1. Divide farm for sampling

purpose into areas of similar

soil type.

2. Use a spade, trowel, soil

tube or other suitable instrument

to take sample.

3. Take a thin, vertical slice

of core of soil to plow depth

from at least 12 different places

within the field.

4. Break up cores or slices

and mix well in bucket. Take a

sample from bucket and place

in a soil sample bag.

5. Fill out information sheet.

Give past cropping and fertiliza-

tion practices and crops to be

grown on field sampled.

6. Take samples to County

agent's office. Samples will be

analyzed and recommendations

returned to you.

7. See your County Agent for Soil Test

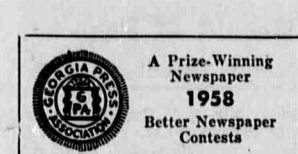

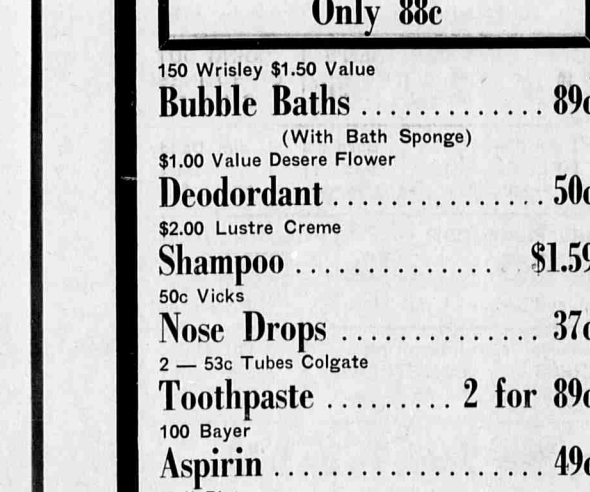

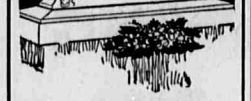
