farmer \$402,972.57 for the 3,003 acres he will plant. This is arrived at by assuming an average of 1,491 pounds per acre which would come to 4,477,473 pounds at 9 cents per pound.

The anticipated increase of 2 cents per pound for cotton would return the farmers \$100,728 for the 12,591 acres of cotton they will plant. This is arrived at by assuming an average of 400 pounds of lint per acre, or 5,035,400 pounds at 2 cents per pound. This cotton would produce 4,000 tons of cotton seed which is expected to bring an increase of \$10 per ton for \$40,000 more.

The total income from the expected increase in prices due to the soil bank program is \$543,700.57. Adding this to the \$337,793.56 the farmers will receive from the soil bank payments on a total of \$881,494.13. Deduct his total from the total loss in gross sales for \$2,764,268 the net loss in gross income at the farm level in the county will be \$1,882,773.87.

According to Mr. Williams the livestock picture does not look bright, and is not a factor this year.

Mr. McDougald, president of the Chamber of Commerce, stated that this study was prepared to give the businessmen of the county a picture of what is happening so that they might be heard by the undersigned on the first Monday in May, 1957.
