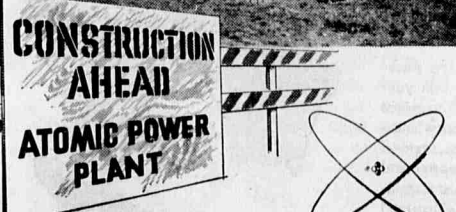

This is the site of the Enrico Fermi atomic power plant, near Detroit, Michigan, one of the places where atomic electricity is on its way. The photograph shows foundations more than half completed for the nuclear reactor building.

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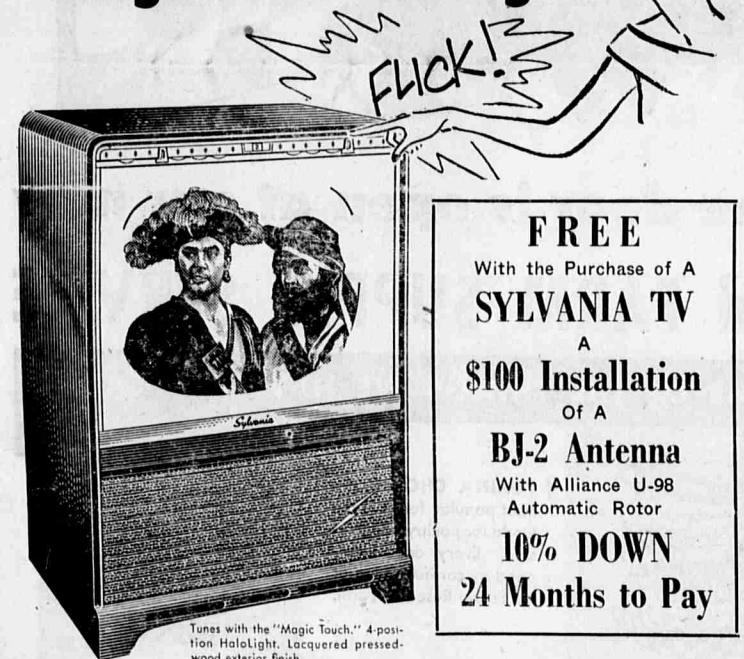

Myers, David Mitchell, Red Cross field representative from Hunter Air Force Base, Savannah, and Elsie Ware, Bulloch County public information chairman. Mr. Myers will be featured over WWSN Wednesday afternoon at 2:45 and will return to Statesboro for subsequent appearances there and in other communities in the area.
