands

Atlanta, Dec. 8.—The rapid increase in gambling among women in Atlanta, and particularly among women who are members of the church, is becoming the scandal and despair of a number of ministers whose eyes are open to the true situation, and who admit that it is apparently beyond their power to cope with.

Not only, it is said, do the fair ladies gamble for money at practically every afternoon bridge party, but both matrons and debutantes have also become adepts at poker and are included as a matter of course in jack-pot and stud games which were formerly regarded as the exclusive prerogative of the males.

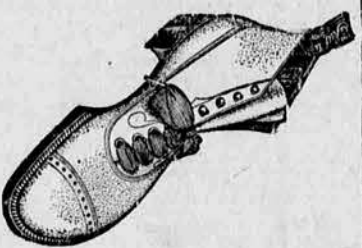

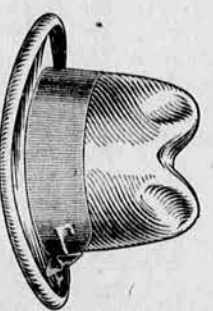

MOTOR RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the county of Hullo, Ga., to be held at Statesboro on January 8, 1916 to fill the position of motor rural carrier at Statesboro and vacancies that may later occur on motor rural routes from postoffices in the above mentioned county. The salary on motor routes ranges from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per annum. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory supplied with mail by a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in forms 2121 and 1977. Form 2121 may be seen posted at any post office in the county for which the examination is held, and form 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the offices at which the vacancy exist and where the examination is to be held, or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. The applicant must furnish, maintain and operate a modern motor vehicle with a carrying capacity of not less than 800 pounds and a net capacity of not less than 80 feet. Applications must be filed with their applications a statement of the equipment they will be able to provide in the event of appointment. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

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NICOTINE OUT OF TOBACCO

Government Experts Are Experiment-

ing With Plants in Penn-

sylvania.

Lancaster, Pa.—Uncle Sam and a

group of his plant tinkers from the

department of agriculture are work-

ing away at Landisville, Lancaster

county, to see how much of the nic-

otine they can take out of the tobacco

leaf without reducing the cigar to

quality of cabbage leaf.

For three years the government has

been experimenting along this line,

and it already has reduced the per-

centage of nicotine in tobacco from

3.5 to 1.31 per cent.

What's more, Dr. W. W. Garner of

the bureau of plant industry at Wash-

ington, says that the flavor of the

tobacco hasn't been changed a bit.

The government has an experimental

station at Landisville. Three years

ago an analysis of ten stalks of toba-

co was made and showed a nicotine

content of 3 1/2 per cent. The plant

with the lowest content was taken

and the seed planted the next year.

From this tobacco ten stalks were

selected and the same process gone

through. Last year it was found that

the nicotine content had been reduced

to 1.31 per cent.

Los Angeles.—To the heavy storms

which swept the channel islands in

The Boll Weevil Quarantine And the Necessity For It

Atlanta, December.—(Special.)—The new boll weevil quarantine line in Georgia has just been defined and marked out by the State Board of Entomology, effective Monday, December 6, and a rigid adherence to the rules and regulations laid down by the board will be insisted upon in order to prevent the spread of the boll weevil at a rate more rapid than under ordinary natural conditions.

The Mexican quarantine line, weevil, says the department, entered Georgia in August, and, owing to the very late season and favorable conditions, spread more rapidly than anticipated. It has now been found in the following counties: Decatur, Grady, Thomas, Baker, Lowndes, Berrien, Colquitt, Mitchell, Miller, Early, Baker, Worth, Tift, Dougherty, Calhoun, Clay, Quitman, Randolph, Terrell, Lee, Sumter, Schley, Webster, Stewart, Chattahoochee, Marion, Talbot, Muscogee, Harris, Upson, Pike, Meriwether, Truitt, Heard, Coweta, Fayette, Campbell, Carroll, Douglas and Harlson, a total of forty, or more than one-fourth of the cotton-growing area of the state.

Conditions Were Favorable

It has been an unusually favorable year for the weevil, and it has advanced uniformly from northeast Alabama and in southern Tennessee. If it had not been for the strict enforcement of quarantine regulations controlling the movement of cotton seed, hulls, corn in the sheck and such other articles as are liable to carry boll weevil, this pest would now be well established in every section of Georgia. At the first killing frost the weevil went into winter quarters, and one of its principal hiding places is in stored cotton seed. This creates the necessity for a strict enforcement of the quarantine regulating the movement of cotton seed from infested into non-infested territory.

