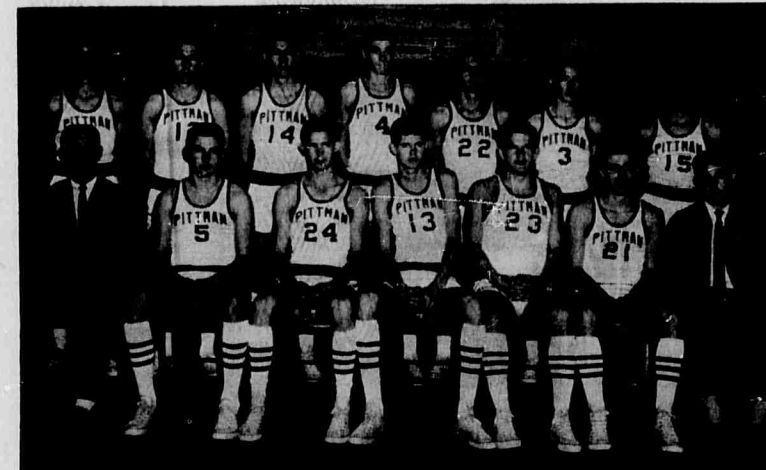




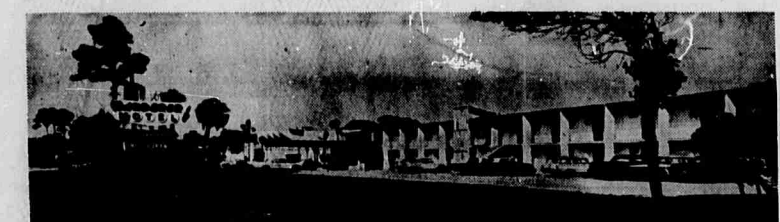

## Pittman High Rams have tough basketball schedule for 1962-63

"We're playing a pretty tough schedule this year, and we're really going to have to stay on the ball in order to have a good season. This, sitting quietly, Roger Parsons, coach of the Marvin Pittman Rams, commented on his 1962-63 basketball team. This is the senior year for his starting five. "They've been playing together since their freshman year and they really work together. Their spirit of teamwork has made it pleasant during the past three years." But what Coach Parsons might have meant about "tough season" was that his Class C Rams will be playing a number of B ballclubs during the season.



As is the other teams of Bulloch County, the Marvin Pittman Rams are looking forward to the Statesboro Jaycee Bulloch County Tourney to be held on December 21 and 22. Played in the W. S. Hanner Building, Georgia Southern College, the four teams will compete in a double elimination contest. Go into their fourth week of competition, the Rams have faced Oak Park, Bryan County and Port High School and posted a 3-1 record. By tournament time, they will have seen competition between themselves and Savannah Country Day, Screven County, and Jenkins County.

"We are hoping for a good year. We work hard and the boys are anxious to do well. But as basketball goes, sometimes it's right, sometimes it's not but rest assured we'll be trying."

## Big, thick book tells of fine people who pay taxes

It is a big thick book, size eight and one-half inches wide and eleven inches long, and about an inch thick.

It was written by State Revenue Commissioner Dixon Oxford of Atlanta. It's an interesting book because it has so many characters in it. None of them are heroes or heroines, but just fine people like most Georgians, who pay their taxes as they are required.

The central theme of this book is that every character in it has a sum of money due him or her. For you see the book is a list of persons claiming withholding tax refund checks, whose checks have been mailed to them at the address shown on their tax returns and which have been returned by the post office undelivered.

And in the long, long list of names are three who give a Statesboro address on their tax return. They are:

Mr. J. E. Hill of Route 2, Statesboro, John E. McCrean and P. T. 241 North Main Street, Statesboro, and Robert W. and Carol J. Murff, Route 5, Statesboro.

The law provides that persons entitled to tax refund checks must claim them within ninety days after publication of such list and that refunds of such amounts will not there after be made unless formal application for refund is made to the State Revenue Department.

According to Mr. Oxford, any person whose name appears in the list in the book should communicate IN WRITING with the State Revenue Department, Tax Refund Office, Room 515, State Office Building, Atlanta, Georgia, in order to obtain the refund. Persons claiming refunds must submit a Social Security Number and signature as shown on the tax return.

The "book" was published on October 1, 1962.

Braswell is elected city councilman; Bowen and Johnson are re-elected

Albert M. Braswell Jr., Statesboro businessman making his first bid for public office, defeated incumbent city councilman Henry C. Lanier in the only contested race in the city election here Friday, December 7.

The vote was 771 to 594. Only 1,381 voters of the 2,771 turned out for the single race. In the city election two years ago, 2,008 of a registered 2,459 went to the polls.

In the election last Friday there were 16 ballots thrown out.

Mayor W. A. Bowen was re-elected without opposition, as was incumbent councilman J. Brantley Johnson. Terms of office begin in January and are for two years.

The other councilmen are A. B. McDougald, T. E. Rushing and O. C. Banks.

Judy Hagan, Mayor's fourth-grade daughter, defeated incumbent city councilman Henry C. Lanier in the only contested race in the city election here Friday, December 7.

Jehovah's Witnesses TO HOLD THREE-DAY BIBLE CONVENTION HERE

Jehovah's Witnesses will hold a three-day Bible convention in Statesboro, December 28-30. It was officially announced today by J. C. Carrington, local president. Sponsors for the assembly will be the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society of New York.

