Health Dept. to begin pre-school clinics in May

The Bulloch County Health Department will begin pre-school clinics this month for children entering school next fall, announces Dr. Hubert King, medical director.

Public health nurses are currently visiting schools in the county in connection with the school orientation program for beginning pupils. Appointments for the health department clinics will be given by schools.

These clinics will be held at the health center in Statesboro. Two visits to the clinic will be necessary. One visit for screening by the nurses and another for the medical examination. Additional visits may be necessary for completion of immunizations.

The nurses will give vision and hearing tests; laboratory tests for intestinal parasites (worms), urine examination, and hemoglobin; in addition to securing medical immunization history. Parents are requested to bring immunization records for their children. Immunizations will be arranged and completed as needed. The clinic doctor will give a complete physical examination. Physical defects found will be referred to the family doctor or dentist for correction.

"The pre-school clinics held last year were most successful and we are certain that the clinics this year will be equally so," stated Dr. King. "It is most important that every child beginning school be prepared physically and emotionally for his school experience. We urge every parent to have his child examined and immunized by his family doctor or in the health department clinic before school begins."

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Farmers can

still get in the Soil Bank

As of now, any Georgia farmer who can prove he tried to put corn, cotton or tobacco in the Soil Bank's acreage reserve before the regular deadlines can still do so.

The signups were abruptly halted when an original allocation of \$21,000,000 of soil bank funds to Georgia was exhausted. They were reopened, however, when \$16,791,000 more became available through an additional federal appropriation.

At the signing reopening on April 2, 31st of the program, was given to farmers who had been put on waiting lists when they applied earlier and could not be accommodated.

At the same time the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices were informed that in certain instances farmers not on the waiting lists might be eligible.

In an elaboration on this point, John F. Bradley, A.S.C. administrative officer, explained Thursday that these other eligibles must have made a bona-fide effort to get in the program.

"Generally," the A.S.C. release said, "such farmers must establish by certification that they made an attempt to participate. If this certification is accepted, and funds remain after all 'waiting list' applications have been taken care of, these farmers will be permitted to file agreements."

"As of today, this means that every farmer who made an attempt to place acreage in the Acreage Reserve Program for corn and cotton by February 22, and for tobacco by March 7, will be accepted and approved by the county committee."

Bradley announced that as of April 18, a total of 665 acres of Georgia wheat, corn, cotton and tobacco had been offered by the acreage reserve, including some acreage of waiting lists.

Last year Georgia farmers tendered 382,118 acres for the reserve in return for payments of \$19,225,191. This year's available funds total \$38,697,000 or twice as much.
