





## Speed Reading

It is quite evident that individuals are possessed with different talents. We have often been amazed at reports of an individual's ability to read thousands of words in a minute and digest those thoughts and ideas.

We have always felt that those who read at a moderate rate allowed themselves to digest more than the speed readers, although this has been contradicted by some authorities.

Now we have reports that some of the speed readers can read as many as eighteen thousand words a minute. Recognizing that there is an art to reading, and that one can improve his reading tremendously by studying and practicing the art, we would view with some skepticism the retention powers of an individual reading

quickly. After "Gone With The Wind" was published, if memory serves us correctly one lady claimed that she read the entire book in less than a day. At the time, we marveled at the feat but now it would be a project of minutes or hours, rather than a day.

We are appreciative of the development of reading methods which have made great progress in the last few years. The reader must remember, however, that this speed is not the objective. Retention and absorption of the ideas expressed and the ability to see beauty in the method of expression are the keys to fruitful and enjoyable reading.

## Latest Fashions

In Paris the latest fashions have had the clothes worn in a dither and it seems several "daring" new designers are once again setting millions of fashions for another change in styles.

The world of fashion is a dizzy one and the editor is no expert in this field. However, it doesn't take an expert to see how the style manipulations in the industry produce hundreds of millions of dollars worth of new sales, when a current style is suddenly outdated with something "daring."

For example, if skirts are short (as they are now) and are suddenly lengthened millions of women find themselves with outdated skirts. And many women, who follow the dictates of the fashion industry like sheep, discard old dresses and suits, which have short skirts, and

go through the buying process to get themselves fitted out in the latest fashion.

Designers know if they don't force the girls to make that dash to the stores for the latest thing that the industry would not have nearly as much business, nowhere near the "new" business they create with a change of styles.

Of course, not all women fall for the style-change manipulation but most of those who can afford it feel they have no choice. It is difficult for women not to pay the price and conform. And so it goes year after year. And there is no end in sight. This year's "latest" will suddenly become obsolete next year, or year after next, and these very new designs of the fashion industry will look old and terribly out of date. And the process will start all over again.

## Economic Indicators

One indicator for our economy is the number of unemployed. The Secretary of Labor, recently, announced that a drop in the unemployment rate fell to 5.3 per cent of the total work force. This followed a period when the unemployment rate had been climbing during the previous month, and the present rate is the lowest since May of 1960 — more than two years ago.

Shortly after the release on unemployment, The Wall Street Journal released its quarterly survey of earnings results and prospects. The Journal reported that corporate profits in the second quarter held close to record peace rates achieved in the two preceding quarters, and seemed likely to remain close to the same rate in the current three months.

The article further stated that the nation's total corporate profits for the past quarter would be at the annual rate of \$26.2 billion.

This would compare with a rate of \$25.9 billion estimated earlier for that quarter.

Some of the results of the survey, with approximately five hundred corporations reporting, shows autos and auto equipment up 42.9 per cent from a year ago, aluminum companies up some 36.7 per cent, textiles up 54.4 per cent, railroads up 79 per cent, electronics up 25 per cent, department stores up 29 per cent, aircraft makers up 20 per cent. On the other side of the ledger, the steel industry showed a decline. There were only about six industries showing a decline, the steel manufacturers showed a 19 per cent drop, to bacoos which showed a 5.5 per cent drop, and movies showed a 7.6 per cent drop. These were the only significant industries showing substantial decreases in taxable profits.

All in all, the economic situation for the country looks good, although the stock market does not reflect the picture.

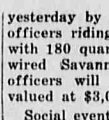
