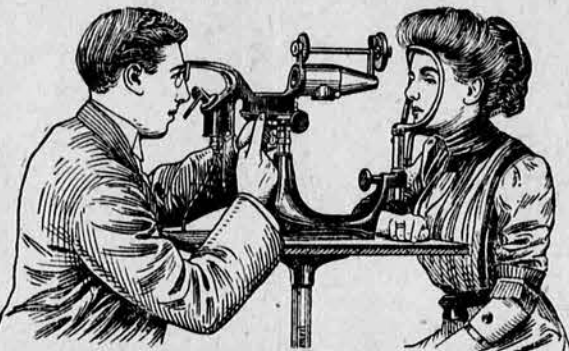

HOST OF PUBLIC MEN WILL BE AT DRAINAGE CONGRESS

Savannah, Ga., March 30.—Governors gauged, united senators not a few, congressmen from several states, railroad men of prominence, high department officials from Washington, engineers of international fame, state commissioners of agriculture from probably all the southern states, together with hundreds of business men of large affairs, will gather at Savannah April 22-25, in one of the most important conventions of the year, that of the National Drainage Congress, whose sole purpose is the stimulation of public interest in the drainage of the great swampy areas and lowlands of the country.

Naturally this congress is of supreme importance to the south, and more especially to the chain of states extending from the Potomac to the Rio Grande, each of which has within its borders many hundreds of thousands of acres of rich lands which, if reclaimed, will yield the largest crops known in the world's history.

Already great works along this line are under way in North Carolina. In Georgia the drainage of the Okefenokee swamp has engaged attention for some years, while the vast projects having as their object the drainage of the Everglades in Florida have captured the attention of engineers, land promoters, colonization agents, and leaders of agricultural development upon that state. In Florida, Georgia, and probably other coast states of the south, neighborhood drainage projects are also under way that will bring into cultivation considerable sections of now unprofitable and unhealthy land. South Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana all have their great drainage

NEGROES SENTENCED TO HANG GET RESPITE

By an appeal to the state supreme court the execution of Robert Paschal, William and George Hart, three Jefferson county negroes, under sentence to be hanged in the Fulton county jail on Friday for the murder of Mrs. Setts Liberty, of Louisville, has been automatically stayed.

These negroes were tried in the Fulton superior court because of the feeling against them in Jefferson county. They were convicted of first degree murder, and Judge B. H. Hill sentenced them to be hanged. The appeal to the supreme court was filed by Attorney Hugh Howell.—Atlanta Journal.

DORSEY IS WORKING HARD ON FRANK CASE

Solicitor Will Vigorously Resist Attorney's Motion for New Trial.

Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey, despite his refusal to discuss recent developments in the Leo M. Frank case, is known to be preparing evidence with which to fight the extraordinary motion for a new trial which attorneys for the defense will file in the criminal division of the superior court.

Although actively engaged in the prosecution of routine criminal cases each morning, he is devoting his afternoons to work on the Frank case.

City Detectives Starnes and Campbell, who have been working practically under his direction since long before the trial, consult with him each day.

Two of the big points of the defense in its coming motion will be the attack on the solicitor's theory that the fair found on the lake in the metal room was that of the slain girl, Mary Phagan, and the contention that the murder notes could not have been written in Frank's private office, as Jim Conley claims.

The solicitor is carefully preparing to fight these two points, and many witnesses are said to have been interviewed by the two detectives.

When it became known that the state's expert, Dr. H. F. Harris, had made a microscopic examination of the hair and decided it was not Mary Phagan's, the solicitor stated that in this matter he did not consider the opinion of the physician of value, and asserted he still believed the hair to be Mary Phagan's.

To combat the contention of the defense, he will have the testimony of several experts. It is said, who will swear that a microscopic examination of hair is not of greater

value than a visual examination.

