## Preston endorsed by district committee

The First District Democratic Executive Committee in official session here last week endorsed Congressman Preston for re-election and urged Democrats to cast their ballots for him in the coming September Primary.

The committee adopted a resolution introduced by Brigadier General Joe B. Frazer (ret.) of Liberty County, which cited Preston's record of service in Congress and stated that "it is to the best economic and social interests of the First Congressional District to continue in office the distinguished representative of the First District."

The executive committee is composed of official representatives from all of the eighteen counties in the First Congressional District. Judge J. Ellis Pope of Toombs County is chairman.

The official resolution asserted that "as a senior member of the House Appropriations Committee, Preston ranks among the first twenty-five members of the U. S. House of Representatives in position and influence. Also cited was Preston's chairmanship of an important Appropriations Subcommittee which handles all funds for fifteen Federal agencies, including appropriations for public roads, maritime, commerce and civil aviation.

The official body of the Democratic Party in the First District also cited the national recognition that Preston has attained in Congress in connection with "matters of vital concern to the Republic" and asserted that he has "gained a position of prestige, respect and influence in the Congress unequalled by any of his predecessors in the present century."

The executive committee set the qualifying fee for the September 10 Primary at \$750 and continued the county unit vote system for the nomination of candidates to Congress from the First District.

# Recreation comes long way in Statesboro since 1948

EDITORS NOTE: This article appears in the revised edition of George Butler's "Introduction to Community Recreation" to be released this fall. Published by McGraw and Hill, the publication is sponsored by the National Recreation Association for world-wide distribution. Statesboro was chosen as the best example of a city of 10,000 in the United States.

## STATESBORO, GEORGIA

In 1948 the City of Statesboro, with a population of slightly more than 6,000, embarked on a plan to present a well-rounded program of recreation for all its citizens. A one-man recreation department, established under a recreation board of five members, started a program with \$5,000 contributed for this purpose. Ten years later Statesboro, with a population of 10,000, boasted a recreation program with an operating budget of more than \$40,000 and a staff of eight full-time workers.

Recreation in Statesboro, which could not be replaced for less than a quarter of a million dollars, include three recreation areas comprising some twenty acres which are being developed on a long-range basis. Among its facilities are five ball diamonds, an outdoor swimming pool, children's pool, two tennis courts, picnic areas, athletic field, and facilities for organized games. Indoor activities are conducted in five recreation buildings and one school center. People of all ages are served through a year-round program of varied activities. Program planning is on a cooperative basis and young people and adults sit in with the leaders in planning programs involving these groups. An unusual factor in securing community interest, understanding and support is a Community Council composed of presidents of business organizations in the community. This council meets monthly with the board of recreation, acts in an advisory capacity, and interprets the actions of the board to the member organizations.

The program at the three playgrounds include games and sports, crafts, dancing, special events, and tournaments. A fishing rodeo, knothole club for boys eight to twelve, an annual birdhouse-building contest, picnics, fishing trips, day and overnight camping, are activities of unusual interest.

The swimming pool is the chief attraction at an area that is also used for picnicking, dancing, tennis and other games and has an annual attendance exceeding 50,000. The pool program includes swimming classes in which more than 600 are registered each year, water safety demonstrations and an annual water show and pageant. Adult square dances, dancing instructions for children and a capella Negro choir, a children's theatre and a nursery-school program on Saturdays show that sports and outdoor activities do not monopolize the program. Special emphasis is laid on events in which the whole family can take part.

Young people play an important part in the Statesboro program. The Drag-On-Inn and a Teen Club conduct dances, swimming parties, winter roasts and social events. The pre-teens in sixth and seventh grades have their own Happy Go-Lucky Club. The objective of another group, Y.O.P.R., is indicated by its title "Youth Organization to Promote Recreation." The services of the Youth Council are recognized at an annual banquet when a Community Service award is made to the boy and girl who have contributed most toward making their community a better place in which to live. Statesboro has had the honor of playing host to the annual State-wide youth workshop.

To aid in disease and insect control, destroy any tobacco plants remaining in the tobacco beds when transplanting has been completed, urges J. B. Preston, agronomist - tobacco, Agricultural Extension Service. A written agreement between the Recreation Department and the County School Board calls for the joint use of all facilities, with each agency furnishing its own supervision regardless of the facility used. The department helps coordinate and supervise the program of Girl Scouting and makes its facilities available to 4-H Clubs. It plays a large role in Civil Defense and the Red Cross and helps in the planning of private recreation facilities which include pools, a golf course and several lake developments featuring family and group camping, picnicking and water sports.

