## Health Department issues warning on Jequirity bean

In recent weeks, the Jequirity bean has made its appearance in the Southeastern States in several retail novelty stores as a bean used in necklaces or on dolls or similar toys.

Dr. John Mooney of the Bulloch County Health Department would like to alert everyone to the highly poisonous quality of this bean. If chewed by a child, it can cause violent sickness in hours and death within twelve days. The bean is small, hard-shelled and either black or red and black. "The Jequirity bean is attractive but deadly," says Dr. Mooney. "Please check your children's toys, and prevent an accident that could be fatal."

Anyone seeing these beans for sale in any fashion, should notify the Bulloch County Health Department at once.

## Academic program studied by faculty

For the past eighteen months members of the Georgia Southern College faculty have been engaged in a thorough examination of the academic program and the services of this college which culminated in a 290 page report to the Commission on Colleges and Universities. This is in preparation for a three-day visit by a five-member committee sent by the College Delegate Assembly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools charged with the responsibility of accrediting institutions of higher learning in the southern region of the United States. The committee will be on campus November 4.

The members of this committee are: President Leo Jenkins, Chairman, East Carolina College; Dean Etter Turner, Dean of Women, Stetson University; Mr. S. B. Gribble, Assistant to the Director of the Library, University of Kentucky; Dean Jack W. Rollow, College of Arts and Sciences, Florida State University; and Dr. George N. Dove, Director, School of Arts and Sciences, East Tennessee State College.

Georgia Southern College was first admitted as a member of the Southern Association of the Colleges and Secondary Schools in 1935. Once an institution has been accredited by the Southern Association, it is necessary that the institution undergo a self-study every ten years. This is identified as a periodic visitation program.

The 290 page report which will be used by the committee includes studies on Purposes of the College, Administration and Organization, the Faculty, the Program of Graduate Study, Curriculum and Instruction Program, Research, Special Activities, the Library, Financial Resources, Plant and Physical Facilities, Student Personnel, and Alumni.

After the visit, the members of the Visiting Committee will make a report to the Southern Association from which recommendations concerning the accreditation of the College will be made.

Dr. Jack N. Averitt, Chairman of the two-year Self-Study project states that "the basic purpose of the institutional evaluation is to conduct an examination of that which exists and analyze the results in such manner that recommendations and projections will improve the total effectiveness of the College program. Against the backdrop of factors that place a premium on institutional dynamism, creativity, and academic excellence, and institution develops unique characteristics that are pursued within a climate of diversity."

"All who have participated in the study agree that Georgia Southern College has great potential as an institution so do they subscribe to the corollary that the institution can fulfill its purposes only if sound academic programs, a well-trained staff, and an efficient organization continue to be the primary concern at the institution," Dr. Averitt said.

### SHS Blue Devils Whip Perry 38-19

The Statesboro Blue Devils, using their most powerful at-  
tack of the 1962 season, scored  
in every quarter as they over-  
powered Perry, 38-19.

Each member of the Blue  
Devils starting backfield scored  
with senior halfbacks Jim Hines  
and Billy Cone leading the way.  
Hines started the scoring with a  
3-yard TD early in the first  
quarter. Gains of 16 and 14  
yards by Hines and a 13-yarder  
by Billy Cone were the big plays  
of the 69-yard drive.

The Perry Panthers fought  
back and tied the score when  
Dozier Hasty swept right end  
for ten yards and a TD.

The Blue Devils marched back  
61 yards in seven plays to take  
back the lead. Jim Hines did  
the honors as he knifed 24 yards
