### Deadline to qualify as candidate in city election is November 21

As of Friday, November 16, at noontime, the incumbent mayor, W. A. (Bill) Bowen, was the only person to qualify as a candidate for the office of mayor. Mr. J. Brantley Johnson is the only person to qualify for the position on the City Council to succeed himself, and Mr. Henry C. Lanier is the only person to qualify for the position on the City Council to succeed himself.

The deadline for qualifying is Wednesday, November 21, at 12 o'clock noon.

Mr. Julian Hodges, city clerk, estimates the number of qualified voters for the city election set for Friday, December 7, at about 3,000. Last year (1961) 2,682 citizens were qualified to vote in the election on December 1, when Mr. O. C. Banks, Mr. A. B. McDougald and Mr. T. E. Rushing were elected to the City Council. The year before (1960) 2,459 were qualified to vote in the election in which Mayor Bowen was re-elected mayor and Mr. Johnson and Mr. Lanier were elected councilmen.

A candidate who wishes to qualify for a place on the City Council must take the specific place he seeks on the city council at the time he pays the qualifying fee and becomes eligible to participate in the election as a candidate. Candidates must qualify with Mr. Julian Hodges, city clerk, at the city office on Schold Street.

### Statesboro's milk shed is found ok

An inspection of the Statesboro Milk Shed has been conducted by personnel of the State Health Department. The purpose of the inspection was to determine the percent compliance of the shed in the interest of the U. S. Public Health Ordinance covering milk.

An inspection of each dairy which sends milk to the shed was made. The local pasteurization plant was also inspected.

The Bulloch County Health Department has been notified the inspections revealed that the Statesboro Milk Shed has a 95.12% compliance with the U. S. Public Health Service Ordinance.

The above high percentage of compliance assures the milk consuming public that the milk supply is produced and delivered to them in a safe and clean manner.

### Business hours set for Statesboro

Mr. Charles M. Robbins Jr., president of the Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce, announced this week the hours which have been established for the Thanksgiving and Christmas Season to be observed by the merchants in the city.

Stores will be closed all day on New Year's Day, Tuesday, January 1.

Send your Christmas cards by first class mail, using the new 4¢ Christmas stamps, to secure priority of dispatch and delivery, forwarding without additional charge, and return to you without cost, providing you put your return name and address on the envelopes. Also, Christmas cards sent First Class may be sealed and carry written messages.

Separate your Christmas cards into "Local" and "Out of Town" bundles, using the handy labels you can secure from the Post Office or your letter carrier.

Stock up on the new 4¢ Christmas Postage Stamps. They will "dress up" your Christmas cards and gift packages.
