## Charles Robbins to head Easter Seal campaign

Mr. Charles M. Robbins Jr., Robbins Packing Company, Statesboro, will be the first District chairman of the 1959 Easter Seal Campaign for the Georgia Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc. Mr. Robbins will direct teams of volunteers who will work from February 27 through Easter Sunday, March 29, to raise funds for maintaining and expanding services needed by crippled children and adults in the First Congressional District comprised of 18 counties in the southeast Georgia area.

The Georgia Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc. is one of 1,700 affiliates of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults, conducting simultaneously campaigns in behalf of the physically handicapped. National Easter Seal chairman is Garry Moore, television humorist and actor. Mr. Robbins is active in local business and social affairs. He is past president of the Georgia Junior Chamber of Commerce and also past president of the Georgia Junior Chamber of Commerce, past president of the Statesboro Rotary Club, vice president of the Georgia Independent Meat Packers Association and of the Forest Heights Country Club. He is active as a director of the Bulloch County Bank, Statesboro, and a member of the Board of Stewards of the First Methodist Church of Statesboro. During 1959 he will serve on the Steering Committee of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce.

In accepting this chairmanship, Mr. Robbins said: "Much of the progress during recent years can be traced to the efforts of such voluntary organizations as the Georgia Society. Through support of research, professional and public education, and programs of direct service to the handicapped, the Easter Seal Society has helped bring new hope to thousands of our fellow Georgians." Last year 5,765 crippled persons received assistance from the Society through the two rehabilitation centers, one in Atlanta and one in Statesboro. The primary emphasis of this year's Easter Seal drive will be to raise funds for maintaining and expanding services to Georgia's 212,300 handicapped.

The delegates from the Statesboro High School Y Clubs include: Sr. Hi-Y, Jimmy Brown and Jimmy Brown Jr.; Jr. Hi-Y, Johnny Martin and Bobby Brown; Sr. Hi-Y, Mary Alice Chaney and Kay Minkovitz, press representative; Jr. Hi-Y, Harriet Holloman and Dale Anderson. Linda Cason, a junior at Statesboro High and president of the Sr. Hi-Y, has been selected by the "Y" clubs as a candidate for messenger of the House. If elected, Linda will serve in the 1960 session of Youth Assembly.

Tommy Martin, a senior at Statesboro High and president of the Sr. Hi-Y, was appointed House floor leader by the officers of the 1959 Youth Assembly. In the 1958 Youth Assembly, the Statesboro Hi-Y introduced a bill setting up a salary scale for sheriff's in all the counties in the State. The bill passed by a large majority and is now a law in the Youth Government of Georgia.

Jimmy Hodges, a senior and president of the Sr. Hi-Y, received an award as the most outstanding press representative of the entire 1958 session. It is the responsibility of the press representative to report the happenings and important events of the "Y" Clubs will not sponsor a bill this year.

## Delegates named to 'Y' Youth Assembly

Youth Assembly is a mock legislature, patterned after the Georgia General Assembly, in which 900 Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y youth leaders representing 44 states assume the power of government and are given the opportunity to run it themselves. The theme this year is "The Power is Ours — To Dream — To Dare — To Do."

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## G.T.C. to give bachelor degree in recreation

The State Board of Regents Wednesday approved a new undergraduate degree for Georgia Teachers College Professors in education degree. It will be administered by the division of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. Division chairman is Mr. J. B. Scarce Jr.

The degree is a French major in the bachelor of science in education degree. It will be offered by the division of languages. Dr. Fielding D. Russell is chairman of the division, and Dr. Zoltan J. Farkas will teach the French courses.

In other action, the regents gave final approval to a new \$450,000, 160-capacity gymnasium. Bids will be let on this building in the early fall. Bids on the new Arts-Industrial Arts building will be let about April 1. Two other buildings now under construction, the Frank I. Williams Student Center, and a classroom building, are scheduled for completion in the near future.

The B. S. in recreation degree will be offered because of the growing need for professional recreation directors and program supervisors in the cities of Georgia. The demand currently far exceeds the supply of trained recreation directors. It will be the only degree of its kind in the state. One of the degree requirements will be 15 credit hours of internship in an approved full-time city recreation program.

The major in French reflects an increased interest in foreign language both on the secondary and college level. Fall quarter at GTC found 76 students enrolled in beginning French. The new emphasis on foreign language in Georgia high schools will further require additional qualified teachers.

## Mrs. John A. Robertson of Brooklet has heart attack

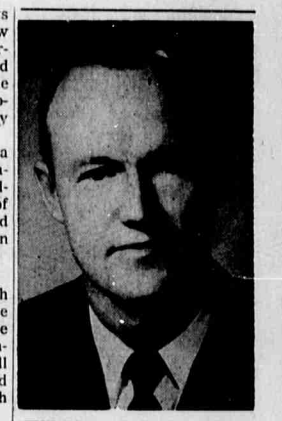
Mrs. John A. Robertson, Bulloch Herald correspondent at Brooklet suffered a heart attack last week.

## GEORGIA DAIRYING AND ITS FUTURE

Dairymen at the Agricultural Extension Service say Georgia's annual income from dairying almost doubled in the last 10 years. With 325,000 cows averaging 6,000 pounds of milk a year, annual income from dairying could be \$75 million by 1965, the dairymen declare. This will require an expansion in production of milk for manufacturing. Also, every step will have to be improved by all producers, the dairymen add.

Farmers in the United States produce and sell more than \$30 billion worth of products annually, report economists at the Agricultural Extension Service.