A splendid spirit of cooperation exists among all the recreation groups in the county. Civic, veterans and fraternal organizations have constructed recreation facilities for the department and have loaned funds to teen-age clubs. Local business firms help the department, the recreation movement and high school students by offering two \$300 scholarships each year to students interested in making recreation a career. These students work part time in the local program, as do senior students in the local teachers college where the superintendent of recreation assists in teaching a course in community recreation.

The success of the pilot program in Statesboro has been widely published throughout the state and has demonstrated that a small city can adequately finance a well organized year-round program. It has influenced many other Georgia communities of 10,000 or less to establish a similar program for their people.

## Wheat vote is June 20

Georgia wheat farmers will help make an important decision when the vote June 20 in the national wheat marketing referendum, John F. Bradley, administrative officer of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today.

If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve quotas for the 1959 crop, Mr. Bradley explained, the 1959 wheat program will include acreage allotments, marketing quotas (with penalties for "excess" wheat) and price supports at a minimum national average of \$1.81 per bushel, or 75 per cent of parity.

If the quotas are not approved by at least two-thirds of these voters, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties, but allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support. The price support rate would be about \$1.20 per bushel, or 50 per cent of parity, as provided by law.

Mr. Bradley pointed out that wheat marketing quotas and acreage allotments operate only in commercial wheat states—those with allotments of more than 25,000 acres. Georgia has an allotment of 110,513 acres for the 1959 wheat crop.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum are those who will be affected by the wheat quotas if they become effective. Thus, farmers who will have 15 acres or less of wheat for harvest as grain in 1959 and those who are taking part in the 1958 feed wheat program are not eligible to cast ballots in the 1959 quota referendum on June 20.

## Summer program at Recreation Center provides varied activities for youth

### BASEBALL

All boys eight through eighteen years of age have the opportunity to participate in the Baseball Program. Boys interested in this phase of the program should talk with the Sports Supervisor at the Department office on Fair Road. Different age groups play on different days. All play under supervision.

### SOFTBALL

There are eight teams entered in the Softball Program. These teams are for men participants or for boys graduated from high school this year. Games are played on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights in Memorial Park. The public is invited to enjoy these games. There is no admission charge.

### SWIMMING INSTRUCTION

More than 600 students are expected to enroll in swimming classes this year. Courses are taught from the beginner level through Sr. Life saving. All boys and girls interested in joining classes must be present for classification on Monday at the Memorial Swim Center at 10 a.m. New students are accepted on Monday only at which time they register and are classified. The fee is ten cents per lesson. Classes are taught on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

### SWIMMING INFORMATION

The Memorial Swim Center is open to the public each afternoon from two to six p.m. Monday through Sunday. The Pool is not open on Monday, Saturday or Sunday nights. On Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights the pool is open to the public from seven to ten p.m. Saturday is family day. The pool is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. without a closing hour. This allows picnics to swim during the noon hours. The admission fee on Family day is ten cents for all ages.

### PICNIC AND PAVILION

The Pavilion is located in the Swim Center area and the public is cordially invited to use these facilities at anytime the park is open to the public. A fully equipped snack bar and soda fountain is operated for the convenience of the public. Picnic tables, an outdoor grill and shaded area is available for public use.

The Pavilion is open during the evening hours on the same schedule as the swimming pool.

### KIDDIE SWIMMING POOL

The Kiddie Pool is open the same hours as the Memorial Park Pool and is under supervision except on Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon. The Kiddie Pool is not supervised at night. The pool is emptied and filled daily with fresh water. Filtered water from the large pool flows into the Kiddie Pool at all times. The water is treated and tested daily.

### TEEN TIME

All Teenagers are invited to join the Summer Teen Time Club at the Center. Each Tuesday and Thursday night the members are invited to swim free and on Friday night may make purchases on the pavilion at half price. Total enrollment at Georgia Teachers College for the first session of summer school is 941, according to Miss Viola Perry, registrar.

Regular new student counseling procedures are being directed by Dr. Ralph Tyson, dean of students, because 37 first quarter freshmen are attending the first session.

Elementary education majors make up a large portion of the graduate school, as was expected, but sizable numbers are enrolled in each of the other areas of study. These include health and physical education, English, social science, exact science, industrial arts, and music.

The second session will be conducted at G.T.C. from July 28 to August 20. Students may register for one course, and gain five quarter hours or three and one-third semester hours.
