

Lehman Franklin Jr. breaks state 100-yard dash record

The Statesboro High School track team walked away with the 100-yard dash record in the state meet held in Macon on April 11, with a total of 47 points. They won second place in the state meet in Macon on April 25 with 24 points.

In the region meet Lehman Franklin Jr. broke the state records for the 100-yard dash, running it in 10.3 seconds. He tied the state record in the state meet. In the region meet he won first in the 100-yard dash and the 220-yard event, and first place in both events in the state.

Alex Brown won first place in the low hurdles in both meets. The mile relay team, made up of Elmer Dixon, George Waters, Alex Brown and Bunsy Deal, won first place in both the region and state events. The 440 relay team, made up of Elmer Dixon, Wendell McClammy, Alex Brown and Lehman Franklin Jr., won first in the region and third in the state. Lindsey Hunkitt and Doy Lanier won first and second places in the mile event in the region and Doy Lanier won third in the state.

In the region event Elmer Dixon won second place in the 220-yard event. Gene Neville won second and Fred Shearouse won third in the 440-yard event. F. M. Jones won fourth in the 880-yard event. Lehman Franklin Jr. tied for second place in the pole vault and Johnny Wheelchel won second in the discus event.

They, with their supporting posts, should be kept painted. Rural boxes must be on the right side of the road in the direction of travel of the carrier.

"Your mail box is the front door to your home," Mr. DeLoach adds. "It is an open advertisement of the type of folks who get their mail from that spot.

Citizens of the city and county are urged to take a new look at their mail boxes and fix them up during this week.

Carriers serve 2,424 city boxes and 1,594 rural boxes. Of this number approximately 25 per cent of the city boxes and fifty per cent of the rural boxes need repairing or replacing.

PLANT POISONING OF CATTLE

Plants that are potentially poisonous to cattle are legion. Fortunately, cattle by some unexplainable instinct generally avoid them, but to prevent cattle losses, growers must take certain precautions to protect their cattle.

Here are seven suggested precautions based on research conducted at the Coastal Plain Experiment Station:

1. Make every effort to prevent

hunger from tempting animals to browse questionable plants.

2. Where crops such as cro-talaria or lupines are planted, rotate grazing away from them, especially during the seeding period.

3. Destroy suspected poisonous plants, at least near watering places and where cattle congregate and bed down.

4. Destroy wild cherries in the pasture and do not graze sorghums during periods of

stunted growth or soon after frost.

5. Examine the pasture for old arsenate drums and paint buckets which may have been discarded in years past. These cans, should they contain arsenate or paint, are still dangerous after many years.

6. Always be careful with sprays and spray machines.

7. Keep nitrate of soda away from cattle.

If these rules are followed carefully, there may still be a few cases of cattle poisoning, but only a very few as compared to the past.
