Work on 2 GSC dormitories is progressing almost on schedule

The progress in construction of the new dormitories for Georgia Southern is reported to be almost on schedule, according to Dr. Zach S. Henderson, President of GSC.

The contract to begin the construction of the new housing facilities was awarded to River E. Worrell Construction Company of Savannah on March 16, 1962. The new dorms are scheduled to be ready for student occupancy by September of 1963. Dr. Henderson stated that if construction is kept at the same pace, the facilities would be ready by then.

The two seventy-five room structures will house approximately 450 students at maximum capacity when completed. The location of the new women's residence hall will be between the Marvin Pittman School and Vezey Hall. The new men's dormitory is located behind Sanford and Cone Halls on the hill facing the baseball field. Each building is approximately 300 feet in length.

An area-wide carpenter's strike in early September brought progress of the two dormitories to a standstill for a period of about three weeks. Before the strike, construction work on the buildings was on schedule, according to Dr. Henderson.

Others plans for campus construction in the near future include new tennis courts which are to be constructed in the area next to the W. S. Hanner Building sometime during winter quarter. Dr. Henderson stated that these courts will be refined and it is hoped that they will be ready for use during spring quarter.

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Special train will bring Santa Claus to Statesboro, Friday, December 7

Mr. Charles M. Robbins Jr., president of the Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce, announced today that the annual Bulloch County Santa Claus Special Train will bring Santa Claus into Statesboro on Friday, December 7.

Mr. Al Gibson, executive manager of the Chamber said that the Santa Claus Special will make three trips that day in order "to give all the kids in Bulloch County an opportunity to ride the train with Santa Claus."

The first trip, for pre-school children, will leave the Chamber of Commerce depot at 11 o'clock, Friday morning, December 7. This is the "Kiddie Special" and will be referred to as the "Blue Train." It will return to Statesboro with Santa at 12:30 p.m.

The second trip, "The Green Train," will leave the Chamber of Commerce depot at 1:30 p.m. and will return at 2:30 p.m. This train is for the children from elementary school and will be transported to the depot by bus. "The Yellow Train" will leave the depot at 3 p.m. and will return at 4:30 and is for the children of Statesboro.

Tickets for "The Blue Train" or pre-school train will be on sale in the Chamber of Commerce office starting Monday, December 3. All pre-school children must be accompanied by parents or other adults. The tickets will be sold on a "first come - first served" basis and all parents of the year children of Santa are urged to pick up their tickets. The cost of the ride will be 25¢ for children and 50¢ for adults.

Tickets for the other two trains will be handled through the schools throughout the county. County schools will send buses to meet the 1:30 P.M. train and the Statesboro children can purchase their tickets at the school which they attend.

Participation on the train will be limited to the first three grades in all schools, according to Mr. Robbins.

Joe is partly right, of course. There are times when it would be more comfortable for a Catholic to miss Mass, more enjoyable to have steak instead of fish on Friday, and there are other laws and duties imposed by the Church that may conflict at times with the whim or convenience of the individual.

Observing these things, an outsider may well wonder why Catholics submit to such discipline. Is it because of fear, as Joe Page suggests? And with all the "do's and don'ts" imposed by the Church does it really pay to be a Catholic? Nobody knows better than a Catholic that his religion is not an easy one. It requires him to obey serious laws and fulfill burdensome duties which he would not have to do if he were not a Catholic.

What is it, then, that impels hundreds of millions of people to remain Catholics instead of choosing an easier, less disciplined spiritual life?

Catholics remain steadfast in their faith primarily because they believe it to be the religion given to us by God Himself for the salvation of our souls. They believe, as they have from the time of the Apostles, that the Church was founded by Jesus Christ and invested with the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Truth, to insure the infallibility of its teaching.

But Catholics also believe their religion agrees with common sense.
