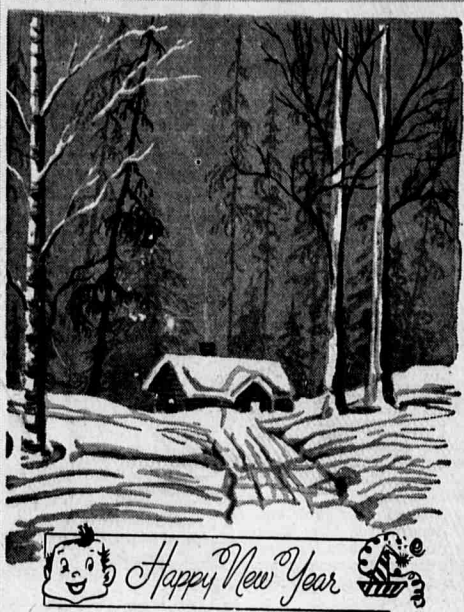

## G.T.C. will get loan to build new dormitory

Announcement was made here last week by Congressman Prince Preston and Senator Herman Talmadge that the Community Facilities Administration, Housing and Home Finance Agency, has approved a loan of \$462,000 to build a dormitory to house 160 women students at Georgia Teachers College.

With the approval of this dormitory the college here is in the midst of an expansion program which includes a new classroom building now under construction, the student center and dining hall building, and a new Arts and Industrial Arts building, in addition to the new dormitory to be provided for with the new funds.

The 1957 winter quarter enrollment was 876. Enrollment at the beginning of the school year in September, 1958, was over 1,000.

## Contract let for four-lane paving on U. S. 80

Announcement was made this week by the State Highway Department of Georgia that the contract had been let for paving 5.442 miles of grading and four-lane paving of the Statesboro-Milled Road, State Route 26, beginning near the north city limit of Statesboro and extending north to the junction of State Route 26 and State Route 67. The apparent low bid was \$814,539.40 by W. L. Cobb Construction Company.

This is the highway better known as U. S. 80 from Statesboro out to "Hopewell."

The contract was included in bids opened in Atlanta on December 19 totaling \$7,273,882.82 in new road construction contracts, covering road work to be undertaken in thirty-eight counties.

## Ga. Power pays \$18,245 to city and county

Tom Martin, district manager of the Georgia Power Company, with headquarters in Statesboro, announced this week that Bulloch County and Statesboro had received a total of \$18,245.38 for the company's 1958 property taxes.

Mr. Martin said in making the announcement, "Our company is proud to participate in the cost of governmental operation in this way."

He added that the Georgia Power Company throughout the state had presented to municipal and county government officials checks totaling approximately \$4,350,000 for the company's 1958 property taxes. To cities and towns.

The company already had paid more than \$925,000 in property taxes for 1958 making the total to be paid for 1958 \$5,275,000. This compares with \$4,840,486 paid for the year 1957.

Earlier in 1958, municipal partnership tax payments totaling \$1,931,983 were paid by the company to 381 cities, towns and communities in which the firm's three per cent franchise agreement was in effect. Under this agreement, the company pays each municipality in which it operates three per cent of its gross revenue from the sale of electricity for residential and commercial use. These municipal partnership tax payments were based on 1957 electric revenue and were in addition to property tax payments.

## Land for Soil Bank being inspected

Inspection of land on which applications for new Conservation Reserve contracts have been filed is now being made, according to Miles F. Deal, manager of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office. This inspection is one of the necessary steps before a contract to put land in the Conservation Reserve may be signed by an applicant.

All land offered for the Conservation Reserve must be checked to determine: (1) if it is eligible for the program; (2) if it is of average productivity for the farm; and (3) the exact acreage of land offered.

Since the number of acres offered for the program by applicants is greater than can be accepted for contracts in Bulloch County, the priority system is being used to determine which farmers will have an opportunity to sign contracts.

When the priority system is used, farmers who in 1958 had all their cropland in the Acreage Reserve and the Conservation Reserve together—and are now applying to put all the land in the Conservation Reserve—will be offered contracts first. The next priority is to farmers who offer land at less than the maximum rate established for their farms. The remaining applications (all at the established maximum rates) are then considered in order of the rate per acre, beginning with the lowest.

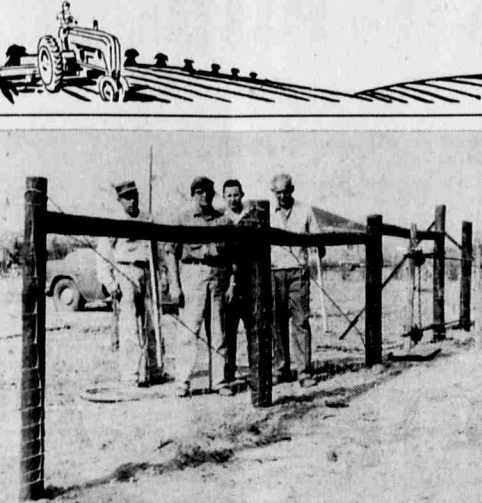

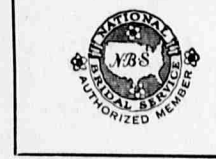
