WILL BE HARD FIGHT ON

#### CANDLER COUNTY

Emanuel County Voters Organizing to Vote Against it.

Swainsboro, Ga., Oct. 2.—As the time approaches for the general election in November there is a wide-spread sentiment against the creation of Candler county, among the people of Emanuel. The move is not confined to these people, but to all affected counties. These people intend to vote against the amendment whether they defeat it or not.

There are several reasons which prompt Emanuel county people to take this stand. First of all, is the patriotic desire to retain every inch of her territory. Second, the line comes too near the large towns in the county, especially Stillmore, where it misses the town only one and one-half miles. Third, it is likely to take one of Emanuel's representatives, and fourth, it will entail an increase in taxation among the people.

The people in the affected counties, knowing that Wheeler county passed with only 20 majority, feel that with the determination apparent in their fight against Candler, they will be able to defeat the amendment. The fight will be watched with interest, especially by the anti-new-county element.

T. B. Thorne Dead

Last Monday morning the home-folks were horrified to find that Mr. T. B. Thorne had died some time during the night.

Mr. Thorne had not been sick, but for some time, had not enjoyed as vigorous health as heretofore, but no serious symptoms were apparent. The suddenness of the demise was an awful shock to his sister, Miss Naomi, who lived with him.

Mr. Thorne was a type of the old-style southern gentlemen, scrupulously honest in his dealings, hospitable, almost to a fault, a citizen whom you could depend upon.

In his death Bulloch has lost one of her best men, one upon whose fidelity to trust, whose experience gave him weight in the councils of his county, whom she will miss.

Mr. Thorne leaves one brother, Stephen, and two sisters, Miss Naomi and Mrs. J. C. Brewton. To whom the hearts of all our people go out in sympathy.

The interment was at Fellowship church, two miles from his old home, near Stillson.

### BIG FEATURE DAYS FOR THE BIG FAIR

There Will be Something Doing Every Day of the Fair, Special Programs are Being Made Up for the Big Fair, Which Opens in Statesboro Next Tuesday Week, October 20.

The following schedule is being arranged for feature days for the big fair which opens here next Tuesday week.

Tuesday, October 20th will be generally known as opening and get ready day, it is hoped to have all the exhibits and midway attractions fully installed on Tuesday morning, during that day of course the finishing touches will be put on everything, and the main feature for that day will be the big horse race that afternoon for the three minute class. There have already a large number of entries for this race and it is expected that ten or twelve horses will be in the racing that day, the racing, however, will be on every afternoon, every day during the fair. Official notice of which appears elsewhere in this paper. An addition to the rules heretofore published to the races will be: the horses will be divided as follows, for instance in a race where the purse is \$100.00 the winning horse will get \$50.00, the second \$25.00, the third \$15.00 and the fourth horse in the race will get \$10.00, this is the established rule of the American Racing Association.

Wednesday, October 21st will be educational day, all the schools of the city and county will be admitted to the grounds for ten cents each. Governor John M. Slaton has been invited, together with State School Superintendent M. L. Brittain who will be the orators of the day. County School Superintendent B. R. Olliff has been asked to consult the schools and make up a programme which will be published next week in full.

Thursday, October 22nd will be set aside again as Savannah Day; also as Candler county and Evans county Days. Hundreds of people from Savannah came to see us last year on Savannah Day and they are expressing themselves as anxious to come again, the fact that Chatham county will have a magnificent agricultural display here this fall is expected to add interest to Savannah Day at the Bulloch County Fair. People from Candler county and Evans county, respectively, both counties of which embody Bulloch county territory will come in large numbers to mix and mingle with the people of the mother county, they are two of the latest stars in Georgia's crown, being Georgia's two baby counties, doubtless their people will come over in goodly numbers.

## MIDWAY ATTRACTIONS WILL BE THE FINEST EVER SEEN HERE

Best Shows Selected From All Parts of the World Will Adorn the Midway of the Big Bulloch County Fair Which Opens Next Tuesday Week, Oct. 20th.

Despite the fact that it has been announced time and again that a splendid and high class midway attraction will be presented the Bulloch County Fair, rumors are out that there will be "no carnival here," while it is true no regular carnival company will be allowed to play the grounds, yet a splendid aggregation of high class shows and riding devices will be here for the amusement of the people.

By reason of the fact that the management of the Bulloch County Fair controls the booking of a current of fairs leading up to the big Savannah fair, together with the fact that we are on the executive committee of the Georgia Association of Fairs, which is headed by the big state fair at Macon, makes it possible for us to make our selection of shows for the Statesboro midway.

