When he took charge of the schools of this county there were only 32 pupils; now there are 105 schools and 4,000 pupils. Now the school fund was \$840; now it is \$13,737. This shows a most wonderful increase, both in pupils and funds. During this period great improvement has been made in school houses and school management. Commissioner Hagin visits the schools often, offering suggestions and getting statistics. He is in love with the work and is very proud of his teachers. He wishes us to say that the corps of teachers is exceptionally fine and believes there is none better in the state. Through his efforts the counties of Screven and Effingham joined Bulloch in an institute last year at this place. This year he invited Emanuel and Tattnall, and the former accepted. Tattnall would have come but for the inconvenience in getting here. He regrets very much that the small-pox in Swainsboro will probably keep the teachers who live in the town from attending. What Has Been Done This Week.

A great fight took place near Santiago last Saturday. Lieut. Col. Roosevelt's Rough Riders and Gen. Young's regular cavalrymen to the number of 900 were ambushed by 3,000 Spaniards, but the latter were driven back at great loss. Twenty-two of our men were killed and a number wounded.

The American and Spanish armies at Santiago are within two miles of each other, and a decisive battle is expected this week. Our troops now look down upon the doomed city, which is said to be at the starvation point. Our forces at the front number 6,000 Americans and 1,500 Cubans, and 5,000 more now leaving Tampa.

Returns of the American losses in the fight near Sevilla—called the battle of La Quisima—reviewed up to Saturday at 4 p. m., give sixteen killed and about sixty wounded or missing. Gen. Wheeler reported to Gen. Shafter twenty-two dead and between twenty and thirty wounded. The Spanish loss in the battle at Sevilla was much larger than ours. Many of their dead have been found, and cartloads of wounded Spaniards, it is known, were taken into the city.

The fight of the Rough Riders and regular troops near Sevilla is called the battle of La Quisima. Many deeds of heroism are reported. Capt. Capron and Sergt. Hamilton Fish, Jr., fell gallantly fighting. Surgeon Church dressed the wounds of a soldier between the lines under fire. Lieut. Col. Roosevelt led his men on a charge upon the Spaniards and he believes there is none better in the state. An Ordinance to regulate the riding and driving of horses on the streets of the Town of Statesboro, and to prescribe a penalty for the violation of same.
1st. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Statesboro, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same, that from and after the passage of this ordinance any person who shall drive or ride a horse or horses fast or recklessly on the streets of said town shall be guilty of disorderly conduct or be liable to a fine not exceeding five dollars.
2nd. Be it further ordained, that any person who shall drive or ride a horse or horses on the streets of said town at a faster rate than eight miles per hour shall be guilty of disorderly conduct.
3rd. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than one nor more than twenty-five dollars in the discretion of the mayor.
All conflicting ordinances are hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance prescribing the riding of bicycles on the streets and sidewalks of the Town of Statesboro, and to prescribe a penalty for violation of same.
1st. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Statesboro, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same, that from and after the passage of this ordinance any person who shall drive or ride a bicycle on the streets of said town at a faster rate than eight miles per hour shall be guilty of disorderly conduct.
2nd. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than one nor more than twenty-five dollars in the discretion of the mayor.
All conflicting ordinances are hereby repealed.