#### FORERUNNER OF DHIA

The fore-runner of Dairy Herd Improvement Association testing in Georgia was record keeping demonstrations. In 1916 the Agricultural Extension Service provided record sheets for recording monthly milk weights to interested farmers, says H. K. Welch, Jr., Extension dairyman.

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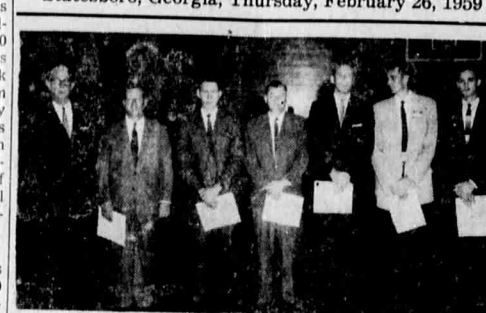

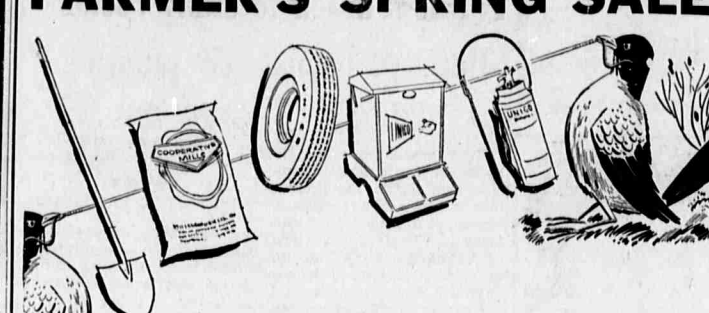

## ROCKWELL NEWS

### Rockwell plants located in fifteen states and Canada

The Statesboro Division, Rockwell Manufacturing Company, is one of 22 manufacturing facilities operated by the company. These plants are located in 15 states and Canada, and employ approximately 7,000 people. Two hundred and fifty people are on the local payroll.

Rockwell Manufacturing Company products serve 28 different basic markets. The Statesboro Division serves only a small number of these markets, which includes petroleum industry, chemical industry, gas industry, and transit systems. To serve all of these basic markets, 19 products are made by the over-all company, with five of these products produced locally. These five products consist of gasoline and oil meters, industrial meters, liquefied petroleum and natural gas meters, taxi meters, and fare registers.

Operating on an international basis, Rockwell has a wholly owned German subsidiary producing valves and small engines. There are four other foreign subsidiaries, and three foreign affiliates. The company is represented in 80 countries.

Approximately 12,850 people had Rockwell stock last year. These stockholders received dividends of approximately 2.14 which includes a stock split in the latter part of the year.

Mr. W. F. Rockwell Jr., president of the Rockwell Manufacturing Company, in his January "Rockwell Report," wrote:

"Municipalities with less than 50,000 people often are handicapped by lack of a traffic engineer or lack of money in making a proper survey of their parking needs. Such information is vital in the planning of meters, the alignment of parking stalls, and the location of off-the-street parking lots."

He also stated "In addition to voting machines, our Automatic Voting Machine Division also manufactures the Aetna Driver-trainer. The Driver-trainer makes possible a more economical way to teach new drivers the fundamentals of driving in the classrooms. It is not meant to substitute for automobiles in a training program, but rather to cut down on the time an instructor must be with a student in a classroom. The result is that more students can be taught per instructor and per-car."

### Employment office here makes report

Commissioner of Labor Ben T. Hulet reports that wages of all non-farm workers in this area helped maintain a wage record of \$3,150,000,000 (billions) during 1958, equal to the record-breaking year of 1957. Workers in insured employment numbered over 608,500 in June 1958. Statewide insured wages were in excess of \$2.4 (billions) in fiscal year 1958, a gain of over 25,000,000 (billions) over FY 1957. The information is reported in the commissioner's 22nd annual report to the Governor of the General Assembly.

The Department of Labor's employment service office serving this county is located at 34 North Main Street, Statesboro, Georgia. It also serves Camden, Emanuel, Evans, Jenkins, Screven and Tattnall counties.

This office, managed by W. H. Armstrong, assisted employers in this area in filling 1,484 non-farm jobs in 1958. During this same time, employers hired 1,511 new workers through the local office workers to fill 1,336 farm jobs. The state total of non-farm job placements for 1958 was 141,738, a gain of 12,500 over last year.

These facts point up the strides Georgia made industrially last year, resulting in greater purchasing power of the state's residents, in spite of the national economic recession last year. While some states had as high as 15 per cent unemployment in 1958, Georgia's peak was only seven per cent.

"Last year, 1958, started out with unemployment in an unusually low climb, while this year, 1959, has begun with only the expected seasonal slump," Commissioner Hulet told Gov. Ernest Vandiver. "We are confident that this year will see several new highs in Georgia's business, industrial and agricultural work income. January 1959 has seen a 15 per cent lower unemployment rate than last January."

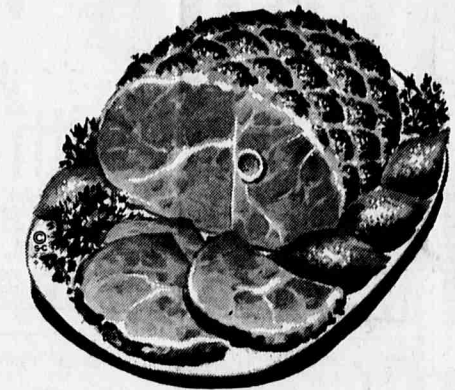
