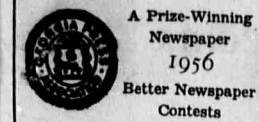

Fort Stewart general talks to Rotarians

Brigadier General Paul Russell Weyrauch, commanding general of Fort Stewart, told members of the Statesboro Rotary Club at its regular Monday meeting that the Army takes the very best care possible of its soldiers after they have finished their working hours.

Citing an example of the Army's attitude, he made reference to a situation which exists in Long County on U. S. 301, where soldiers on leave from Fort Stewart sometimes are given rough treatment at the hands of the authorities, when the facts reveal that the treatment was unwarranted.

He told the Rotarians that Fort Stewart includes 286,000 acres of land valued at \$50,000,000. The annual budget for the fort is about \$16,000,000. It is the largest training base in the U. S. from an acreage standpoint.

He explained that part of the Fort's objective is to help train National Guardsmen, adding that the National Guard is essential and "the better they are trained the better off we are."

The principal objective of the Fort is training for tanks and anti-aircraft.

The general was presented to the club by Bill Bowen, who had charge of the program. He began his service in the Army with his graduation from the U. S. Military Academy as a second lieutenant in 1930. He was made brigadier general in June, 1953. He was named commanding general at Fort Stewart on September 1, 1956.

Boy Scouts honor Dr. F. D. Russell

Dr. Fielding Russell of Statesboro recently received the Silver Beaver Award from the Coastal Empire Council, Boy Scouts of America.

This award is made each year by the council to three of its 1,500 volunteer workers for outstanding service to youth. It is the highest award that the council can give.

Dr. Russell is chairman of the Department of Language at Georgia Teachers College. For the past several years he has been active in scout work and was chairman of the Ogeechee District in 1955 and 1956. Under his leadership the district's Boy Scout membership grew from 509 to 639, and its adult volunteers increased from 156 to 242.

Dr. Russell will continue to serve scouting in the district program as vice president of the Coastal Empire Council.

504th Airborne Group to parade here Feb. 23

Rockwell begins new training for draftsmen

Recently the Rockwell Statesboro Corporation advertised for high school graduates who might be interested in a training program for draftsmen. This program is now in operation at the Statesboro plant.

Paul Brisenidine, Johnnie Sanders Jr., and Charles E. Addison were employed in the engineering department as a result of the aptitude tests given to all applicants for this program. Robert Wiggins and James H. Bowen were transferred from shop jobs because of the potential shown for this type work.

A number of other employees, including Lester E. Brannen Sr., Willie Jones, Virgil Harville, Charles Deal and Wyman Hendrix, are attending the Saturday classes in addition to other classes that the trainees are required to attend. Even though not in the engineering department, these employees are advancing themselves with this training, and are also potential draftsmen.

The training these employees are receiving consists of blueprint reading, shop mathematics, mechanical drawing and fundamental Rockwell engineering practices in addition to other instructions pertaining to their work. Dr. Donald F. Hackett of Georgia Teachers College conducts this phase of the training, and Howard Rittenberg, chief draftsman, conducts the classes on the job portions.

Mr. Purcell explained that this program was established to help overcome some of the difficulties encountered in securing draftsmen and other technical and skilled personnel. "Although this way is longer and more expensive than outright hiring of this type of employee," said Mr. Purcell, "we firmly believe that in the long run the cost will be more than justified. We have some potential chief draftsmen, and maybe even project engineers in this group of trainees, and we want to develop the talent they have. The program has very capable lead, and appears to have gotten off to an excellent start."

Mr. Hodges reported 1,198 members enrolled in the county at the present but predicted there would be 1,500 members signed up by April, the deadline for enrolling in the Georgia Farm Bureau.

Riley G. Arnold, fieldman for the American Farm Bureau in the Southern States was the speaker for this annual meeting.

Mr. Arnold enumerated the many needs for farmers maintaining a strong voice in agricultural legislation and pointed out that the American Farm Bureau dictated the national legislation for farmers. Membership counts more than is generally thought in controlling the type of legislation sponsored. The area of the country with the largest membership naturally has the strongest voice in what is sponsored and those that profit most by such legislation. Build a stronger Farm Bureau here and you will get a more profitable legislative program for Southern farmers, he declared.

Mr. Arnold entertained the group delightfully with numerous stories that he is plenty capable of telling. He was with the county some fifteen years ago when Farm Bureau was 8. Since then a sound enrollment program in Georgia.

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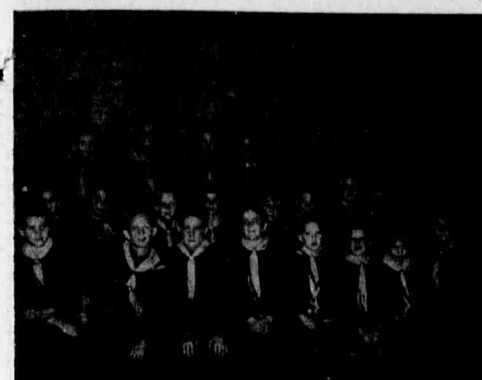

INCOME TAX FACTS How to Save Tax Dollars

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. These articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

When you use the "short cut" in filing your income tax return, or take the standard deduction on the "long form," you are allowed a deduction of about 10 per cent to cover such personal expenses as interest, state and local taxes, contributions and medical expenses. If you are sure that your personal deductions are less than 10 per cent standard deduction, there is no need to itemize them. But if it is worth the effort of calculating your tax on both forms. Here are some deductions you should be careful not to overlook.

Interest on Loans
The interest you pay on loans is deductible. This includes mortgages, automobile, appliance, home improvement, and personal loans you may have. The part of "carrying charges" representing interest on installment purchases is deductible. Evidence such as a statement from the seller should be obtained to show the amount of interest you paid during the year.

State and Local Taxes
Most taxes, other than federal taxes, are deductible. These include state and local real estate, personal property, income, retail sales, poll taxes, and all but a few states, gasoline taxes. You can also deduct auto license and registration fees, but not dog or hunting licenses.

Charitable Contributions
Another type of deduction you can take if you itemize your deductions is your contributions to any "religious, charitable, educational, scientific or literary" organizations. These contributions are deductible up to 30 per cent of your income, and up to 30 per cent if at least 10 per cent of your income was paid as gifts to religious organizations, schools or hospitals.

In adding up your contributions, don't forget that gifts of property can be deducted at their fair market value as of the time they were donated. Suppose, for example, you contributed to your church a share of stock which had doubled in value while you had it. You can deduct, as a contribution, the full value of the stock at the time of the gift, even though you only paid half that much

for it. The instruction book which comes with your tax forms gives further information. Help is also available by telephone or at offices of the Internal Revenue Service. The Revenue Service urges you to consult a properly qualified advisor if you decide to seek outside help.
