Candidates Are Still Shy.

The expected rush of candidates for representative on Saturday failed to materialize and so far only one man has braved the situation, when at least a half dozen were expected.

It seems that there is no disposition to rush this job and the stock of time for candidates seems to be fast disappearing.

There are a number of men, however, who are capable of very high Bulloch county interest in the Georgia legislature, provided they would make the race, or be believed that they could be elected.

As stated in our last issue, there are a number of issues in which the people are interested and on which the candidates are expected to place their position. The day of stragglers has passed and the man who has not backed up sufficient to back up a position, or judgment enough to take a position, is a mighty sorry specimen to send to the Georgia legislature.

In addition to the issues mentioned last week, there are some other things that the people might want to ask about. They want to know how you stand on the repeal of that detestable new tax collection law that was snuck through the last Georgia legislature, the people having never been consulted about it. A law was placed upon them which takes away from the farmers the right to sweeten the value of their own property. CAMPAIGN BOOZE GETS HEAVY LAMBASTING

Prominent Citizens Speak, and Orate Over Methods to Dispense With Campaign Whiskey Problem.

On Saturday morning, at 11 o'clock three assembled in the court house in this city perhaps one of the most remarkable mass meetings ever held in Bulloch county. The court house was fairly well filled with earnest men who had gathered for the purpose of discussing and dealing with the problem of the use of whiskey in the Bulloch county election.

The meeting was opened with Chairman Renfro presiding, and Secretary D. N. Riggs at his post. Judge Strange asked for expressions from the people when Hon. R. Simmons responded in his usual manner. Mr. Simmons stating that the resolution that was expected to be prepared could not be written too strong for him to subscribe to its terms. He was followed by Rev. J. F. Singleton and others. On motion of Col. J. A. Brannen a committee was appointed to draft a resolution, the committee consisted of J. A. Brannen, J. W. Wright and G. R. Trapnell, after being out a short while they returned with the following resolutions:

Whereas, it is a matter of common knowledge that in several of the last elections held in Bulloch county for the nomination of county officers whiskey was used by some of the candidates and their friends before the election and on the day of the election, and drunkenness was common around the polls in several of the districts of the county:

Now, we the people of Bulloch county, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby condemn and deplore the use of liquor in our primary elections, and we hereby call on all good people in every militia district of the county to withhold their vote and their support from any candidate or candidates who may endeavor to buy office with either money or liquor, and we earnestly request that every good citizen turn out for the primary to

One amusing feature of the meeting coming out towards its close was the effort of certain candidates to dodge the odium of having used whiskey, and when it was shown that it had been poured in their interest. A decided effort was made to shift the responsibility to other shoulders. It was evident that had not a clutch been put in the wheels of the movement the former candidates to deny, disclaim and dodge responsibility for the disgusting scenes in former campaigns, ere the meeting had closed it would have developed that all this movement to cut out campaign whiskey was necessary in as much as it would have demonstrated to the public that this practice had not been engaged in by any candidate in the past. Anticipating this the meeting was cut short and brought to a close at once.

However the man who runs his hands into his jeans and spends his good money for booze in the future for campaign use, will engage in a very unprofitable game, politically speaking. It was certain that with sentiment like it is in Bulloch the use of whiskey will drive away more votes than it will draw.

At the end of the meeting Chairman Renfro called attention to the fact that two nominees in the May primary had not qualified by filing their expense statement as required by law. They were Messrs. J. D. McElvyn and J. W. Denmark, nominees for County Commissioner. It was stated however that these gentlemen had filed their statement however but not in time described by law. A resolution was passed authorizing their names on the ticket in the August Primary when they will be voted for again and their nomination ratified by the people.

The county executive committee held a meeting in the afternoon and issued assessments on the candidates for Representative at \$10.00 each. They adopted the resolution as passed by the mass meeting and appointed a committee for each militia district to obtain evidence on the use of whiskey and report to the executive committee and to the next grand jury.

The Democratic Executive Committee of Bulloch county hereby declares the following rules and regulations to govern the Primary of the Democratic party to be held August 19th, 1914, and for the declaring of said primary for the county of Bulloch, to wit:

That the expenses of said primary election shall be defrayed by the following assessments: Congressmen \$35.00; Judge of the Superior Court \$17.00; Representatives \$10.00; and that same shall be paid in to the Secretary and Treasurer by noon of July 20th, 1914. That no entries or assessments shall be received after that time.

That the free-holders for said Primary shall be chosen by the Members of the Executive Committee from each District and shall be paid for their services as follows: Managers \$2.00; Clerks \$1.25; Bringing returns from the different county precincts \$2.00.

That the polls shall open and close as provided by law for election of Members to the General Assembly.

No candidate shall be declared the nominee of the Democratic Party of Bulloch County in that day when political prejudices ran high, when thousands of Georgians felt they were justifiable in voting for almost anything against Hoke Smith, they picked up "Little Joe" with force and arms, and with malice aforethought, literally sat him in the governor's chair. 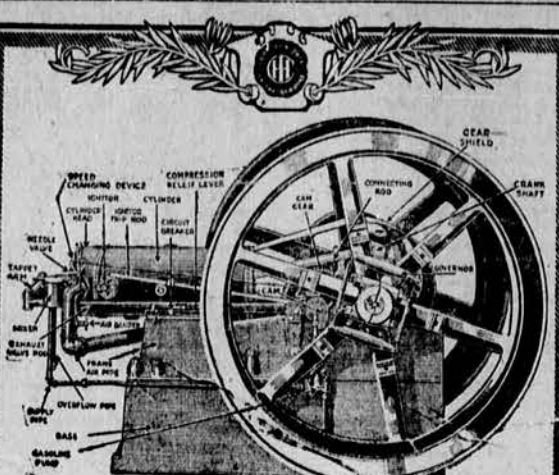

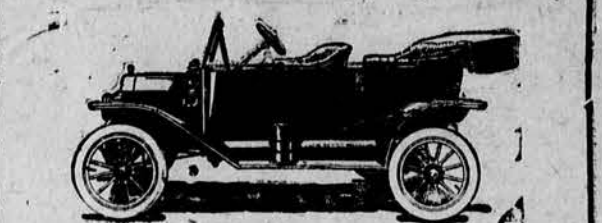

Express Office Burglarized

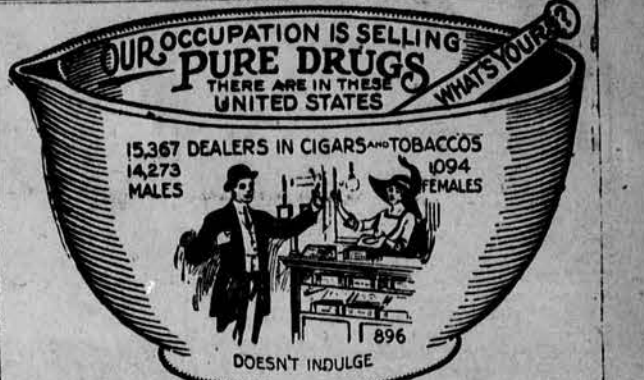
