

## HAD MUCH SUCCESS

Col. Dillingham Traveled Over the Globe Many Years.

### HIS WORK HIGHLY COMMENDABLE

His Life an Example of the Fact That Most Successful Men Begin With Very Little.

Of the many well known men who have visited this section in the past few years it is doubtful if any aroused the unlimited enthusiasm that Col. Frank A. The fire originated in the ceiling of the room adjoining the bedroom, and the cracking of the cinders as they fell to the floor aroused Mr. Deal from his sleep. Mrs. Deal and the children were hurriedly hustled into the yard and Mr. Deal returned to the house to try to save what he could. In the wardrobe which he succeeded in moving out were some garments for the children, a coat and vest of his own and his wife's purse, in which was her diamond engagement ring.

Besides a fine new piano, Mr. Deal lost a young cur puppy which he prized highly. Insurance on the house and contents amounted to about \$9,000. Mr. Deal at once began to rebuild on the site, and now has another residence well under way.

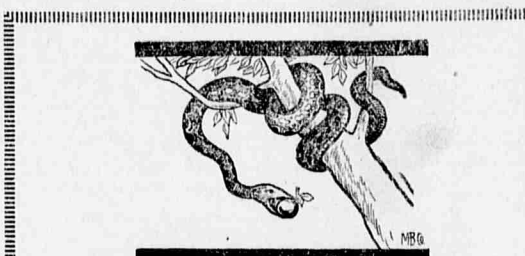

ONE DOLLAR PER YEAR

1,000 Lives and Millions of Property

Destroyed by Terrific Earthquake

San Francisco, April 18.—

Earthquakes and fire to-day have put nearly half of San Francisco in ruins. At least 200 persons have been killed, a thousand injured, and the property loss will exceed \$100,000,000.

Thousands are homeless and destitute, and all day long streams of the stricken districts to places of safety. It was 5:13 o'clock this morning when a terrific earthquake shook the whole city and surrounding country. One shock apparently lasting two minutes, and there was almost immediate collapse of flimsy structures all over the city.

The water supply was cut off, and when fires broke out in various sections there was nothing to do but let the buildings burn.

Telegraph and telephone communication was shut off for a time. The Western Union was put completely out of business, and the Postal Company was the only company that managed to get a wire out of the city. About 10 o'clock even the Postal was forced to suspend.

Electric power was stopped and street cars did not run. Railroads and ferry boats ceased operations.

Fires have been raging all day, and the fire department has been powerless to do anything except to dynamite buildings threatened. All day long explosions have shaken the city and added to the terror of the inhabitants.

Following the first shock there was another within five minutes, but not nearly so severe. Three hours later there was another slight quake.

Reports from districts outside of San Francisco indicate widespread damage. San Jose, fifty miles south, lost many buildings and from fifteen to twenty persons were killed.

The court house at Redwood city and other buildings collapsed. Menton Park, Burlingame and other fashionable places suffered greatly.

The greatest destruction occurred in that part of the city which was reclaimed from San Francisco bay. Much of the devastated district was at one time low marshy ground covered by water at high tide. As

the city grew it became necessary to fill in many acres of this low ground in order to reach deep water. The Merchants Exchange building, a fourteen story steel structure was situated on the edge of this reclaimed ground. It had just been completed and the executive offices of the Southern Pacific Company occupied the greater part of the building.

A portion of the new City Hall, which cost over \$7,000,000, collapsed, the roof sliding into the court yard and smaller towers tumbling down. The great dome was moved but did not fall.

The new postoffice, one of the finest in the United States, was badly shattered. The Valencia hotel, a four-story wooden building, sank into the basement, a pile of splintered timbers, under which were pinned many dead and dying occupants of the house. The basement was full of water and some of the helpless victims were drowned.

### Fires Followed the Quake.

Scarcely had the earth ceased to shake when fire broke out simultaneously in many places. The fire

department promptly responded to the first calls for aid, but it was found that the water mains had been rendered useless by the underground movement. Fanned by a light breeze, the flames quickly spread, and soon many blocks were seen to be doomed. Then dynamite was resorted to and the sound of frequent explosions added to the terror of the people.

All efforts to stay the progress of the fire, however, were futile. The south side of Market street, from Ninth street to the bay was soon ablaze, the fire covering a belt two blocks wide.

At 9 o'clock this evening 1,000 men from the Presidio arrived downtown to patrol the city streets. The Thirteenth Infantry, 1,000 strong, arrived from Angel Island a little later and went on patrol duty. The soldiers have been ordered to shoot down thieves caught in the act of robbing the dead and to guard with their lives the millions of dollars worth of property which has been placed in the streets that it may escape the ravages of the flames.

### Insurance Companies Will Pay.

Commissioner E. Myron Wolf announced at noon that the eighty-odd fire insurance companies interested had decided to pay dollar for dollar to every one insured with them. The companies will not discriminate between fire and earthquake and everyone insured will be paid to the extent of the loss. Only two of the companies affected are Pacific coast concerns, the others having principal offices in the East or in Europe, and all will stand the loss without danger of failure.

### DAMAGED AREA EIGHT SQUARE MILES

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—The area covered by the flames up to the present time is about eight square miles, or several hundred city blocks.

Very little, if any, water is available and the blowing up of buildings by dynamite is the only means of checking the flames.

Most of the buildings untouched by the flames have been greatly damaged by the earthquake shocks. The pecuniary loss at this hour (4 p. m.) is conservatively estimated at \$100,000,000.

### Felt at Washington.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—The weather bureau this afternoon issued the following special report regarding the San Francisco earthquake:

"The great San Francisco earthquake of April 18, 1906, was registered upon the Bosch Omori seismograph at the weather bureau office at Washington, beginning at eight hours, nineteen minutes, twenty seconds, seventy-fifth Meridian time. The record shows a disturbance of considerable magnitude at Washington, although not severe enough to be felt by individuals."

### Terror Indescribable.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18.—The terror and excitement is indescribable. Most of the people were asleep and rushed into the streets undressed. Buildings swayed and crashed, burying their occupants. There was the greatest panic in the down town hotels.

The biggest damage was done to buildings south of Market street, where there are mostly frame and tenement houses. Fires occurred in every block in that district. A disastrous fire broke out on the south side of Market street and is now within one block of the Palace hotel. The water mains have burst and the fire department is practically helpless. Confusion exists and all business is suspended. Neither the Palace nor St. Francis is gone; that is, as far as the outside goes, but the inside plastering is practically helpless.