The murder notes before the trial were in the hands of Solicitor Dorsey, and he made a careful study of them, including a microscopic examination of the almost obliterated signature now claimed by the defense to be that of H. P. Baker, a former master mechanic. He expected at the trial, it is said, that the defense would stress the point that the order blank on which the murder note was written bore the num. 1 in the blank for the date "1900—" instead of "1911—", and contend that such paper would not have been in Frank's office. As a result, he already has testimony in his hands with which to fight the defense's contention.

A statement that he would run for the unexpired term of the late Senator Bacon if the people of South Georgia wanted him to, was made in Atlanta on Friday by Senator William S. West, on his way from Washington, to his home in Valdosta, Ga.

Senator West is understood to be making his brief visit home for the purpose of sounding the sentiment of the people of the state in regard to the senatorial race.

While here it is believed that he will confer with Governor Slaton, and that they will decide which of them will announce for the unexpired term.

Senator West is said to have made the statement that he would not oppose Governor Slaton should the latter announce. It is generally believed that Governor Slaton will make the race.—Atlanta Journal.

GOV. SLATON TO RUN FOR SENATE

For Unexpired Term of Late Senator Bacon

Atlanta, April 4.—Gov. John M. Slaton tonight announced that he would make the race for the United States Senate to fill the place made vacant by the death of Augustus Bacon, after learning that Senator West, who fills the place by appointment, had issued a statement to the effect that he would not be a candidate.

His decision was announced after holding an informal conference with a number of friends for some time at his executive office in the capitol.

Entering the reception room, where the reporters were assembled awaiting his statement, he said:

"Well, you can state for me that I have decided to make the race for the unexpired term of the late Senator A. O. Bacon."

Only a few minutes before this announcement Senator W. S. West, on the eve of his departure to Washington to resume his duties there, had met the newspaper men and told them he would not be a candidate.

The withdrawal of Senator West and the announcement of the Governor did not come in the nature of a surprise. Friday Governor Slaton stated that his decision depended upon Senator West, and that if the senator ran he would not be in the race, and that he would give the South Georgian his support.

Senator West decided today, however, that he could not get the united support of the southern part of the state and under the circumstances he could not expect to run without quitting his duties at the capitol and devoting his entire attention to his race here. Senator West has always been noted for sticking to his post, and he felt that the situation at Washington was such that he could not spare enough time for his campaign in Georgia. In his statement tonight he said that he did not make the race mainly because he lacked the support of South Georgia.

Governor Slaton declared he had no formal announcement to make at present. Later on he would make a statement covering his position, he said.

Governor Slaton made no mention of his plan but it was reported here tonight that in the event he receives the nomination for the senatorship at the primary to be held August 19, he will then resign as governor.

Big Revival Closed.

The big revival meeting at the Baptist church came to a close Friday night with one hundred and eight converts as a result of the meeting. Nearly a dozen more have united with the church since the meeting closed, making it necessary for the pastor to set three different dates for baptismal purposes, the first installment being commenced last night, the second tonight and the third Wednesday night.

The pastor was assisted by Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Dow, of Kansas City, Mo., Dr. Dow having served the Baptist church here as pastor twenty-three years ago.

Registration Closed—The Heaviest in History.

The books of the county registrar were closed for the October election today at noon. It is estimated that nearly four thousand names will appear on the list, being by far the heaviest registration ever known in Bulloch county.

Tax Collector Atkins, who is registrar by virtue of his office, is sure that there are still about five hundred white voters in Bulloch not registered. He believes that over three thousand votes will be polled in the approaching primary.

The Statesboro district has between one thousand and eleven hundred names on the list, the city of Statesboro alone having near six hundred white voters registered.

The record of the Statesboro militia district shows more white voters than any one of twenty-five counties in Georgia, and the city itself has more registered white voters than the county of Bryan, more than twice as much as the county of McIntosh, and more than a score of other counties in Georgia.

The Statesboro district will poll in the neighborhood of one-third of the votes in the elections this year. This shows the town and county are both building up very rapidly.

TEACHERS' RELATION TO SCHOOL, COMMUNITY, PUPILS

(By Josie Wallace)

Our time as teachers naturally differentiates into two broad and general divisions, the school room duties and the out of school duties.