The merry-go-round, ferris wheel and two small shows come here from Ohio, they play the Dalton, Ga. fair the week before the Bulloch County Fair, coming here direct from Dalton, Buckskin Ben's Wild West Circus and Deep Sea Curio Show, motordrome and several minor attractions come here direct from Coney Island, N. Y., along with it comes Trip to Mars and several other attractions, and it is probable that the Small Village of man eating savages will come with this aggregation. Metcalfe's Big Jungle Show which is now playing the state fairs in the middle west will be here together with several other shows and concessions. Then we have got a show coming here known as the biggest show in the world, weighing over 600 pounds and seven and one half feet tall. In addition to this will be the midway aggregation of the smallest people in the world, then we expect to have Macapapa Horse Show. In addition to this will be a number of others which will fill the midway to overflowing.

These shows carry with them at least three brass bands. There is a negro band of 16 pieces with the Macapapa Horse Show. There is an Italian band of 16 pieces with Dreamland Circus. There is a Woman's band of 12 pieces with Buckskin Ben's Wild West Show. ## EXTEND THE STATE ROAD TO THE SEA

Plan of Sen. Sweat. Would Like to Have it Terminate at St. Marys.

Waycross, Ga., Oct. 2.—It is the opinion of Senator J. L. Sweat, of the Fifth district, that in the event Gov. John M. Slaton calls a special session of the state legislature some action should be taken to protect the Western & Atlantic Railroad against being paralleled by the line proposed from Cartersville to Atlanta by the Louisville & Nashville. He would have the legislature safeguard the state's interest for all time by providing for the extension of the Western & Atlantic from Atlanta to the sea.

That such an extension could be built by the state within a short time is the belief of Senator Sweat. He feels that the state acquiring the southern line from Atlanta to Fort Valley, and the Atlantic, Waycross & Northern, chartered from St. Marys to Fort Valley, and a part of it built, and using a portion of the able-bodied civilians in the state the remaining link, 175 miles, could be rapidly constructed.

In addition to acquiring and developing the splendid deep water port facilities at St. Marys, Senator Sweat states that the line could be extended to Jacksonville, a distance of 32 miles, giving the state a magnificent trunk line. This road would extend from Chattanooga to Jacksonville, enabling the state forever to dictate freight and passenger rates and port charges, by reason of which, such a property could never be bottled up.

Discussing the revenue from such a trunk line, Senator Sweat said: "Not only would the immense income from the road maintain our public schools, but would be amply sufficient to support all the public institutions of the state, thereby saving the people from the burdens of taxation. Self preservation would justify the state in absolutely prohibiting the state-owned line being paralleled." He said he believed that it was unwise in permitting this to be partly done in the past.

Only a short session of the legislature would, in his opinion, be required for the enactment of the necessary legislation. "The expense for the extra session would be inappreciable to the great loss to be saved to the state," he continued, "and, moreover, while in session the legislature as was deemed best on the cotton question. Opportunity might also be afforded for the adoption of the Torrens land title system for the relief of land owners in better enabling the use of land as security for loans under the new currency laws and proposed rural credit. A ten days session would suffice for all these purposes."

Waycross, in common with all Georgia cities, is deeply interested in the future of the state road, and it has been felt here for several years that ultimately the road would reach the Atlantic. Senator Sweat has always advocated the extension of the road, and in his fight for such action has secured much support from every part of the state. If the legislature is called in extra session and the Western & Atlantic question is brought up as it appears it will be, Senator Sweat will be one of the leaders in the fight to prevent the state losing its valuable holding.

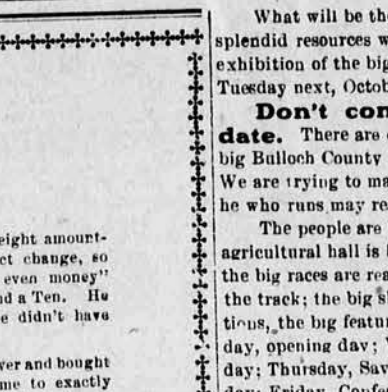

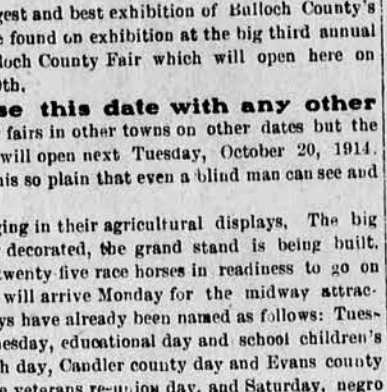
#### Negro Shooting Affray on Nab Row.