The present actual boll weevil line in Georgia as just established, enters the state from Alabama at Newville in Harlson county, passes through Tallapoosa and Bremen, then through Horace in Carroll; through Bill Arp and Chapel Hill in Douglas county; slightly north of Red Oak in Campbell county; then turns southward and passes through Brooks in Fayette; just east of Molena in Pike and east of Thunder in Upson; slightly east of Junction City in Talbot and a few miles east of Ellaville in Schley; thence slightly west of Americus in Sumter, through Philom in Lee, through Shingler and east of Sumner in Worth; thence through Doss in Tift, just east of Nola in Berrien and

The subscription price it states to be \$10 per annum and its advertising rates of ten lines nonpareil at \$2.00 first insertion. Its daily news is from three to five weeks old. It speaks of President Johnson as doing a lively trade in the pardoning business.

The market quotations are interesting as compared to present day prices; in some instances they are lower than today and in others they soar to dizzy heights. Sweet potatoes per bushel, \$3.00 to \$5.00; full grown fowls, \$1.00 to \$2.00; bacon, 20c to 25c per pound.

Many of the business advertisements carry the names of individuals now known as street names only. The publication is well preserved considering its fifty years of age.

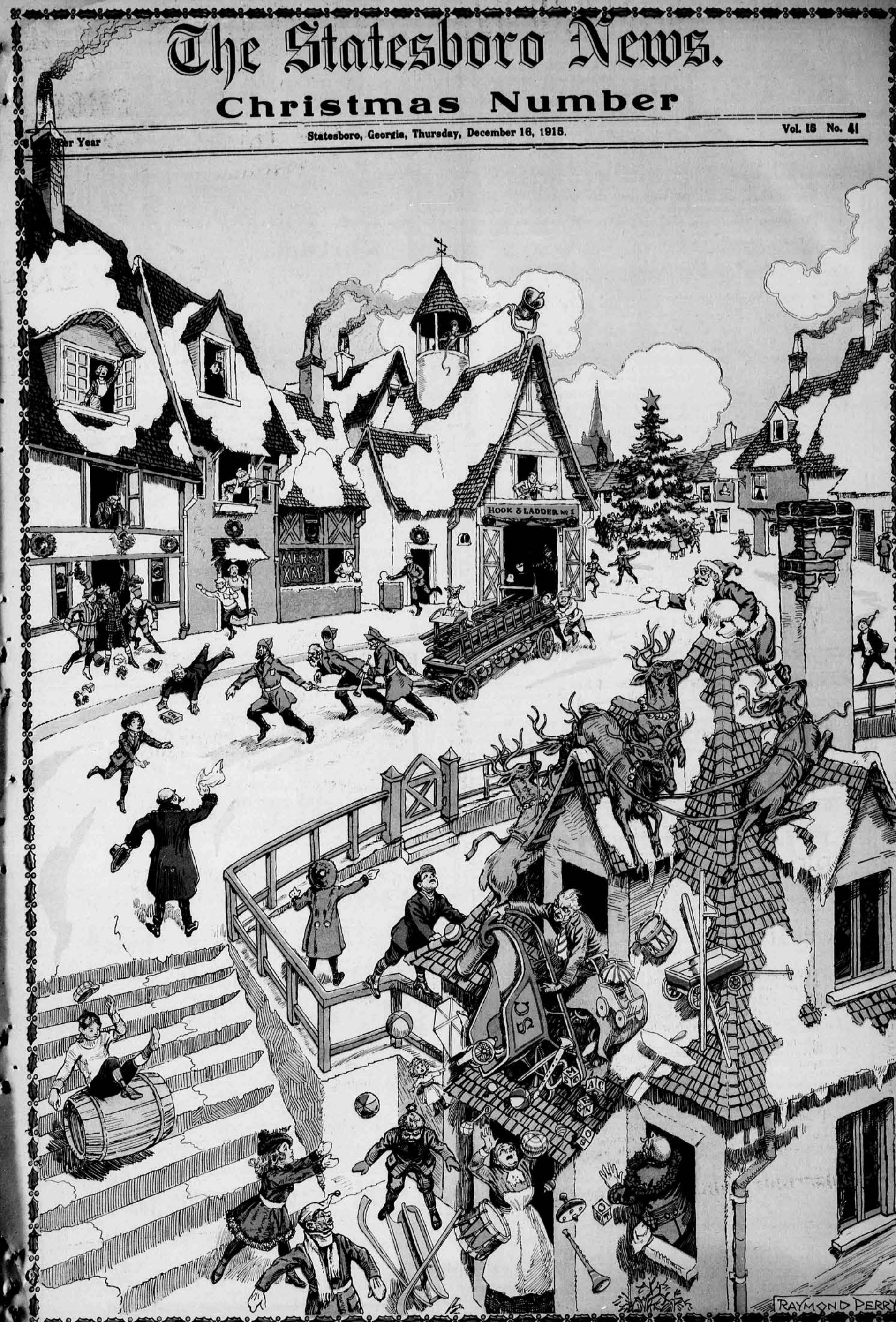