Our primary and most important consideration is our school room duties, but our obligations which are involved in the secondary, or out of school duties, are of no little importance.

We, as teachers, rightly stand very much in our relation to the community as does the minister. The minister is the moral instructor of the people; and we, as teachers, are to a marked extent, both moral and mental instructors of our pupils.

We, as teachers, with the necessary training and ability, are fully aware of the obligations and duties in regard to the children and parents with whom we are daily associated.

It is a solemn and high relation, and should not be lightly treated, but we should not forth our best efforts, and make better schools, and by so doing we will reap the respect of both pupil and parent.

I feel—well, I know—that one of the most deplorable evils existing in the field of teaching the young is that the teaching is being made a stepping stone to more lucrative professions.

Incidents are too numerous to mention where students are working their way through college by teaching summer schools. The desire of a student to pursue a college course is a laudable one, and we appreciate always a boy or girl who is putting forth every effort possible to obtain an education, for this means good citizens, and good citizens mean good laws and prosperity to our country; with moral influences thrown in the pathway of our rising generation of boys and girls we can look forward to the time when many old fathers and mothers may wear a pleasant smile, and

erased in a bosom of love for that boy or girl who has put forth this effort to seek an education and reach the top and wave the flag of fame.

But the fact, on the other hand, that to a great extent, by inexperience and ignorance, these are the teachers who are blighting the future prospects of many, and will be sorely regretted, when too late to correct the error.

It should be corrected now.

The best, and about the only solution I can think of, is to make higher scholarship and training a prerequisite, and the remuneration should be increased accordingly.

Teachers, this standard of excellence will be more rapidly attained by a complete understanding between we teachers and our constituents.

We as teachers should be a friend of our people, while I think most of us are, and our first endeavor should be to impress this fact upon the minds of our patrons as well as the pupils we are to instruct.

If this fact is well established many of our difficulties, which are existing in numbers of schools, will easily be eliminated.

We must not forget the fact that some difficulties are sure to rise between teachers and pupils, and when such difficulties occur the fact is chargeable to the pupil or pupils involved.

Some form of punishment must be administered to the guilty party in order that discipline be maintained. Now, if the needed punishment can be meted out with the co-operation in place of the antagonism and indifference of parents, our results will be obvious.

With the opportunities before us as teachers of Bulloch county for the betterment of the community, we teachers should not confine our efforts to the school room and children alone, but we, to be successful teachers, should take a prominent part in the social and strictly speaking, political affairs in which our work is involved. Our efforts in these latter directions should be exercised with tact and diplomacy, and not to the degree of petty or foolish interference, but lend our activities in a broad manner toward the enlightenment and general advancement of our people.

If we teachers will pursue such a course intelligently our position in any community will indeed be an enviable one, and great good will indeed result to ourselves and to the children and community for which we labor.

Friends, we cannot give too much attention to these very important steps, which so many of our teachers make stepping stones in their profession, and I hope that we may give our undivided attention to these duties and try to make our profession stand at the top and wave that great flag—success!

I wish to say before leaving you this evening that you should keep in touch with the commissioner's corner in our county papers, and I'm sure he would appreciate your support in this work, for as you all know no man was ever so wise that two could not be by co-operation obtain better results of the field work to be obtained.

Friends, may we not organize a correspondence through our county papers?

Isle of Arranmore, a small island lying off the coast of the British Isles, and having a population of about 90 persons, has been almost entirely submerged by a tidal wave.

Flashed by the road of the waters, the residents were able to escape with their lives, but suffered severe loss of property, chiefly in regard to their stocks of seaweed stacked ready for kelp-making. The tidal wave reached Arranmore also, but the conformation of the land there protected the neighborhood from the ravages of the waters.

A PERTINENT INQUIRY.

Editor Statesboro News.
I notice in the last issue of The News that your editor is in the race for representative. Now, in view of this fact, some people would like to know your position on two or three questions of public interest, viz.:
1. How do you stand on the Candler county question?
2. How do you stand on the question of free school books?
3. How do you stand on the no-fence law? Let's hear from you.
Respectfully,
A VOTER.

