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The heavy rains Friday, April 5 did a lot of damage to crops and soils alike on unprotected farm land in Bulloch County. But those farms with good water disposal systems — terraces, waterways (well sodded) and diversion ditches, took this quick rain in stride.

Newly constructed water disposal systems are especially vulnerable to sudden heavy rains, especially if the land was washed bare before the terrace system was installed. It is always a very good idea to build new terraces above specification to allow for settling and sedimentation.

This was demonstrated conclusively on the farm of Mayor W. A. Bowen in the Westside community. On the terraces that were constructed above specifications, no damage was done, but on those that were below, breaking and washing resulted.

This was also due to small gullies which had formed before terracing. Frank Smith and his wife, however, are to be commended for their untiring efforts on this mean terracing job of Mayor Bowen's.

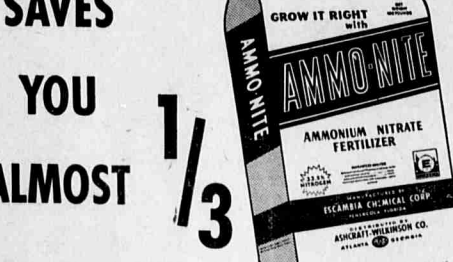
Parallel terrace systems of Henry Blitch in the Westside community, C. B. Altman, B. B. Deal and J. R. Kelly in the Clito community, and Arthur James Riggs of Statesboro all took the heavy rains in stride with flying colors. Only damage to unsodded or freshly seeded waterways. Mr. Altman had just seeded his waterway and the water washed most of the baha seed out of the waterway. This made him have to go back and reseed it. The others had not seeded theirs and the water swept them out smooth and clean. Now they can

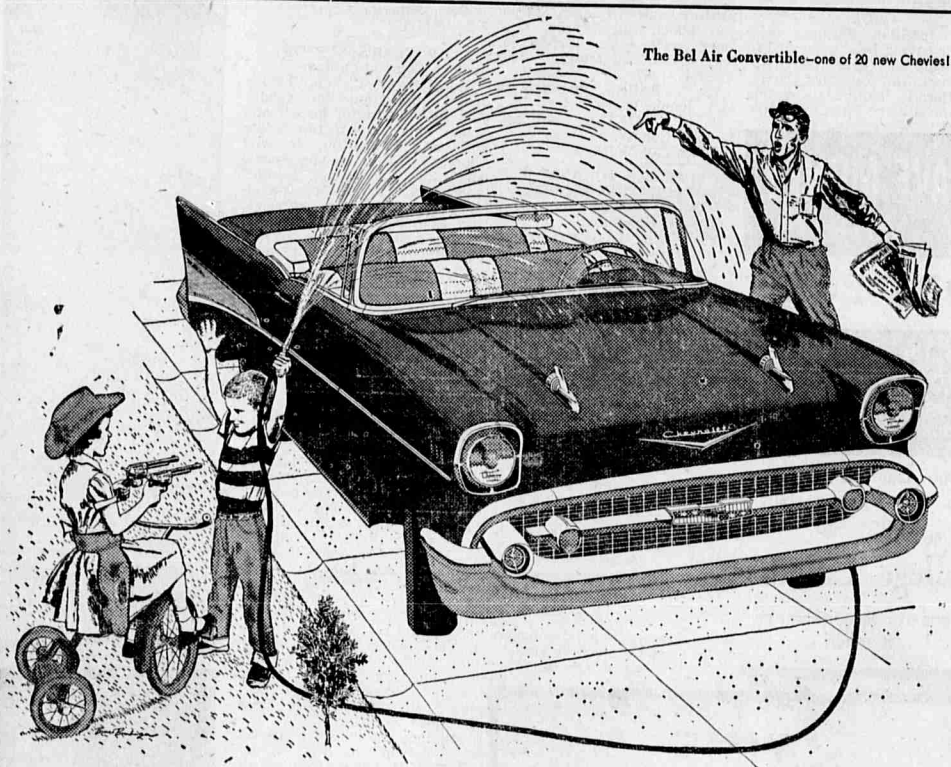
