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## ANDERSON EXPECTS TO BE A CANDIDATE

For Governor if Slaton Runs  
for the Senate, is His  
Present Intention

Atlanta, April 2.—President of the Senate J. Randolph Anderson of Savannah reached Atlanta today and is among the first arrivals in advance of the meeting of the state democratic executive committee, held in the senate chamber at 11 o'clock Saturday. Other well known Georgia politicians, aside from those who are already here, will arrive soon.

When asked if he expected to make two for governor in the event Governor Slaton runs for the United States senate, Mr. Anderson replied that such was his present intention. Mr. Anderson spent the day conferring with Atlanta friends regarding the situation.

The impression seems to be growing that Governor Slaton will enter the race for the senate and leave things open for the governorship. Definite announcement is expected from the governor almost immediately after the meeting of the state committee Saturday. Then things political will begin to hum.

A receiver is asked for. The amount of thousands and liabilities is not scheduled, but it is understood that the assets will be \$10,000 or \$15,000, and liabilities exceed that sum. The petition was filed by Girard M. Cohen, Esq., and Wilson & Rogers, representing the moving creditors.—News.

Foreign Countries Invited

to Send Over Delegates

Savannah, Ga., April 4.—The United States government has put the official stamp of its approval on the Fourth National Drainage Congress meeting at Savannah, April 22-25, by authorizing the secretary of state to invite foreign governments to send delegates.

The congress will be entertained by the municipality of Savannah, and an elaborate program of outdoor festivities has been proposed for the general public, thousands of whom are expected to take advantage of the cheap rates in effect for ten days on all railroads to the seashore.

Brooks County, Georgia, Preparing for a Tremendous Development Now.

Quitman, Ga., March 27.—The county of Brooks, in the richest farming section of the state of Georgia, is planning the most tremendous development campaign ever undertaken by a county in the south.

Before starting the campaign, they are seeking an effective slogan to be used in all the literature sent out during the campaign. The Brooks county Industrial Club, located at Quitman, Ga., is offering a cash prize of \$25.00 for the best slogan submitted. The executive committee of the organization, or a committee appointed by them, will go over all the slogans submitted and decide upon the one to be used.

The idea of those behind the slogan proposition is that they want a slogan which will direct attention and have a real "pulling power." In a discussion of the matter, the slogan of the Underwood Typewriter Company was mentioned, the same being "The machine you will eventually buy."

## GEORGIA MULE EATS EGGS AND CHICKENS

Animal of Wilkes County Develops Freak Habit; Even Eats Figs.

Washington, Ga., April 5.—A Georgia mule, which shows many of the canine's propensities for sucking eggs, is the latest freak of nature which has attracted attention in Wilkes county lately. The mule in question belongs to Mr. J. N. LeRoy, a prosperous planter of Tignall, twelve miles north of Washington, and when he first discovered the queer appetite of his mule, he mentioned it to his neighbors, who were loath to believe, demanding that they be given, under demonstration of the facts.

The Hon. S. A. Wooten, formerly representative from Wilkes county and now a candidate for the office of tax collector of Wilkes, is a near neighbor of Mr. LeRoy and vouches for every statement which has been made about the freak mule. According to Mr. Wooten's statement the mule actually hunts for hen's nests on the plantation and eats every egg that is in reach. The mule is also chicken eater, eating every chicken that comes into the lot and has been seen to get down on his knees to pull a hiding pig from under Mr. LeRoy's barn.

Atlanta, Ga., April 3.—Business men and politicians alike are eagerly discussing the possibilities of the plan outlined by Senator W. J. Harris, United States Census director, to save nearly a million dollars a year in the bonded indebtedness of towns and counties in Georgia by having the state endorse the bonds.

When I first found that Massachusetts was successfully using such a plan, said Sen. Harris, "I felt that I had learned much to be too good to be true. I searched for a fallacy. I went to the best financiers I knew and told them I wanted them to find the weak spot, to punch the idea full of holes. After going over the plan carefully they said, 'There is no weak spot. The idea is absolutely sound.'"

Senator Harris expects that Governor Slaton will endorse the plan and that it will be taken up favorably by the legislature next year. The idea, like all big ideas, is simple—Georgia bonds, that is state bonds—bearing three per cent, can be sold at par or nearly so. But the average interest which towns, cities and counties have to pay on bonds is five per cent, including expenses. If the state of Georgia endorses the city and county bonds the latter then becomes as good as straight state bonds. It is estimated that the savings that could be made in this way, if used as a sinking fund, and placed in banks at interest or invested in bonds, would in thirty years pay all the bonded indebtedness of the towns and counties in Georgia.

Atlanta, Ga., April 3.—With the help of other cities in Georgia and all sections of the south, Atlanta is going to put over the biggest grand opera season April 27th to May 6th that the world has ever seen. Indicative show that more people will attend grand opera during the seven days here than have ever attended opera in any city in the world.