In answer to the above, I beg to say: That on the matter of fence or no-fence, that it is a question that, if ever submitted, will be done to the individual voter, and has no place in the Georgia legislature. It is a purely local matter, to be determined by the people among themselves, as they see fit.

In regard to free school books, I will say: With the state contributing about two and one-half million dollars per annum for common school education, I doubt the propriety of undertaking at this time to furnish books free to the children of the state; but, if elected, will support a measure that will place the printing and binding of these books in the hands of the state, same to be furnished the people at actual cost of production. I see no reason why the state should expend so large a sum for the education of its children and allow the school book trust to rob the same people who are being taxed to educate. Of course, I don't mean to be understood as opposing the school fund appropriation.

In regard to the Candler county proposition, I have this to say: For years I have been opposing the cutting of Bulloch county ter-

ritory. My position was so well known and understood in my last race that I received only one vote at Metter. Following this up, I went to Atlanta last summer and made the light against the creation of Candler county, along with a number of others. We succeeded, but the bill has been re-committed, and will come up early in the approaching session. This being true, I don't think that, if elected, I will be called on to pass on this question as a member of the legislature, inasmuch as it will have been disposed of by the present legislature. But, as a citizen, I want to say a few words in this connection:

I doubt the wisdom of further opposing the movement to create a new county at Metter. I have participated in this row and watched its effect. And I see nothing to be gained by trying to hold them in Bulloch county any longer. The people are practically alienated from us. They no longer feel an interest in the county's affairs, like other sections do. They have no candidates in the present contest for county officers. They had two in the last race, both of them being defeated, and, as a natural consequence, they feel like they are not a part of us, participating in the affairs of the county as they should do.

Feeling has run to the extent that they have withdrawn their trade from the merchants of Statesboro, and the only benefit that Statesboro, the county seat, derives from them is the money they spend here while attending court. I have always stood by Statesboro and Bulloch county; have always stood for those things that I thought were of benefit to our people. But, so far as I am able to see, the section to be embraced by Candler county will be of as much benefit to Statesboro and the balance of the county, with a county line running this side of it, as it is now. I would encourage a movement to come to an agreement on a line that would give the most gen-

eral satisfaction to the people in that section of the county to be cut.
The town of Metter is building up, and the section to be embraced is building fast. They are demanding from us back in return for their taxes the protection of property and the improvement of roads that leaves the old county no profit from having them here. This being true they cost us as much as we get out of them. Then there is no sense in forcing them to remain with us against their will and over their often repeated protest.

Bulloch is a great county, but her future greatness will not be in holding by force a people who want to leave us. The future of this county is not to be measured by a great mileage and covered by wide territory, but in the fact that our folks shall take up and build and improve those sections that are contented to remain with us.

If anybody is to suffer by the creation of Candler county it will be the people included in it, and if they want it let 'em have it. It will not take a dollar's worth of trade away from Statesboro or affect an acre of Statesboro or Bulloch county dirt.
I don't know how the people feel about the above. As a political proposition I doubt that it will be popular, in that for every vote I might get in Metter I might lose one somewhere else, if not more. But I do not believe in dodging a question or straddling a proposition. I have never yet been known to pick berries on both sides of the fence; I have never signed up and then violated that pledge. The people can always put their finger on me.

While I have not yet made a formal announcement yet, and will not do so until after the county primary, if at that time my posi-

tion seems to meet favor with the people, and there are not too many sores on me arising from the present primary, I may run for representative; on the contrary, I may not. I am interested in one of the races now before the people for the reason that it affects the business of my newspaper, and if my partisanship affects my race for representative, of course I will be eliminated. In other words, if I can remain a free and independent American citizen and be elected to the Georgia legislature all during the same year, I will appreciate the honor; but on the other hand, that in order to win, I must sit under a lid, will probably ask to be excused.
Hoping that the above makes my position clear, and trusting that the great public will see the justice of it, I am respectfully,