The National Guard Armory is to be used and more than 500 ministerial delegates are expected to attend from upwards of 17 congregations in southeast Georgia.

The 1962 taxes are now due and payable, the Georgia law governing the collection of ad valorem taxes requires that current state and county taxes be paid no later than December 20.

Other sale days will be Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22. Sale hours will be 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Proceeds of the Christmas tree sale will go into the Kiwanis Club's Southern College Scholarship Fund.

Kiwanians urge citizens of this community to help them support this program by buying Christmas trees from them during these days.

H. Wyatt's store; E Community 1547th district, O. M. Hagan's store; F Community 129th district, ASCS office and County courthouse; G Community 48th district, Emmit Lee's store; H Community 46th and 1575th districts, Willie Al-

len's store and Ollie Finch's store; I Community 1716th district, regular voting place.

Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Chairman Quattlebaum explained that every effort has been made to inform farmers about the allotment-quota program, so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all the voters. Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those who engaged in the production of the upland cotton crop in 1962, approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting is necessary if the quotas are to go into effect.

Issues to be decided in the December 11 referendum are (1) quotas or no quotas, and (2) the level of price support to be available for the 1963 upland cotton crop.

## Inquiring reporter

Recently Senator-elect Kendrick unveiled a proposal for creating a network of junior colleges by adding thirteenth and fourteenth grades to larger high schools throughout the state. It is stated that, by using slightly expanded teaching staffs and school facilities with extra rooms added, the thirteenth and fourteenth grades would be far cheaper than building all the junior colleges the state needs.

Four Statesboro High students were asked to give their opinion on this subject.

Kathy Murphy (junior) . . . "Yes, I believe this proposal would be cheaper, but there is much on the high school level that is needed before they branch out into the college territory. There is a crying need for more vocational and agricultural training in our high schools."

Jack Futch (senior) . . . "I firmly believe that a thirteenth and fourteenth grade, though not wholly taking the place of junior colleges, would expose everyone, at public expense, to higher than secondary education. I believe it is imperative that students of today have a higher intellectual background than previous generations to prepare them for the problems of life as it exists today, beyond secondary education. This principal applies not only to the students who are to be trained for the professions, but to those going for doctors' degrees as well."

Benny Cannon (junior) . . . "I would be for the proposal for the creation of the thirteenth and fourteenth grades if some stipulation were added to the effect that a student would be able to specialize in some field during the two years and that upon graduation he should be recognized as having graduated from a two year college program. Such a proposal would not only help cut state spending but would also enable some to further their education who would otherwise be unable to do so. It should also be compulsory for those who intend to graduate with high school diploma to attend the extra two years and receive the junior college credit unless planning to attend some other institution after the twelfth year. This requirement for graduation would tend to increase qualifications

of high school graduates in applying for jobs after graduation and would give them a chance for specialization without the expense of a regular college or vocational program."

Roselyn Rosel (senior) . . . "I think that Senator Kendrick's plan is a good one because it would allow the more moderate income students to obtain a college education for those who wish to attend college at a cost which they could afford. At the same time, the expense to the state would be less than that of maintaining a separate junior college. Yet, they would be able to procure better personnel and more advanced facilities by combining with a local high school than for more vocational and agricultural training in our high schools."

I think this is a good sign. It is not present in most towns throughout the state. It's better than a hundred industry seeking committees. I think it reflects a great asset of this community, the conviction of future progress and growth.

Rep. Hagan to visit here December 20

Congressman Elliot Hagan will spend Thursday afternoon, December 20, in Statesboro, according to an announcement received here today. He will be in his mobile trailer office from 2 o'clock until 5:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon on the courthouse square. He invites the people of the Bulloch County and this area to visit him.

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The Weatherman, last Thursday morning, December 13, established a new record for Bulloch County when the thermometer registered an official low temperature of 8 degrees.

The 8 degree record is the lowest ever recorded in the county since the official U. S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau was established in 1907 near the home of Mr. W. C. Cromley at Brooklet.

Mr. Cromley reported early Thursday morning, December 13, that his official instruments recorded the new low, which is two degrees lower than the previous record low of ten degrees recorded on February 3, 1917.

A check with many of the service stations in Statesboro reveals that there were "runs" on the stations for anti-freeze, but it was "more to check on the anti-freeze already in the cars to see if it were enough to take care of the anticipated low." It was not the frantic "run" that they experienced back in 1950 when the thermometer dropped so fast in such a short time. One service station operator said that the 1950 experience taught anti-freeze a lesson, "then, too, there was plenty of warning for last week's deep freeze."

Several tractors dealers, agreed that as many as 75 percent of the tractors in the county have either cracked cylinder heads or blocks or radiators. One dealer reports more than 100 tractors in his shop with scores of telephone calls from farmers asking about their machines. All the dealers are working overtime on them, as fast as they help and equipment will allow.

One man who specializes in diesel engines and tractors said he had 191 in his place, and about 300 more had been reported to him and he said, "I haven't even got around to fixing my own car."

To be specific, 398 tractors are in repair shops, 93 cars were reported to be in the shop, and there must be hundreds more that will come in later.

We are trying to take them in as fast as they come in. The dealer said he had never seen anything like it. Five years ago.

One machine shop reports 65 water pumps. An electric shop reports 60 water pumps. Both say there must be hundreds more that will come in later.

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
